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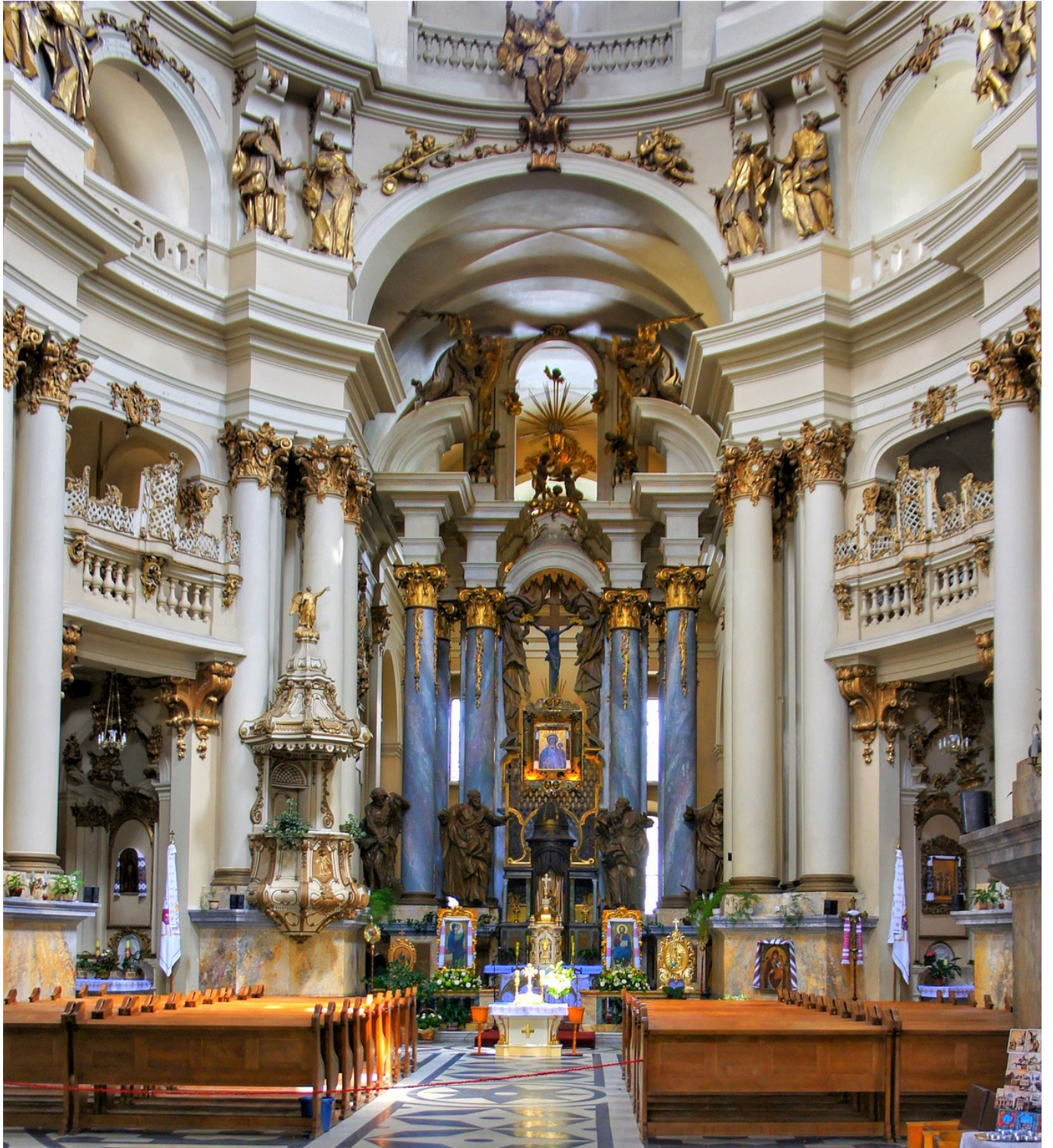
**The synonyms of “Alterations” are: adjustment, modification, change, revision**

## **Alterations as a Noun**

### **Definitions of "Alterations" as a noun**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “alterations” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *An event that occurs when something passes from one state or phase to another.*
- *The act of making something different (as e.g. the size of a garment).*
- *The act of revising or altering (involving reconsideration and modification).*



