acquiescent	Willing to carry out the orders or wishes of another without protest. <i>His acquiescent mood.</i>
biddable	Willing to carry out the orders or wishes of another without protest. <i>A biddable sweet natured child.</i>
complaisant	Showing a cheerful willingness to do favors for others. <i>There are too many complaisant doctors signing sick notes.</i>
compliant	Inclined to comply. <i>Food that is compliant with safety regulations.</i>
conformable	(of strata in contact) deposited in a continuous sequence, and having the same direction of stratification. <i>I have been to you a true and humble wife at all times to your will conformable.</i>
controllable	Capable of being safely regulated or limited. <i>Discontent began to give way to barely controllable rage.</i>
<u>docile</u>	Willing to be taught or led or supervised or directed. <i>She s a black Labrador gentle and docile.</i>
<u>flexible</u>	(of a person) ready and able to change so as to adapt to different circumstances. <i>Small businesses which are dependent on flexible working hours.</i>
governable	Capable of being controlled.
<u>malleable</u>	Easily influenced; pliable. <i>They are as malleable and easily led as sheep.</i>
<u>manageable</u>	Able to be controlled or dealt with without difficulty. <i>Her long hair was black wavy and manageable.</i>
<u>meek</u>	Humble in spirit or manner; suggesting retiring mildness or even cowed submissiveness. <i>Meek as a mouse.</i>
<u>obedient</u>	Complying or willing to comply with an order or request; submissive to another's authority. <i>A docile and obedient dog.</i>
persuadable	Being susceptible to persuasion. <i>They need to identify the most persuadable voters.</i>
pliant	Capable of being bent or flexed or twisted without breaking. <i>Pliant molten glass.</i>

reactive	Showing an immune response to a specific antigen. <i>Nitrogen dioxide is a highly reactive gas.</i>
<u>receptive</u>	Open to arguments, ideas, or change. <i>The paper is ink receptive.</i>
<u>responsive</u>	Containing or using responses; alternating. <i>Children are often the quickest and most responsive members of the audience.</i>
submissive	Abjectly submissive characteristic of a slave or servant S H Adams. Submissive servants.
<u>susceptible</u>	(of a person) easily influenced by feelings or emotions; sensitive. <i>Patients with liver disease may be susceptible to infection.</i>
tame	(of a plant) produced by cultivation. Tame obedience.
<u>tractable</u>	Responsive to suggestions and influences. Tractable young minds.
<u>vulnerable</u>	(of a person) in need of special care, support, or protection because of age, disability, or risk of abuse or neglect. Vulnerable parts of the body.

dominated	Controlled or ruled by superior authority or power.

<u>meek</u>	Evidencing little spirit or courage; overly submissive or compliant. <i>She looked meek but had the heart of a lion.</i>
<u>obedience</u>	Observance of a monastic rule. <i>Obedience to moral standards.</i>
<u>obedient</u>	Complying or willing to comply with an order or request; submissive to another's authority. <i>The obedient colonies are heavily taxed the refractory remain unburdened.</i>
subdued	Not brilliant or glaring. <i>Subdued lights and soft music.</i>
submissive	Abjectly submissive characteristic of a slave or servant S H Adams. <i>Submissive servants.</i>
subservience	Abject or cringing submissiveness. <i>Blind subservience to authority.</i>

- tractability** The trait of being easily persuaded.
- tractable** Responsive to suggestions and influences.
*The natives being of an intelligent **tractable** disposition.*
- willing** The act of making a choice.
