## **Amend as a Verb**

### **Definitions of "Amend" as a verb**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “amend” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Put right.*
- *Make minor changes to (a text, piece of legislation, etc.) in order to make it fairer or more accurate, or to reflect changing circumstances.*
- *Make amendments to.*
- *Set straight or right.*
- *To make better.*
- *Improve the texture or fertility of (soil).*



## Synonyms of "Amend" as a verb (30 Words)

### adapt

Adapt or conform oneself to new or different conditions.  
*Hospitals have had to be **adapted** for modern medical practice.*

### **adjust**

Adapt or become used to a new situation.  
*A single control **adjusts** the water flow.*

### alter

Make an alteration to.  
*Eliot was persuaded to **alter** the passage.*

### ameliorate

To make better.  
*The reform did much to **ameliorate** living standards.*

### **better**

To make better.  
*His account can hardly be **bettered**.*

### **change**

Change clothes put on different clothes.  
*The nature of the industry is likely to **change**.*

<b>correct</b>	Make right or correct. <i>The Council issued a statement <b>correcting</b> some points in the press reports.</i>
<b>deal with</b>	Come to terms with.
<b>fix</b>	Decide upon or fix definitely. <i>He perfected a process of <b>fixing</b> a photographic likeness on a silver plate.</i>
<b>improve</b>	To make better. <i>Efforts to <b>improve</b> relations between the countries.</i>
<b>make good</b>	Cause to do; cause to act in a specified manner.
<b>meliorate</b>	To make better.
<b>mend</b>	Improve (an unpleasant situation). <i>Foot injuries can take months to <b>mend</b>.</i>
<b>modify</b>	Transform (a structure) from its original anatomical form during development or evolution. <i>Please <b>modify</b> this letter to make it more polite.</i>
<b>put right</b>	Formulate in a particular style or language.
<b>put to rights</b>	Cause (someone) to undergo something.
<b>qualify</b>	Make (someone) competent or knowledgeable enough to do something. <i><b>Qualify</b> these remarks.</i>
<b>rectify</b>	Reduce to a fine, unmixed, or pure state; separate from extraneous matter or cleanse from impurities. <i><b>Rectify</b> the inequities in salaries.</i>
<b>redress</b>	Make reparations or amends for. <i>The power to <b>redress</b> the grievances of our citizens.</i>
<b>remediate</b>	Restore by reversing or stopping environmental damage. <i>Use of plants to <b>remediate</b> soils contaminated with heavy metals.</i>
<b>remedy</b>	Set right (an undesirable situation). <i>Money will be given to <b>remedy</b> the poor funding of nurseries.</i>
<b>repair</b>	Put right (an unwelcome situation). <i>This treatment <b>repaired</b> my health.</i>
<b>resolve</b>	(with reference to a discord) pass or cause to pass into a concord during the course of harmonic change. <i>Can this image be <b>resolved</b>.</i>
<b>restore</b>	Restore by replacing a part or putting together what is torn or broken. <i>The week at the spa <b>restored</b> me.</i>
<b>revise</b>	Revise or reorganize especially for the purpose of updating and improving. <i>He had cause to <b>revise</b> his opinion a moment after expressing it.</i>

<b>set right</b>	Become gelatinous.
<b>set to rights</b>	Apply or start.
<b>solve</b>	Settle, as of a debt. <i>Did you <b>solve</b> the problem.</i>
<b>sort out</b>	Arrange or order by classes or categories.
<b>straighten out</b>	Straighten by unrolling.



### Usage Examples of "Amend" as a verb

- *Amend the document.*
- *The rule was amended to apply only to non-members.*
- *Amend your soil with peat moss or compost.*
- *A few things had gone wrong, but these had been amended.*



## Associations of "Amend" (30 Words)

### adapt

Adapt or conform oneself to new or different conditions.  
*The film was **adapted** from a Turgenev short story.*

### adaptation

The responsive adjustment of a sense organ (as the eye) to varying conditions (as of light).  
*A three part **adaptation** of Hard Times.*

### adaption

The process of adapting to something (such as environmental conditions).

### adjust

Adapt or become used to a new situation.  
*We must **adjust** to the bad economic situation.*

### adjustment

The act of adjusting something to match a standard.  
*For many couples there may need to be a period of **adjustment**.*

### alter

Make an alteration to.  
*Plans to **alter** the dining hall.*

### constitution

The constitution written at the Constitutional Convention in Philadelphia in 1787 and subsequently ratified by the original thirteen states.  
*Pregnancy had weakened her **constitution**.*

<b>correct</b>	Socially right or correct. <i>Motorists can have their headlights tested and <b>corrected</b> at a reduced price on Saturday.</i>
<b>disabuse</b>	Free somebody (from an erroneous belief). <i>He quickly <b>disabused</b> me of my fanciful notions.</i>
<b>emend</b>	Alter (something that is incorrect). <i>These studies show him collating manuscripts and <b>emending</b> texts.</i>
<b>fix</b>	Make fixed stable or stationary. <i>Having made landfall he <b>fixed</b> his position.</i>
<b>heal</b>	Get healthy again. <i>The quack pretended to <b>heal</b> patients but never managed to.</i>
<b>improve</b>	To make better. <i>The editor <b>improved</b> the manuscript with his changes.</i>
<b>manually</b>	By hand. <i>Change channels <b>manually</b> rather than using the remote control.</i>
<b>metamorphose</b>	Change or cause to change completely in form or nature. <i>Feed the larvae to your fish before they <b>metamorphose</b> into adults.</i>
<b>modify</b>	Add a modifier to a constituent. <i>Please <b>modify</b> this letter to make it more polite.</i>
<b>modulation</b>	A change from one key to another in a piece of music. <i>Researchers observed the <b>modulation</b> of electrical conductance.</i>
<b>ratification</b>	The action of signing or giving formal consent to a treaty, contract, or agreement, making it officially valid. <i><b>Ratification</b> of the treaty raised problems in several member states.</i>
<b>ratify</b>	Sign or give formal consent to (a treaty, contract, or agreement), making it officially valid. <i>Both countries were due to <b>ratify</b> the treaty by the end of the year.</i>
<b>rectify</b>	Set straight or right. <i>We are working to <b>rectify</b> the situation.</i>
<b>reform</b>	The action or process of reforming an institution or practice. <i><b>Reform</b> gas.</i>
<b>reschedule</b>	Change the time of (a planned event). <i>They <b>rescheduled</b> external debts to improve their economic situation.</i>
<b>retouch</b>	Give retouches to hair. <i><b>Retouch</b> the roots.</i>
<b>revamp</b>	Provide (a shoe) with a new vamp. <i>An attempt to <b>revamp</b> the museum s image.</i>

<b>revisal</b>	The act of rewriting something.
<b>revise</b>	Revise or reorganize especially for the purpose of updating and improving. <i>He had cause to <b>revise</b> his opinion a moment after expressing it.</i>
<b>rewrite</b>	Rewrite so as to make fit to suit a new or different purpose. <i><b>Rewrite</b> after <b>rewrite</b> was drafted to ensure the final version would pass muster.</i>
<b>transfigure</b>	Transform into something more beautiful or elevated. <i>Jesus was <b>transfigured</b> after his resurrection.</i>
<b>transformation</b>	A metamorphosis during the life cycle of an animal. <i>British society underwent a radical <b>transformation</b>.</i>
<b>validation</b>	The action of checking or proving the validity or accuracy of something. <i>The technique requires <b>validation</b> in controlled trials.</i>
