Associations of "Ambulance" (30 Words)

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| ablaze | Lighted up by or as by fire or flame. <i>His face all ablaze with excitement.</i> |
| blaze | Indicate by marking trees with blazes. <i>Meteors blazed across the atmosphere.</i> |
| bleeding | The flow of blood from a ruptured blood vessel. <i>The watch was a bleeding copy.</i> |
| brake | Cause to stop by applying the brakes. <i>We had to brake suddenly when a chicken crossed the road.</i> An incidental expense. |
| contingency | <i>The island s public affairs can occasionally be seen to be invaded by contingency.</i> |
| crisis | A time of intense difficulty or danger. <i>The current economic crisis.</i> |
| danger | A dangerous place. <i>There was a danger he would do the wrong thing.</i> |
| deliverance | The action of being rescued or set free. <i>The low drawl he employed for such deliverances.</i> |
| driver | A golfer who hits the golf ball with a driver. <i>Mule drivers.</i> |
| emergency | Arising from or used in an emergency. <i>Survival packs were carried in case of emergency.</i> |
| emergent | An emergent tree or other plant. <i>Knowledge is an emergent of this interactive process.</i> |
| entreaty | Earnest or urgent request. <i>An entreaty to stop the fighting.</i> |
| evacuate | Excrete or discharge from the body. <i>After the earthquake residents were evacuated.</i> |

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| evacuation | A quantity of matter discharged from the bowels or another bodily organ. <i>Those who required an evacuation of retained products.</i> |
| exigency | A sudden unforeseen crisis (usually involving danger) that requires immediate action. <i>He put financial exigency before personal sentiment.</i> |
| <u>exigent</u> | Pressing; demanding. <i>The exigent demands of her contemporaries music took a toll on her voice.</i> |
| extinguish | Extinguish by crushing. <i>Too big to be extinguished at once the forest fires at best could be contained.</i> |
| firefighter | A member of a fire department who tries to extinguish fires. |
| fireman | A laborer who tends fires (as on a coal-fired train or steamship). |
| <u>imperative</u> | Relating to verbs in the imperative mood. <i>Immediate action was imperative.</i> |
| inquest | An inquiry by a coroner's court into the cause of a death. <i>An inquest by New York newspapers into a subway fire.</i> |
| <u>instant</u> | Instant coffee. <i>Your letter of the 6th instant.</i> |
| medic | A medical practitioner or student. |
| paramedic | A person trained to give emergency medical care to people who are injured or ill, typically in a setting outside a hospital. <i>A paramedic team was on its way.</i> |
| pressing | The act of pressing the exertion of pressure. <i>Pure grade olive oil is the product of the second or third pressings.</i> |
| <u>prioritize</u> | Assign a priority to. <i>Age affects the way people prioritize their goals.</i> |
| suffocation | The condition of being deprived of oxygen (as by having breathing stopped). <i>The occupants died of suffocation inside the airtight compartment.</i> |
| tourniquet | A device for stopping the flow of blood through a vein or artery, typically by compressing a limb with a cord or tight bandage. |
| urgency | The state of being urgent; an earnest and insistent necessity. <i>The discovery of the ozone hole gave urgency to the issue of CFCs.</i> |
| urgent | Of an action or event done or arranged in response to an urgent situation. <i>Bridges in urgent need of repair.</i> |
