- **o.k.** In a satisfactory or adequate manner; (`alright' is a nonstandard variant of `all right.

ok An expression of agreement normally occurring at the beginning of a sentence.

okay In a satisfactory or adequate manner.

She ll do **okay** on her own.

very well Used as intensifiers; `real' is sometimes used informally for `really'; `rattling' is informal.
