- *Affect with wonder.*



## Synonyms of "Amaze" as a verb (37 Words)

<b>astonish</b>	Affect with wonder. <i>You never fail to <b>astonish</b> me.</i>
<b>astound</b>	Shock or greatly surprise. <i>Her bluntness <b>astounded</b> him.</i>
<b>baffle</b>	Totally bewilder or perplex. <i>An unexplained occurrence that <b>baffled</b> everyone.</i>
<b>beat</b>	Shape by beating. <i>They <b>beat</b> me with a stick and punched me.</i>
<b>benumb</b>	Deprive of physical or emotional feeling. <i>It began with a government campaign of hysteria to confuse and <b>benumb</b> the population.</i>
<b><u>bewilder</u></b>	Be a mystery or bewildering to. <i>She was <b>bewildered</b> by his sudden change of mood.</i>

<b>confound</b>	Overthrow (an enemy). <i>God chose to use natural disorders to <b>confound</b> Pharaoh and the gods of Egypt.</i>
<b>daze</b>	Overcome as with astonishment or disbelief. <i>She was <b>dazed</b> by his revelations.</i>
<b>disconcert</b>	Cause to feel embarrassment. <i>The abrupt change of subject <b>disconcerted</b> her.</i>
<b>dismay</b>	Fill with apprehension or alarm; cause to be unpleasantly surprised. <i>They were <b>dismayed</b> by the U turn in policy.</i>
<b>dumbfound</b>	Be a mystery or bewildering to. <i>I was <b>dumbfounded</b> by the low prices there.</i>
<b>flabbergast</b>	Overcome with amazement. <i>News that activists could be fined for protesting against the policy will <b>flabbergast</b> most people.</i>
<b>flummox</b>	Perplex (someone) greatly; bewilder. <i>I was completely <b>flummoxed</b> by the whole thing.</i>
<b>get</b>	Take vengeance on or get even. <i>You can <b>get</b> me at home if you need me.</i>
<b>gravel</b>	Cover with gravel. <i>They <b>gravelled</b> the road.</i>
<b>jolt</b>	Move or cause to move with a sudden jerky motion. <i>The audience was <b>jolted</b> by the play.</i>
<b>leave aghast</b>	Remove oneself from an association with or participation in.
<b>leave open-mouthed</b>	Remove oneself from an association with or participation in.
<b>mystify</b>	Make obscure or mysterious. <i>Lawyers who <b>mystify</b> the legal system so that laymen find it unintelligible.</i>
<b>nonplus</b>	Surprise and confuse (someone) so much that they are unsure how to react. <i>Diane was <b>nonplussed</b> by such an odd question.</i>
<b>perplex</b>	Make more complicated. <i>She was <b>perplexed</b> by her husband s moodiness.</i>
<b>pose</b>	Assume a posture as for artistic purposes. <i>An armed gang <b>posed</b> as policemen to ambush a postman.</i>

<b>puzzle</b>	Be uncertain about; think about without fully understanding or being able to decide. <i>We <b>puzzled</b> over her sudden departure.</i>
<b>shake</b>	Shake or vibrate rapidly and intensively. <i>The escalation in costs is certain to <b>shake</b> the confidence of private investors.</i>
<b>shake up</b>	Undermine or cause to waver.
<b>shatter</b>	Damage or destroy (something abstract). <i>The crisis will <b>shatter</b> their confidence.</i>
<b>shock</b>	Affect with physiological shock or with an electric shock. <i>The revelations <b>shocked</b> the nation.</i>
<b>stagger</b>	Walk with great difficulty. <i><b>Stagger</b> the chairs in the lecture hall.</i>
<b>startle</b>	To stimulate to action. <i>He was <b>startled</b> to see a column of smoke.</i>
<b>stick</b>	Stick to firmly. <i><b>Stick</b> the poster onto the wall.</i>
<b>stop someone in their tracks</b>	Prevent completion.
<b>stun</b>	Overcome as with astonishment or disbelief. <i>The news <b>stunned</b> her.</i>
<b>stupefy</b>	Make senseless or dizzy by or as if by a blow. <i>The offence of administering drugs to a woman with intent to <b>stupefy</b> her.</i>
<b>surprise</b>	Cause to be surprised. <i>He <b>surprised</b> an interesting scene.</i>
<b>take aback</b>	Be designed to hold or take.
<b>take someone's breath away</b>	Head into a specified direction.
<b>vex</b>	Disturb the peace of mind of; afflict with mental agitation or distress. <i>I wouldn't <b>vex</b> it will be just great if whoever borrow the pump just bring it back.</i>



