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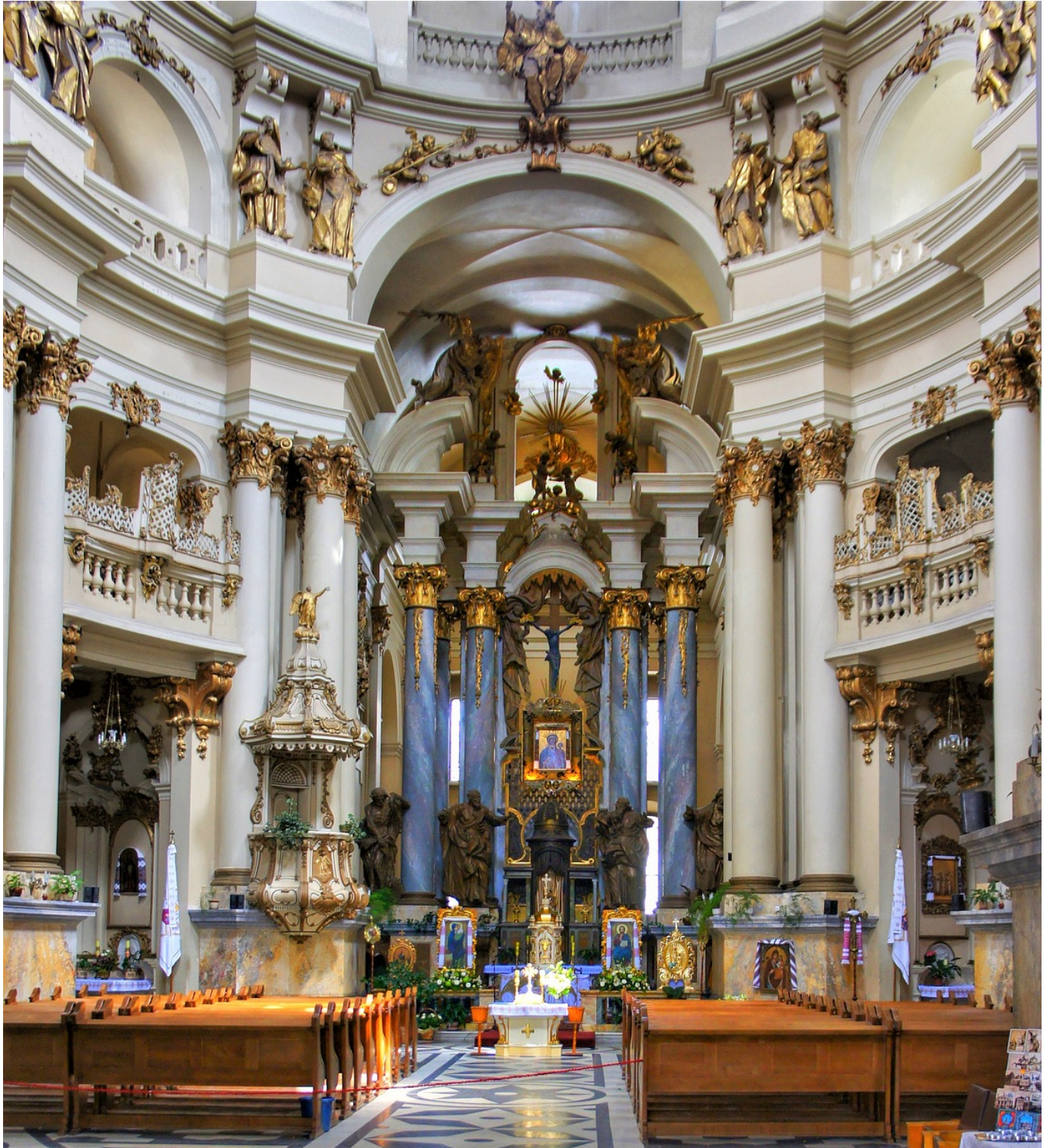

