Synonyms of "Amaze" as a verb (37 Words)

astonish	Affect with wonder. <i>You never fail to astonish me.</i>
astound	Shock or greatly surprise. <i>Her bluntness astounded him.</i>
baffle	Totally bewilder or perplex. <i>An unexplained occurrence that baffled everyone.</i>
beat	Shape by beating. <i>They beat me with a stick and punched me.</i>
benumb	Deprive of physical or emotional feeling. <i>It began with a government campaign of hysteria to confuse and benumb the population.</i>
<u>bewilder</u>	Be a mystery or bewildering to. <i>She was bewildered by his sudden change of mood.</i>

confound	Overthrow (an enemy). <i>God chose to use natural disorders to confound Pharaoh and the gods of Egypt.</i>
daze	Overcome as with astonishment or disbelief. <i>She was dazed by his revelations.</i>
disconcert	Cause to feel embarrassment. <i>The abrupt change of subject disconcerted her.</i>
dismay	Fill with apprehension or alarm; cause to be unpleasantly surprised. <i>They were dismayed by the U turn in policy.</i>
dumbfound	Be a mystery or bewildering to. <i>I was dumbfounded by the low prices there.</i>
flabbergast	Overcome with amazement. <i>News that activists could be fined for protesting against the policy will flabbergast most people.</i>
flummox	Perplex (someone) greatly; bewilder. <i>I was completely flummoxed by the whole thing.</i>
get	Take vengeance on or get even. <i>You can get me at home if you need me.</i>
gravel	Cover with gravel. <i>They gravelled the road.</i>
jolt	Move or cause to move with a sudden jerky motion. <i>The audience was jolted by the play.</i>
leave aghast	Remove oneself from an association with or participation in.
leave open-mouthed	Remove oneself from an association with or participation in.
mystify	Make obscure or mysterious. <i>Lawyers who mystify the legal system so that laymen find it unintelligible.</i>
nonplus	Surprise and confuse (someone) so much that they are unsure how to react. <i>Diane was nonplussed by such an odd question.</i>
perplex	Make more complicated. <i>She was perplexed by her husband s moodiness.</i>
pose	Assume a posture as for artistic purposes. <i>An armed gang posed as policemen to ambush a postman.</i>

puzzle	Be uncertain about; think about without fully understanding or being able to decide. <i>We puzzled over her sudden departure.</i>
shake	Shake or vibrate rapidly and intensively. <i>The escalation in costs is certain to shake the confidence of private investors.</i>
shake up	Undermine or cause to waver.
shatter	Damage or destroy (something abstract). <i>The crisis will shatter their confidence.</i>
shock	Affect with physiological shock or with an electric shock. <i>The revelations shocked the nation.</i>
stagger	Walk with great difficulty. <i>Stagger the chairs in the lecture hall.</i>
startle	To stimulate to action. <i>He was startled to see a column of smoke.</i>
stick	Stick to firmly. <i>Stick the poster onto the wall.</i>
stop someone in their tracks	Prevent completion.
stun	Overcome as with astonishment or disbelief. <i>The news stunned her.</i>
stupefy	Make senseless or dizzy by or as if by a blow. <i>The offence of administering drugs to a woman with intent to stupefy her.</i>
surprise	Cause to be surprised. <i>He surprised an interesting scene.</i>
take aback	Be designed to hold or take.
take someone's breath away	Head into a specified direction.
vex	Disturb the peace of mind of; afflict with mental agitation or distress. <i>I wouldn't vex it will be just great if whoever borrow the pump just bring it back.</i>

- *Your ability to speak six languages amazes me!*
- *She amazed doctors by fighting back when her deteriorating condition caused her to suffer heart failure.*

amazed	Filled with the emotional impact of overwhelming surprise or shock. <i>She shook her head in amazed disbelief.</i>
amazing	Causing great surprise or wonder; astonishing. <i>An amazing number of people registered.</i>
astonish	Affect with wonder. <i>It astonished her that he was so anxious.</i>
<u>astonished</u>	Filled with the emotional impact of overwhelming surprise or shock. <i>I stood enthralled astonished by the vastness and majesty of the cathedral.</i>
<u>astonishing</u>	Extremely surprising or impressive; amazing. <i>Such an enormous response was astonishing.</i>
astound	Shock or greatly surprise. <i>Her bluntness astounded him.</i>

<u>astounding</u>	Surprisingly impressive or notable. <i>An astounding achievement.</i>
awesome	Extremely impressive or daunting; inspiring awe. <i>The band is truly awesome.</i>
bemuse	Puzzle, confuse, or bewilder (someone). <i>He was bemused by what was happening.</i>
<u>blank</u>	A blank gap or missing part. <i>I just blanked them and walked out.</i>
<u>daze</u>	Overcome as with astonishment or disbelief. <i>His mother's death left him in a daze.</i>
<u>flabbergasted</u>	As if struck dumb with astonishment and surprise. <i>The flabbergasted aldermen were speechless.</i>
incredible	Impossible to believe. <i>An almost incredible tale of triumph and tragedy.</i>
<u>marvelous</u>	Being or having the character of a miracle. <i>A marvelous collection of rare books.</i>
<u>puzzled</u>	Unable to understand; perplexed. <i>The questioners were met with puzzled looks.</i>
quizzical	(of a person's expression or behaviour) indicating mild or amused puzzlement. <i>One of the most quizzical movies ever made.</i>
redoubtable	(of a person) formidable, especially as an opponent. <i>Born of a redoubtable family.</i>
serendipity	The occurrence and development of events by chance in a happy or beneficial way. <i>A fortunate stroke of serendipity.</i>
<u>shattered</u>	Exhausted. <i>Our shattered dreams of peace and prosperity.</i>
shock	Collect or gather into shocks. <i>The news of the bombing shocked her.</i>
<u>shocked</u>	Struck with fear, dread, or consternation.
<u>shocking</u>	Glaringly vivid and graphic; marked by sensationalism. <i>I've got a shocking cold.</i>
<u>staggering</u>	Deeply shocking; astonishing. <i>The amount of money required was staggering.</i>
<u>startle</u>	Cause to feel sudden shock or alarm. <i>He was startled to see a column of smoke.</i>

stun	Knock unconscious or into a dazed or semi-conscious state. <i>The community was stunned by the tragedy.</i>
stupefy	Astonish and shock. <i>The amount they spend on clothes would appal their parents and stupefy their grandparents.</i>
surprise	Cause to be surprised. <i>Joe was surprised that he enjoyed the journey.</i>
surprised	Taken unawares or suddenly and feeling wonder or astonishment. <i>Surprised by her student s ingenuity.</i>
surprising	Causing surprise or wonder or amazement. <i>She earned a surprising amount of money.</i>
wondering	Characterized by or expressive of admiration and amazement. <i>Peter listened with an air of wondering astonishment.</i>