## Usage Examples of "Amaze" as a verb

- *He has been amazed by the quality of the employees at the bank.*
- *Your ability to speak six languages amazes me!*
- *She amazed doctors by fighting back when her deteriorating condition caused her to suffer heart failure.*



## Associations of "Amaze" (30 Words)

<b>amazed</b>	Filled with the emotional impact of overwhelming surprise or shock. <i>She shook her head in <b>amazed</b> disbelief.</i>
<b>amazing</b>	Causing great surprise or wonder; astonishing. <i>An <b>amazing</b> number of people registered.</i>
<b>astonish</b>	Affect with wonder. <i>It <b>astonished</b> her that he was so anxious.</i>
<b><u>astonished</u></b>	Filled with the emotional impact of overwhelming surprise or shock. <i>I stood enthralled <b>astonished</b> by the vastness and majesty of the cathedral.</i>

<b><u>astounding</u></b>	Surprisingly impressive or notable. <i>An <b>astounding</b> achievement.</i>
<b>awesome</b>	Extremely impressive or daunting; inspiring awe. <i>The band is truly <b>awesome</b>.</i>
<b>bemuse</b>	Puzzle, confuse, or bewilder (someone). <i>He was <b>bemused</b> by what was happening.</i>
<b><u>blank</u></b>	A blank gap or missing part. <i>I just <b>blanked</b> them and walked out.</i>
<b><u>daze</u></b>	Overcome as with astonishment or disbelief. <i>His mother's death left him in a <b>daze</b>.</i>
<b><u>flabbergasted</u></b>	As if struck dumb with astonishment and surprise. <i>The <b>flabbergasted</b> aldermen were speechless.</i>
<b>incredible</b>	Impossible to believe. <i>An almost <b>incredible</b> tale of triumph and tragedy.</i>
<b><u>marvelous</u></b>	Being or having the character of a miracle. <i>A <b>marvelous</b> collection of rare books.</i>
<b><u>puzzled</u></b>	Unable to understand; perplexed. <i>The questioners were met with <b>puzzled</b> looks.</i>
<b>quizzical</b>	(of a person's expression or behaviour) indicating mild or amused puzzlement. <i>One of the most <b>quizzical</b> movies ever made.</i>
<b>redoubtable</b>	(of a person) formidable, especially as an opponent. <i>Born of a <b>redoubtable</b> family.</i>
<b>serendipity</b>	The occurrence and development of events by chance in a happy or beneficial way. <i>A fortunate stroke of <b>serendipity</b>.</i>
<b><u>shattered</u></b>	Exhausted. <i>Our <b>shattered</b> dreams of peace and prosperity.</i>
<b>shock</b>	Collect or gather into shocks. <i>The news of the bombing <b>shocked</b> her.</i>
<b><u>shocked</u></b>	Struck with fear, dread, or consternation.
<b><u>shocking</u></b>	Glaringly vivid and graphic; marked by sensationalism. <i>I've got a <b>shocking</b> cold.</i>
<b><u>staggering</u></b>	Deeply shocking; astonishing. <i>The amount of money required was <b>staggering</b>.</i>
<b><u>startle</u></b>	Cause to feel sudden shock or alarm. <i>He was <b>startled</b> to see a column of smoke.</i>

<b>stun</b>	Knock unconscious or into a dazed or semi-conscious state. <i>The community was <b>stunned</b> by the tragedy.</i>
<b>stupefy</b>	Astonish and shock. <i>The amount they spend on clothes would appal their parents and <b>stupefy</b> their grandparents.</i>
<b>surprise</b>	Cause to be surprised. <i>Joe was <b>surprised</b> that he enjoyed the journey.</i>
<b>surprised</b>	Taken unawares or suddenly and feeling wonder or astonishment. <i><b>Surprised</b> by her student s ingenuity.</i>
<b>surprising</b>	Causing surprise or wonder or amazement. <i>She earned a <b>surprising</b> amount of money.</i>
<b>wondering</b>	Characterized by or expressive of admiration and amazement. <i>Peter listened with an air of <b>wondering</b> astonishment.</i>