Alterations as a Noun

Definitions of "Alterations" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “alterations” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *An event that occurs when something passes from one state or phase to another.*
- *The act of making something different (as e.g. the size of a garment).*
- *The act of revising or altering (involving reconsideration and modification).*



Synonyms of "Alterations" as a noun (4 Words)

- adjustment** A small alteration or movement made to achieve a desired fit, appearance, or result.
*I ve made a few **adjustments** to my diet.*
- change** Money given in exchange for the same sum in larger units.
*The **change** was intended to increase sales.*
- modification** The grammatical relation that exists when a word qualifies the meaning of the phrase.
*A **modification** of last year s model.*
- revision** A revised edition or form of something.
*The scheme needs drastic **revision**.*



Associations of "Alterations" (30 Words)

adaption	The process of adapting to something (such as environmental conditions.
adjustment	An amount added or deducted on the basis of qualifying circumstances. <i>For many couples there may need to be a period of adjustment.</i>
change	Exchange something with someone else giving one thing and receiving something of the same kind in return. <i>Filters change the ammonia into nitrate.</i>
changeover	An event that results in a transformation. <i>The changeover period.</i>
chromosome	A threadlike strand of DNA in the cell nucleus that carries the genes in a linear order. <i>Humans have 22 chromosome pairs plus two sex chromosomes.</i>
<u>conversion</u>	The changing of real property into personalty, or of joint into separate property, or vice versa. <i>Conversion disorders.</i>
convert	A person who has been converted to another religious or political belief. <i>He was converted in his later years to the socialist cause.</i>
converted	Spiritually reborn or converted. <i>A converted Victorian property.</i>
defection	The state of having rejected your religious beliefs or your political party or a cause (often in favor of opposing beliefs or causes). <i>A number of defections by leading ballet dancers.</i>
disabuse	Persuade (someone) that an idea or belief is mistaken. <i>He quickly disabused me of my fanciful notions.</i>
gene	Genetics a segment of DNA that is involved in producing a polypeptide chain it can include regions preceding and following the coding DNA as well as introns between the exons it is considered a unit of heredity. <i>Playing tennis is in my genes.</i>
metamorphose	Change completely the nature or appearance of. <i>In Kafka s story a person metamorphoses into a bug.</i>
<u>modification</u>	An event that occurs when something passes from one state or phase to another. <i>The neighborhood had undergone few modifications since his last visit years ago.</i>
modify	Add a modifier to a constituent. <i>She may be prepared to modify her views.</i>

modulation	(electronics) the transmission of a signal by using it to vary a carrier wave; changing the carrier's amplitude or frequency or phase. <i>Modulation of the ray amplitude will result in sound being heard.</i>
mutation	A distinct form resulting from genetic mutation. <i>His first novel went through several mutations.</i>
recessive	A recessive trait or gene. <i>Recessive stress is characteristic of British English.</i>
remold	Give new treads to (a tire).
reschedule	Arrange a new scheme of repayments of (a debt). <i>We had to reschedule the doctor's appointment.</i>
revisal	The act of rewriting something.
revise	Revise or reorganize especially for the purpose of updating and improving. <i>The book was published in 1960 and revised in 1968.</i>
revision	The action of revising. <i>It would require a drastic revision of his opinion.</i>
rewrite	Rewrite so as to make fit to suit a new or different purpose. <i>He was constantly demanding rewrites even on the set.</i>
transfigure	Transform into something more beautiful or elevated. <i>The treatment and diet transfigured her into a beautiful young woman.</i>
transformation	A process by which an element in the underlying logical deep structure of a sentence is converted to an element in the surface structure. <i>British society underwent a radical transformation.</i>
transition	Make or undergo a transition from one state or system to another. <i>A transition to multiparty democracy.</i>
transmogrify	Transform in a surprising or magical manner. <i>His home was transmogrified into a hippy crash pad.</i>
transmutation	An act that changes the form or character or substance of something. <i>The transmutation of the political economy of the post war years was complete.</i>
transmute	Alter the nature of (elements). <i>The raw material of his experience was transmuted into stories.</i>
variant	A variable quantity that is random. <i>A variant spelling.</i>
