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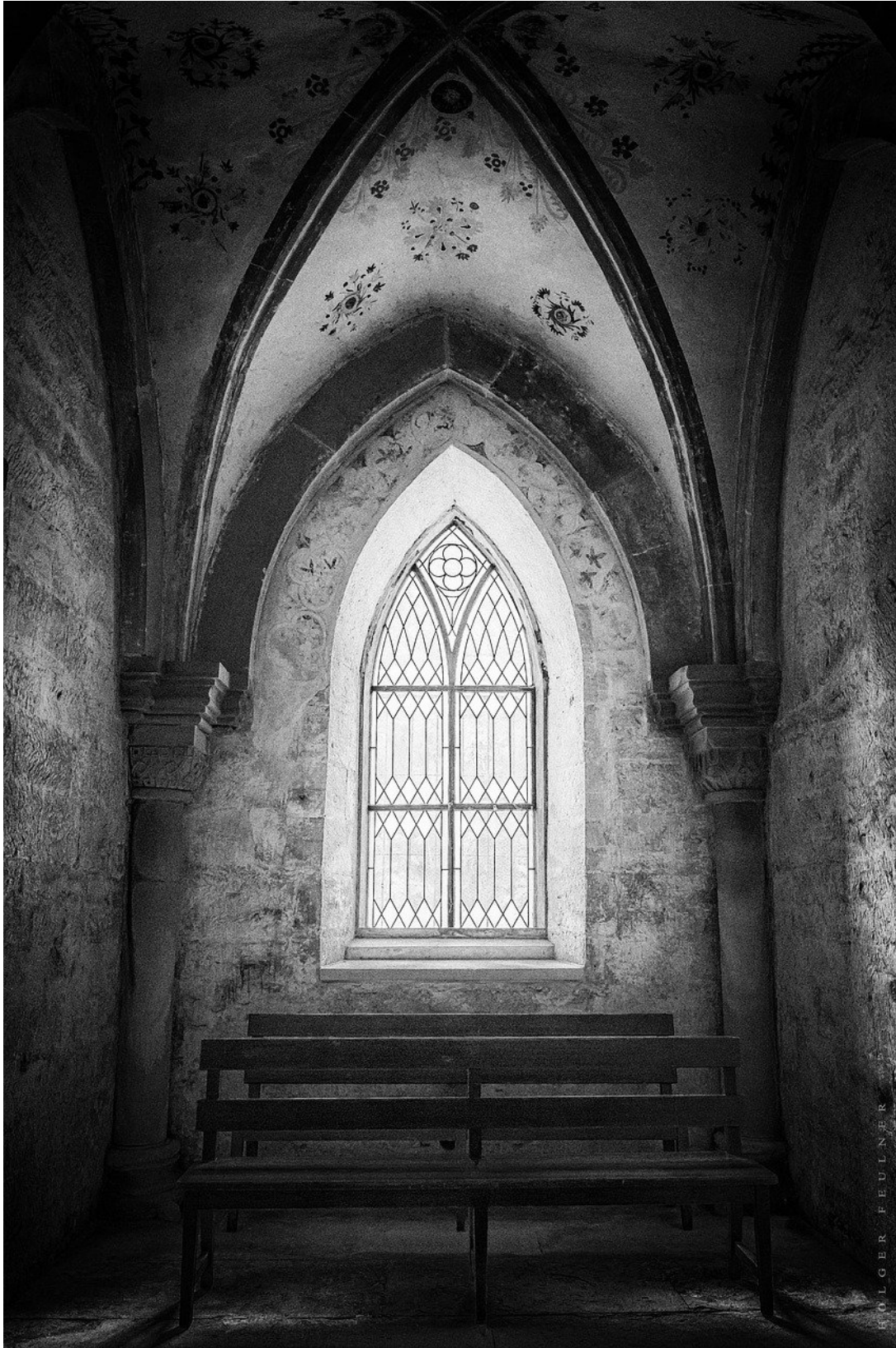

Synonyms of "Alongside" as an adverb (1 Word)

aboard Side by side.
*They put their first batter **aboard**.*

Associations of "Alongside" (30 Words)

abreast Alongside each other, facing in the same direction.
*They were riding three **abreast**.*

belated After the expected or usual time; delayed.
*A **belated** apology.*

chic Stylishness and elegance, typically of a specified kind.
*The hotel's lobby and restaurant are the height of designer **chic**.*

craze Develop a fine network of cracks.
*Internal stresses often caused the glue to **craze**.*

current Dominant course (suggestive of running water) of successive events or ideas.
***Current** psychoanalytic theories.*

currently At the present time.
*The EC is **currently** attempting greater economic integration.*

fad An interest followed with exaggerated zeal.
*His **fads** about the type of coffee he must have.*

faddish Intensely fashionable or popular for a short period of time.
*Tastes in flavoured coffee are so **faddish**.*

fashionable Popular and considered appealing or fashionable at the time.
*A **fashionable** cafe.*

informed Having much knowledge or education.
*Obtaining **informed** consent from research participants is central to ethical research practice.*

lately Recently; not long ago.
***Lately** the rules have been enforced.*

lateral A lateral consonant.
*The radius lies **lateral** to the ulna.*

latest The most recent news or development.
*The very **latest** scientific discoveries.*

modern Belonging to the modern era since the Middle Ages.
***Modern** German.*

modish	In the current fashion or style. <i>It seems sad that such a scholar should feel compelled to use this modish jargon.</i>
newfangled	Gratuitously new. <i>Newfangled ideas.</i>
newly	Very recently. <i>Social confidence for the newly single.</i>
next	The next person or thing. <i>Next I heard the sound of voices.</i>
present	Represent abstractly for example in a painting drawing or sculpture. <i>Present at the creation.</i>
presently	At this time or period; now. <i>He is presently our ambassador to the United Nations.</i>
recency	The property of having happened or appeared not long ago.
recent	Approximately the last 10,000 years. <i>A recent edition of the newspaper.</i>
recently	At a recent time; not long ago. <i>I recently bought a CD player.</i>
shortly	In the near future. <i>To put it shortly.</i>
soon	Used to indicate one's preference in a particular matter. <i>How soon can you get here.</i>
sophistication	Falsification by the use of sophistry; misleading by means of specious fallacies. <i>Understanding affine transformations requires considerable mathematical sophistication.</i>
stylish	Neat, confident, and skilful. <i>A stylish cocktail bar.</i>
up-to-date	Sweet edible fruit of the date palm with a single long woody seed.
urbanity	Urban life. <i>There is an important difference between rusticity and urbanity.</i>
whereabouts	The place where someone or something is. <i>Whereabouts do you come from.</i>
