### Definitions of "Ally" as a noun

- *A state formally cooperating with another for a military or other purpose.*
- *An associate who provides cooperation or assistance.*
- *A friendly nation.*
- *A person or organization that cooperates with or helps another in a particular activity.*



## Synonyms of "Ally" as a noun (10 Words)

- abetter** One who helps or encourages or incites another.
- accessory** Someone who gives assistance to the perpetrator of a crime without taking part in it.  
*She was charged as an **accessory** to murder.*
- accomplice** A person who joins with another in carrying out some plan (especially an unethical or illegal plan).  
*An **accomplice** in the murder.*
- associate** A friend who is frequently in the company of another.  
*A close **associate** of the Minister.*
- colleague** A person who is member of one's class or profession.  
*The surgeon consulted his **colleagues**.*

- confederate** A supporter of the Confederate States of America.  
*Where was his **confederate** the girl who had stolen Richard's wallet.*
- friend** A member of the Religious Society of Friends founded by George Fox (the Friends have never called themselves Quakers).  
*He was my best **friend** at the university.*
- helper** A person who helps someone else.  
*We rely on volunteer **helpers**.*
- partner** A person who is a member of a partnership.  
*A **partner** in a prosperous legal practice.*
- supporter** A person who backs a politician or a team etc.  
*An Oxford United **supporter**.*



## Usage Examples of "Ally" as a noun

- *He was forced to dismiss his closest political ally.*
- *They were caught between the German army of occupation and the advancing Allies.*
- *He's a good ally in fight.*
- *Debate continued among NATO allies.*



## Ally as a Verb

### Definitions of "Ally" as a verb

- *Become an ally or associate, as by a treaty or marriage.*
- *Side with or support.*
- *Combine or unite a resource or commodity with (another) for mutual benefit.*

(of an organization) admit as a member.

*They are national associations **affiliated** to larger organizations.*

**align oneself**

Align oneself with a group or a way of thinking.

**amalgamate**

Alloy (a metal) with mercury.

***Amalgamated** zinc.*

**band together**

Bind or tie together, as with a band.

**collaborate**

Cooperate traitorously with an enemy.

*He **collaborated** with him on numerous hotel projects.*

**combine**

Combine so as to form a whole mix.

*An ideal place to **combine** shopping and sightseeing.*

**confederate**

Form a confederation with; of nations.

*The treaty **confederated** the fourteen tribes.*

<b><u>couple</u></b>	Join to form a pair. <i>A sense of hope is <b>coupled</b> with a palpable sense of loss.</i>
<b>form an alliance</b>	Give shape or form to.
<b><u>fuse</u></b>	Of an electrical appliance stop working when a fuse melts. <i>Intermarriage had <b>fused</b> the families into a large unit.</i>
<b>go into league</b>	Be spent.
<b>go into partnership</b>	Stretch out over a distance, space, time, or scope; run or extend between two points or beyond a certain point.
<b>join</b>	Cause to become joined or linked. <i>She <b>joined</b> the department last year.</i>
<b>join forces</b>	Cause to become joined or linked.
<b>join up</b>	Make contact or come together.
<b>knit</b>	Make textiles by knitting. <i>Cast on and <b>knit</b> a few rows.</i>
<b><u>league</u></b>	Join in a league or alliance. <i>Oscar had <b>leagued</b> with other construction firms.</i>
<b>make common cause</b>	Create by artistic means.
<b>marry</b>	Take in marriage. <i>Most Chardonnays don't <b>marry</b> well with salmon.</i>
<b><u>merge</u></b>	Blend or cause to blend gradually into something else so as to become indistinguishable from it. <i>He agreed to <b>merge</b> his broadcasting company with a multinational concern.</i>
<b><u>pool</u></b>	Of liquid form a pool on the ground or another surface. <i>Sweat <b>pooled</b> in the hollow of my back.</i>
<b><u>side</u></b>	Provide with a side or sides form the side of. <i>The hills that <b>side</b> a long valley.</i>
<b>team up</b>	Form a team.
<b>throw in one's lot</b>	Get rid of.
<b>unite</b>	Be or become joined or united or linked. <i>He called on the party to <b>unite</b>.</i>
<b>weld</b>	Forge an article by welding. <i>Her gratitude <b>welded</b> her to him.</i>

