Alright as an Adverb

Definitions of "Alright" as an adverb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “alright” as an adverb can have the following definitions:

- *In a satisfactory or adequate manner.*
- *In a satisfactory or adequate manner; (‘alright’ is a nonstandard variant of ‘all right’.*
- *An expression of agreement normally occurring at the beginning of a sentence.*
- *Without doubt (used to reinforce an assertion.*

Synonyms of "Alright" as an adverb (6 Words)

all right	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent (‘whole’ is often used informally for ‘wholly’.
fine	In a delicate manner. <i>Her fine drawn body.</i>
o.k.	In a satisfactory or adequate manner; (‘alright’ is a nonstandard variant of ‘all right’.
ok	An expression of agreement normally occurring at the beginning of a sentence.
okay	In a satisfactory or adequate manner. <i>She ll do okay on her own.</i>
very well	Used as intensifiers; ‘real’ is sometimes used informally for ‘really’; ‘rattling’ is informal.

adequate	Sufficient for the purpose. <i>She was adequate to the job.</i>
allow	Allow the other baseball team to score. <i>The river was patrolled and few people were allowed across.</i>
answer	Give the correct answer or solution to. <i>She answered that she would take nothing but the ring.</i>
approve	Give sanction to. <i>He approved himself ripe for military command.</i>
clap	Show approval of a person or action by clapping. <i>When the clapping had died down he stood up to make a speech.</i>
<u>complacent</u>	Contented to a fault with oneself or one's actions. <i>You can't afford to be complacent about security.</i>
<u>consent</u>	Give an affirmative reply to; respond favorably to. <i>He consented to a search by a detective.</i>
contented	Satisfied or showing satisfaction with things as they are. <i>I was never contented with half measures.</i>
<u>exclaim</u>	Utter aloud; often with surprise, horror, or joy. <i>She looked in the mirror exclaiming in dismay at her appearance.</i>
fine	Characterized by elegance or refinement or accomplishment. <i>The soils were all fine silt.</i>
good	Often used as a combining form in a good or proper or satisfactory manner or to a high standard good is a nonstandard dialectal variant for well. <i>A mysterious balance of good and evil.</i>
<u>greet</u>	Send greetings to. <i>Sam threw open the door and was greeted by a cacophony of noise.</i>
hi	An expression of greeting.
indulgence	In the Roman Catholic Church a grant by the Pope of remission of the temporal punishment in purgatory still due for sins after absolution The unrestricted sale of indulgences by pardoners was a widespread abuse during the later Middle Ages. <i>Too much indulgence spoils a child.</i>
indulging	The act of indulging or gratifying a desire.
<u>nod</u>	Sway gently back and forth as in a nodding motion. <i>He looked around for support and everyone noded.</i>
oh	A midwestern state in north central United States in the Great Lakes region.

okay	In a satisfactory or adequate manner. <i>She ll do okay on her own.</i>
passable	Just good enough to be acceptable; satisfactory. <i>The road is passable.</i>
permissible	That may be accepted or conceded. <i>A permissible tax deduction.</i>
<u>pleased</u>	Feeling or showing pleasure and satisfaction, especially at an event or a situation. <i>A pleased smile.</i>
reply	A statement either spoken or written that is made to reply to a question or request or criticism or accusation. <i>I received a reply from the managing director.</i>
<u>satisfactory</u>	Giving satisfaction. <i>His grades were satisfactory.</i>
<u>satisfied</u>	Allayed. <i>Satisfied customers.</i>
<u>sensuous</u>	Taking delight in beauty. <i>The work showed a deliberate disregard of the more sensuous and immediately appealing aspects of painting.</i>
<u>smug</u>	Having or showing an excessive pride in oneself or one's achievements. <i>He was feeling smug after his win.</i>
<u>tolerable</u>	Fairly good; mediocre. <i>The climate is at least tolerable.</i>
wow	A joke that seems extremely funny. <i>They wowed audiences on their recent British tour.</i>
yeah	Not only so, but.
<u>yes</u>	An affirmative. <i>Answering with assured and ardent yeses.</i>
