*An **accomplice** in the murder.*
- associate** A friend who is frequently in the company of another.
*A close **associate** of the Minister.*
- colleague** A person who is member of one's class or profession.
*The surgeon consulted his **colleagues**.*

- confederate** A supporter of the Confederate States of America.
*Where was his **confederate** the girl who had stolen Richard's wallet.*
- friend** A member of the Religious Society of Friends founded by George Fox (the Friends have never called themselves Quakers).
*He was my best **friend** at the university.*
- helper** A person who helps someone else.
*We rely on volunteer **helpers**.*
- partner** A person who is a member of a partnership.
*A **partner** in a prosperous legal practice.*
- supporter** A person who backs a politician or a team etc.
*An Oxford United **supporter**.*

- *He was forced to dismiss his closest political ally.*
- *They were caught between the German army of occupation and the advancing Allies.*
- *He's a good ally in fight.*
- *Debate continued among NATO allies.*

*They are national associations **affiliated** to larger organizations.*

align oneself

Align oneself with a group or a way of thinking.

amalgamate

Alloy (a metal) with mercury.

***Amalgamated** zinc.*

band together

Bind or tie together, as with a band.

collaborate

Cooperate traitorously with an enemy.

*He **collaborated** with him on numerous hotel projects.*

combine

Combine so as to form a whole mix.

*An ideal place to **combine** shopping and sightseeing.*

confederate

Form a confederation with; of nations.

*The treaty **confederated** the fourteen tribes.*

<u>couple</u>	Join to form a pair. <i>A sense of hope is coupled with a palpable sense of loss.</i>
form an alliance	Give shape or form to.
<u>fuse</u>	Of an electrical appliance stop working when a fuse melts. <i>Intermarriage had fused the families into a large unit.</i>
go into league	Be spent.
go into partnership	Stretch out over a distance, space, time, or scope; run or extend between two points or beyond a certain point.
join	Cause to become joined or linked. <i>She joined the department last year.</i>
join forces	Cause to become joined or linked.
join up	Make contact or come together.
knit	Make textiles by knitting. <i>Cast on and knit a few rows.</i>
<u>league</u>	Join in a league or alliance. <i>Oscar had leagued with other construction firms.</i>
make common cause	Create by artistic means.
marry	Take in marriage. <i>Most Chardonnays don't marry well with salmon.</i>
<u>merge</u>	Blend or cause to blend gradually into something else so as to become indistinguishable from it. <i>He agreed to merge his broadcasting company with a multinational concern.</i>
<u>pool</u>	Of liquid form a pool on the ground or another surface. <i>Sweat pooled in the hollow of my back.</i>
<u>side</u>	Provide with a side or sides form the side of. <i>The hills that side a long valley.</i>
team up	Form a team.
throw in one's lot	Get rid of.
unite	Be or become joined or united or linked. <i>He called on the party to unite.</i>
weld	Forge an article by welding. <i>Her gratitude welded her to him.</i>

Associations of "Ally" (30 Words)

affiliation	The state or process of affiliating or being affiliated. <i>A valuable financial affiliation.</i>
alliance	A formal agreement establishing an association or alliance between nations or other groups to achieve a particular aim. <i>His party is in alliance with the Greens.</i>
amalgamate	To bring or combine together or with something else. <i>He amalgamated his company with another.</i>
associate	Make a logical or causal connection. <i>An associate company.</i>
association	A formal organization of people or groups of people. <i>The word bureaucracy has unpleasant associations.</i>
blend	The act of blending components together thoroughly. <i>Blend and smudge the darker colours under the bottom lashes.</i>
coalescence	The union of diverse things into one body or form or group; the growing together of parts. <i>The lack of coalescence among fields of science.</i>
coalescing	Growing together, fusing.
<u>coalition</u>	The union of diverse things into one body or form or group; the growing together of parts. <i>They had a taste of government in coalition with the Social Democrats.</i>
collaboration	Something produced in collaboration with someone. <i>His recent opera was a collaboration with Lessing.</i>
combination	A sequence of numbers or letters used to open a combination lock. <i>The combination of recession and falling property values proved fatal to the business community.</i>
combine	Combine so as to form a whole mix. <i>Oxygen and hydrogen do not combine at room temperatures.</i>
combined	Made or joined or united into one.
confederacy	The southern states that seceded from the United States in 1861. <i>The Yakuza is a secret confederacy of criminal fraternities.</i>
<u>confederation</u>	The act of forming an alliance or confederation. <i>Canada became a confederation in 1867.</i>
conjoin	Join; combine. <i>An approach which conjoins theory and method.</i>

cooperation	Joint operation or action. <i>We should like to ask for your cooperation in the survey.</i>
<u>fusion</u>	Music that is a mixture of different styles, especially jazz and rock. <i>A fusion reactor.</i>
<u>guild</u>	A group of species that have similar requirements and play a similar role within a community.
integrate	Become one become integrated. <i>Transport planning should be integrated with energy policy.</i>
integrated	(of an institution, body, etc.) desegregated, especially racially. <i>A more closely integrated economic and political system.</i>
join	Cause to become joined or linked. <i>After the show we were joined by Jessica s sister.</i>
<u>league</u>	Unite to form a league. <i>The league championship.</i>
membership	The state of being a member. <i>Countries seeking membership of the European Union.</i>
<u>merge</u>	Join or combine. <i>He placed a sheet of paper over the fresh paint to merge the colours.</i>
synthesis	The combination of ideas into a complex whole. <i>The ideology represented a synthesis of certain ideas.</i>
<u>unify</u>	To bring or combine together or with something else. <i>The government hoped to centralize and unify the nation.</i>
<u>union</u>	Of trade unions. <i>A union shop clause in the contract.</i>
unite	Act in concert or unite in a common purpose or belief. <i>The Democratic Patry platform united several splinter groups.</i>
<u>united</u>	Of or relating to two people who are married to each other. <i>Presented a united front.</i>