## Associations of "Ally" (30 Words)

<b>affiliation</b>	The state or process of affiliating or being affiliated. <i>A valuable financial <b>affiliation</b>.</i>
<b>alliance</b>	A formal agreement establishing an association or alliance between nations or other groups to achieve a particular aim. <i>His party is in <b>alliance</b> with the Greens.</i>
<b>amalgamate</b>	To bring or combine together or with something else. <i>He <b>amalgamated</b> his company with another.</i>
<b>associate</b>	Make a logical or causal connection. <i>An <b>associate</b> company.</i>
<b>association</b>	A formal organization of people or groups of people. <i>The word bureaucracy has unpleasant <b>associations</b>.</i>
<b>blend</b>	The act of blending components together thoroughly. <i><b>Blend</b> and smudge the darker colours under the bottom lashes.</i>
<b>coalescence</b>	The union of diverse things into one body or form or group; the growing together of parts. <i>The lack of <b>coalescence</b> among fields of science.</i>
<b>coalescing</b>	Growing together, fusing.
<b><u>coalition</u></b>	The union of diverse things into one body or form or group; the growing together of parts. <i>They had a taste of government in <b>coalition</b> with the Social Democrats.</i>
<b>collaboration</b>	Something produced in collaboration with someone. <i>His recent opera was a <b>collaboration</b> with Lessing.</i>
<b>combination</b>	A sequence of numbers or letters used to open a combination lock. <i>The <b>combination</b> of recession and falling property values proved fatal to the business community.</i>
<b>combine</b>	Combine so as to form a whole mix. <i>Oxygen and hydrogen do not <b>combine</b> at room temperatures.</i>
<b>combined</b>	Made or joined or united into one.
<b>confederacy</b>	The southern states that seceded from the United States in 1861. <i>The Yakuza is a secret <b>confederacy</b> of criminal fraternities.</i>
<b><u>confederation</u></b>	The act of forming an alliance or confederation. <i>Canada became a <b>confederation</b> in 1867.</i>
<b>conjoin</b>	Join; combine. <i>An approach which <b>conjoins</b> theory and method.</i>

<b>cooperation</b>	Joint operation or action. <i>We should like to ask for your <b>cooperation</b> in the survey.</i>
<b><u>fusion</u></b>	Music that is a mixture of different styles, especially jazz and rock. <i>A <b>fusion</b> reactor.</i>
<b><u>guild</u></b>	A group of species that have similar requirements and play a similar role within a community.
<b>integrate</b>	Become one become integrated. <i>Transport planning should be <b>integrated</b> with energy policy.</i>
<b>integrated</b>	(of an institution, body, etc.) desegregated, especially racially. <i>A more closely <b>integrated</b> economic and political system.</i>
<b>join</b>	Cause to become joined or linked. <i>After the show we were <b>joined</b> by Jessica s sister.</i>
<b><u>league</u></b>	Unite to form a league. <i>The <b>league</b> championship.</i>
<b>membership</b>	The state of being a member. <i>Countries seeking <b>membership</b> of the European Union.</i>
<b><u>merge</u></b>	Join or combine. <i>He placed a sheet of paper over the fresh paint to <b>merge</b> the colours.</i>
<b>synthesis</b>	The combination of ideas into a complex whole. <i>The ideology represented a <b>synthesis</b> of certain ideas.</i>
<b><u>unify</u></b>	To bring or combine together or with something else. <i>The government hoped to centralize and <b>unify</b> the nation.</i>
<b><u>union</u></b>	Of trade unions. <i>A <b>union</b> shop clause in the contract.</i>
<b>unite</b>	Act in concert or unite in a common purpose or belief. <i>The Democratic Patry platform <b>united</b> several splinter groups.</i>
<b><u>united</u></b>	Of or relating to two people who are married to each other. <i>Presented a <b>united</b> front.</i>
