Amendment as a Noun

Definitions of "Amendment" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “amendment” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The act of amending or correcting.*
- *A minor change or addition designed to improve a text, piece of legislation, etc.*
- *An article added to the US Constitution.*
- *A statement that is added to or revises or improves a proposal or document (a bill or constitution etc.*
- *Something which is added to soil in order to improve its texture or fertility.*



Synonyms of "Amendment" as a noun (7 Words)

- adaptation** A written work (as a novel) that has been recast in a new form.
*Living in groups is an **adaptation** to increase the efficiency of hunting.*
- adjustment** The process of adapting to something (such as environmental conditions).
*I've made a few **adjustments** to my diet.*
- alteration** An event that occurs when something passes from one state or phase to another.
***Alterations** had to be made.*
- change** Money given in exchange for the same sum in larger units.
*The **change** of government had no impact on the economy.*
- modification** A change made.
*The parts supplied should fit with little or no **modification**.*
- qualification** The qualification stage of a sporting event.
*I left school at 15 with no **qualifications**.*

revision

The act of revising or altering (involving reconsideration and modification).
*A **revision** of the Hegelian concept of history.*



Usage Examples of "Amendment" as a noun

- *An amendment to existing bail laws.*
- *You can add some soil-texturizing amendments to improve soil drainage.*
- *The First Amendment.*

constitution	The constitution written at the Constitutional Convention in Philadelphia in 1787 and subsequently ratified by the original thirteen states. <i>The constitution of a PTA group last year.</i>

<u>constitutional</u>	Constitutional in the structure of something especially your physical makeup. <i>She went out for a constitutional.</i>
decriminalize	Make legal. <i>A battle to decriminalize cannabis.</i>
enable	Make (something) possible. <i>Each of them has wheels to enable easy transportation.</i>
enabling	Providing legal power or sanction. <i>An enabling resolution.</i>
enact	Put into practice (an idea or suggestion). <i>Walkers stopped to watch aware that some tragedy was being enacted.</i>
enactment	An instance of acting something out. <i>Enactments covering food safety.</i>
enforcement	The act of compelling observance of or compliance with a law, rule, or obligation. <i>The strict enforcement of environmental regulations.</i>
extraterritorial	(of a law or decree) valid outside a country's territory. <i>Extraterritorial industrial zones.</i>
jurisdiction	(law) the right and power to interpret and apply the law. <i>The English court had no jurisdiction over the defendants.</i>
jurisprudence	The collection of rules imposed by authority. <i>American jurisprudence.</i>
<u>law</u>	An individual rule as part of a system of law. <i>They were taken to court for breaking the law.</i>
<u>lawful</u>	Of a child born within a lawful marriage. <i>The true and lawful king.</i>
legal	Relating to theological legalism. <i>A legal pass receiver.</i>
legality	The quality or state of being in accordance with the law. <i>Documentation testifying to the legality of the arms sale.</i>
legalize	Make legal. <i>The Swiss parliament legalized cannabis.</i>
legislation	The process of making or enacting laws. <i>It will require legislation to change this situation.</i>
legitimate	Show or affirm to be just and legitimate. <i>The legitimate theatre.</i>

legitimately	In a way that can be defended with logic or justification; fairly. <i>A legitimately elected government.</i>
licit	Not forbidden; lawful. <i>Usage patterns differ between licit and illicit drugs.</i>
ordinance	A religious rite. <i>His strict observance of religious ordinances was no doubt quickened by the remorse he felt.</i>
parliamentary	Relating to or having the nature of a parliament. <i>Parliamentary law.</i>
polygamy	A pattern of mating in which an animal has more than one mate.
reenact	Enact again. <i>Congress reenacted the law.</i>
<u>reformation</u>	Rescuing from error and returning to a rightful course. <i>The reformation of the Senate.</i>
regulation	In accordance with regulations of the correct type. <i>The regulation of financial markets.</i>
rule	A rule describing or prescribing a linguistic practice. <i>The tenth House ruled by Saturn and associated with Capricorn.</i>
statutory	Prescribed or authorized by or punishable under a statute. <i>The statutory Christmas phone call to his mother.</i>
