<u>fame</u>	The state or quality of being widely honored and acclaimed. <i>The song s success rocketed him to stardom and fame.</i>
<u>famous</u>	Widely known and esteemed. <i>A famous actor.</i>
formally	In terms of form or structure. <i>Formally complex types of text.</i>

furthermore	In addition; besides (used to introduce a fresh consideration in an argument. <i>Computer chess games are getting cheaper all the time furthermore their quality is improving.</i>
honorary	Of a person holding an honorary title or position. <i>An honorary degree.</i>
identify	Give the name or identifying characteristics of refer to by name or some other identifying characteristic property. <i>The men identified themselves as federal police.</i>
like	Having the same or similar characteristics. <i>I responded in like manner.</i>
likewise	In the same way; also. <i>Some people have little power to do good and have likewise little strength to resist evil.</i>
maybe	A mere possibility or probability. <i>No ifs buts or maybes.</i>
moreover	As a further matter; besides. <i>Moreover statistics show that competition for places is growing.</i>
noted	Well known; famous. <i>A noted patron of the arts.</i>
person	A category used in the classification of pronouns possessive determiners and verb forms according to whether they indicate the speaker first person the addressee second person or a third party third person. <i>I would have publicity photographs on my person at all times.</i>
popular	Liked or admired by many people or by a particular person or group. <i>The popular vote.</i>
prescribed	Set down as a rule or guide. <i>In prescribed order.</i>
recognized	Provided with a secure reputation. <i>His recognized superiority in this kind of work.</i>
renowned	Widely known and esteemed. <i>A renowned author.</i>
reputation	The state of being held in high esteem and honor. <i>His reputation was tarnished by allegations of bribery.</i>
similar	Resembling or similar having the same or some of the same characteristics often used in combination. <i>Northern India and similar areas.</i>
