- *The feeling that accompanies something extremely surprising.*



## Synonyms of "Amazement" as a noun (17 Words)

<b>astonishment</b>	Great surprise. <i>He looked at me in <b>astonishment</b>.</i>
<b><u>awe</u></b>	Capacity to inspire awe. <i>He stared over the edge with a feeling of <b>awe</b>.</i>
<b>bafflement</b>	A flat plate that controls or directs the flow of fluid or energy. <i>Most people experience a sense of <b>bafflement</b> about how anyone could carry out such a heinous deed.</i>
<b><u>bewilderment</u></b>	Confusion resulting from failure to understand. <i>There was <b>bewilderment</b> at the shift of government policy.</i>



<b>confusion</b>	An act causing a disorderly combination of elements with identities lost and distinctions blended. <i>The army retreated in <b>confusion</b>.</i>
<b>consternation</b>	Fear resulting from the awareness of danger. <i>To her <b>consternation</b> her car wouldn't start.</i>
<b>devastation</b>	The state of being decayed or destroyed. <i>She spoke of her <b>devastation</b> at his death.</i>
<b><u>disbelief</u></b>	Inability or refusal to accept that something is true or real. <i>Laura shook her head in <b>disbelief</b>.</i>
<b>dismay</b>	Fear resulting from the awareness of danger. <i>To his <b>dismay</b> she left him.</i>
<b>incredulity</b>	Doubt about the truth of something. <i>He stared down the street in <b>incredulity</b>.</i>
<b>perplexity</b>	Inability to deal with or understand something. <i>She paused in <b>perplexity</b>.</i>
<b>shock</b>	A reflex response to the passage of electric current through the body. <i>It was a <b>shock</b> to face such hostile attitudes.</i>
<b>speechlessness</b>	The property of being speechless.
<b>stupefaction</b>	Marginal consciousness. <i>Salesmen stood in bored <b>stupefaction</b>.</i>
<b>surprise</b>	A feeling of mild astonishment or shock caused by something unexpected. <i><b>Surprise</b> major.</i>
<b>wonder</b>	Something that causes feelings of wonder. <i>We all eat cakes from Gisella she's a <b>wonder</b>.</i>
<b>wonderment</b>	A state of awed admiration or respect. <i>Corbett shook his head in silent <b>wonderment</b>.</i>



## Usage Examples of "Amazement" as a noun

- *She shook her head in amazement.*
- *To her amazement, Bill was keen.*



## Associations of "Amazement" (30 Words)

<b>amaze</b>	Surprise (someone) greatly; fill with astonishment. <i>He has been <b>amazed</b> by the quality of the employees at the bank.</i>
<b>astonish</b>	Affect with wonder. <i>You never fail to <b>astonish</b> me.</i>
<b>astonishment</b>	Great surprise. <i>He looked at me in <b>astonishment</b>.</i>
<b>astound</b>	Shock or greatly surprise. <i>Her bluntness <b>astounded</b> him.</i>

<b><u>astounding</u></b>	So surprisingly impressive as to stun or overwhelm. An <b>astounding</b> achievement.
<b><u>awe</u></b>	Inspire with awe. <i>Is it any wonder that Christmas Eve has lost its <b>awe</b>.</i>
<b>awesome</b>	Inspiring awe or admiration or wonder. <i>The <b>awesome</b> complexity of the universe.</i>
<b><u>bewilderment</u></b>	A feeling of being perplexed and confused. <i>There was <b>bewilderment</b> at the shift of government policy.</i>
<b>comma</b>	Anglewing butterfly with a comma shaped mark on the underside of each hind wing.
<b>confusion</b>	A disorderly jumble. <i>The army retreated in <b>confusion</b>.</i>
<b><u>daze</u></b>	(especially of an emotional or physical shock) make (someone) unable to think or react properly. <i>She was <b>dazed</b> by his revelations.</i>
<b><u>disbelief</u></b>	A rejection of belief. <i>I ll burn in hell for <b>disbelief</b>.</i>
<b><u>exclamation</u></b>	An exclamatory rhetorical device. <i>She gave an <b>exclamation</b> of delight.</i>
<b><u>flabbergasted</u></b>	As if struck dumb with astonishment and surprise. <i>This news has left me totally <b>flabbergasted</b>.</i>
<b>gasp</b>	Strain to obtain air by gasping. <i>It s beautiful she <b>gasp</b>ed much impressed.</i>
<b>incredible</b>	Beyond belief or understanding. <i>An almost <b>incredible</b> tale of triumph and tragedy.</i>
<b>incredulity</b>	Doubt about the truth of something. <i>He stared down the street in <b>incredulity</b>.</i>
<b>mystification</b>	The activity of obscuring people's understanding, leaving them baffled or bewildered.
<b>outcry</b>	A loud utterance; often in protest or opposition. <i>An <b>outcry</b> of spontaneous passion.</i>
<b>pant</b>	Run or go in a specified direction while panting. <i>He was <b>panting</b> when he reached the top.</i>
<b><u>puff</u></b>	A light inflated pastry or puff shell. <i><b>Puff</b> a cigar.</i>
<b>punctuate</b>	Occur at intervals throughout (an area or period). <i>The country s history has been <b>punctuated</b> by coups.</i>



<b>punctuation</b>	The marks, such as full stop, comma, and brackets, used in writing to separate sentences and their elements and to clarify meaning. <i>You will notice that no <b>punctuation</b> is used.</i>
<b>serendipity</b>	The occurrence and development of events by chance in a happy or beneficial way. <i>A fortunate stroke of <b>serendipity</b>.</i>
<u><b>startle</b></u>	A sudden involuntary movement. <i>She <b>startled</b> when I walked into the room.</i>
<b>stun</b>	Knock unconscious or into a dazed or semi-conscious state. <i>The news <b>stunned</b> her.</i>
<b>stupefy</b>	Make senseless or dizzy by or as if by a blow. <i>The amount they spend on clothes would appal their parents and <b>stupefy</b> their grandparents.</i>
<b>surprise</b>	Cause to be surprised. <i>The announcement came as a complete <b>surprise</b>.</i>
<b>surprised</b>	Feeling or showing surprise. <i>There was a <b>surprised</b> silence.</i>
<b>wonder</b>	Something that causes feelings of wonder. <i>Athens was a place of <b>wonder</b> and beauty.</i>
