### Definitions of "Altogether" as an adverb

<b>for the most part</b>	Used to form the superlative.
<b>fully</b>	To the greatest degree or extent; completely or entirely; ('full' in this sense is used as a combining form. <i>The evidence amply or <b>fully</b> confirms our suspicions.</i>
<b>generally</b>	By or to most people; widely. <i><b>Generally</b> speaking things have been getting better.</i>
<b>generally speaking</b>	Without distinction of one from others.
<b>in all</b>	To or toward the inside of.
<b>in all respects</b>	To or toward the inside of.
<b>in general</b>	To or toward the inside of.
<b>in sum</b>	To or toward the inside of.
<b>in the main</b>	To or toward the inside of.
<b>in toto</b>	To or toward the inside of.
<b>largely</b>	In large part; mainly or chiefly. <i>These accounts are <b>largely</b> inactive.</i>
<b>mainly</b>	More than anything else. <i>The west will be <b>mainly</b> dry.</i>
<b>mostly</b>	Usually; generally. <i>I made some good friends but <b>mostly</b> met closed minded people.</i>
<b>on the whole</b>	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent ('whole' is often used informally for 'wholly).
<b>overall</b>	Taken as a whole; in all. <i><b>Overall</b> 10 000 jobs will go.</i>
<b>perfectly</b>	In a manner or way that could not be better. <i>You know <b>perfectly</b> well I can't stay.</i>
<b>quite</b>	Actually or truly or to an extreme. <i><b>Quite</b> rich.</i>
<b>right</b>	In the right manner correctly suitably. <i>That serves him <b>right</b>.</i>
<b>thoroughly</b>	Completely and absolutely good is sometimes used informally for thoroughly. <i>He searched the house <b>thoroughly</b>.</i>
<b>to a large extent</b>	With the wind abaft the beam.

<b><u>totally</u></b>	Used to emphasize a clause or statement. <i>A <b>totally</b> new situation.</i>
<b>unconditionally</b>	Not subject to a condition. <i>To be loved <b>unconditionally</b> is to be loved for who we are.</i>
<b>undisputedly</b>	Without question; certainly. <i>He is <b>undisputedly</b> the fastest player in Europe.</i>
<b><u>utterly</u></b>	Completely and without qualification; used informally as intensifiers. <i><b>Utterly</b> miserable.</i>
<b><u>whole</u></b>	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent whole is often used informally for wholly. <i>A <b>whole</b> new idea.</i>
<b><u>wholeheartedly</u></b>	With complete sincerity and commitment. <i>I <b>wholeheartedly</b> support your campaign.</i>
<b><u>wholly</u></b>	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent whole is often used informally for wholly. <i>She found herself given over <b>wholly</b> to sensation.</i>

<b>generic</b>	Lacking imagination or individuality; predictable and unoriginal. <i>The <b>generic</b> name.</i>
<b>infertile</b>	Incapable of reproducing. <i><b>Infertile</b> couples are offered specialist advice.</i>
<b>out-and-out</b>	Directed outward or serving to direct something outward.
<b><u>outright</u></b>	Immediately or instantly. <i>The <b>outright</b> abolition of the death penalty.</i>
<b>perfectly</b>	In a perfect or faultless way. <i>You re <b>perfectly</b> right.</i>
<b>redesign</b>	The action or process of redesigning something. <i>The front seats have been <b>redesigned</b>.</i>

<b><u>unconditional</u></b>	Not subject to any conditions. <b>Unconditional</b> surrender.
<b>undeniably</b>	To an undeniable degree or in an undeniable manner. <i>Effective responsive government <b>undeniably</b> benefits businesses.</i>
<b>unexceptionable</b>	Not open to objection, but not particularly new or exciting. <i>A judge's ethics should be <b>unexceptionable</b>.</i>
<b><u>unmitigated</u></b>	Not diminished or moderated in intensity or severity; sometimes used as an intensifier. <i>An <b>unmitigated</b> lie.</i>
<b><u>unrelated</u></b>	Not connected by kinship. <b>Unrelated</b> facts.
<b>unsuited</b>	Not right or appropriate. <i>He was totally <b>unsuited</b> for the job.</i>
<b><u>utter</u></b>	Express audibly utter sounds not necessarily words. <b>Utter</b> counterfeit currency.
<b><u>utterly</u></b>	Completely and without qualification; absolutely. <b>Utterly</b> miserable.
<b><u>whole</u></b>	Acting together as a single undiversified whole. <i>She wasn't telling the <b>whole</b> truth.</i>