## Synonyms of "Alterations" as a noun (4 Words)

- adjustment** A small alteration or movement made to achieve a desired fit, appearance, or result.  
*I ve made a few **adjustments** to my diet.*
- change** Money given in exchange for the same sum in larger units.  
*The **change** was intended to increase sales.*
- modification** The grammatical relation that exists when a word qualifies the meaning of the phrase.  
*A **modification** of last year s model.*
- revision** A revised edition or form of something.  
*The scheme needs drastic **revision**.*



## Associations of "Alterations" (30 Words)

<b>adaption</b>	The process of adapting to something (such as environmental conditions.
<b>adjustment</b>	An amount added or deducted on the basis of qualifying circumstances. <i>For many couples there may need to be a period of <b>adjustment</b>.</i>
<b>change</b>	Exchange something with someone else giving one thing and receiving something of the same kind in return. <i>Filters <b>change</b> the ammonia into nitrate.</i>
<b>changeover</b>	An event that results in a transformation. <i>The <b>changeover</b> period.</i>
<b>chromosome</b>	A threadlike strand of DNA in the cell nucleus that carries the genes in a linear order. <i>Humans have 22 <b>chromosome</b> pairs plus two sex <b>chromosomes</b>.</i>
<b><u>conversion</u></b>	The changing of real property into personalty, or of joint into separate property, or vice versa. <i><b>Conversion</b> disorders.</i>
<b>convert</b>	A person who has been converted to another religious or political belief. <i>He was <b>converted</b> in his later years to the socialist cause.</i>
<b>converted</b>	Spiritually reborn or converted. <i>A <b>converted</b> Victorian property.</i>
<b>defection</b>	The state of having rejected your religious beliefs or your political party or a cause (often in favor of opposing beliefs or causes). <i>A number of <b>defections</b> by leading ballet dancers.</i>
<b>disabuse</b>	Persuade (someone) that an idea or belief is mistaken. <i>He quickly <b>disabused</b> me of my fanciful notions.</i>
<b>gene</b>	Genetics a segment of DNA that is involved in producing a polypeptide chain it can include regions preceding and following the coding DNA as well as introns between the exons it is considered a unit of heredity. <i>Playing tennis is in my <b>genes</b>.</i>
<b>metamorphose</b>	Change completely the nature or appearance of. <i>In Kafka s story a person <b>metamorphoses</b> into a bug.</i>
<b><u>modification</u></b>	An event that occurs when something passes from one state or phase to another. <i>The neighborhood had undergone few <b>modifications</b> since his last visit years ago.</i>
<b>modify</b>	Add a modifier to a constituent. <i>She may be prepared to <b>modify</b> her views.</i>

<b>modulation</b>	(electronics) the transmission of a signal by using it to vary a carrier wave; changing the carrier's amplitude or frequency or phase. <i><b>Modulation</b> of the ray amplitude will result in sound being heard.</i>
<b>mutation</b>	A distinct form resulting from genetic mutation. <i>His first novel went through several <b>mutations</b>.</i>
<b>recessive</b>	A recessive trait or gene. <i><b>Recessive</b> stress is characteristic of British English.</i>
<b>remold</b>	Give new treads to (a tire).
<b>reschedule</b>	Arrange a new scheme of repayments of (a debt). <i>We had to <b>reschedule</b> the doctor's appointment.</i>
<b>revisal</b>	The act of rewriting something.
<b>revise</b>	Revise or reorganize especially for the purpose of updating and improving. <i>The book was published in 1960 and <b>revised</b> in 1968.</i>
<b>revision</b>	The action of revising. <i>It would require a drastic <b>revision</b> of his opinion.</i>
<b>rewrite</b>	Rewrite so as to make fit to suit a new or different purpose. <i>He was constantly demanding <b>rewrites</b> even on the set.</i>
<b>transfigure</b>	Transform into something more beautiful or elevated. <i>The treatment and diet <b>transfigured</b> her into a beautiful young woman.</i>
<b>transformation</b>	A process by which an element in the underlying logical deep structure of a sentence is converted to an element in the surface structure. <i>British society underwent a radical <b>transformation</b>.</i>
<b>transition</b>	Make or undergo a transition from one state or system to another. <i>A <b>transition</b> to multiparty democracy.</i>
<b>transmogrify</b>	Transform in a surprising or magical manner. <i>His home was transmogrified into a hippy crash pad.</i>
<b>transmutation</b>	An act that changes the form or character or substance of something. <i>The <b>transmutation</b> of the political economy of the post war years was complete.</i>
<b>transmute</b>	Alter the nature of (elements). <i>The raw material of his experience was <b>transmuted</b> into stories.</i>
<b>variant</b>	A variable quantity that is random. <i>A <b>variant</b> spelling.</i>
