comforts The act of consoling; giving relief in affliction.
*All the **comforts** of home.*

conveniences A device or control that is very useful for a particular job.

creature comforts A human being; `wight' is an archaic term.

activity A thermodynamic quantity representing the effective concentration of a particular component in a solution or other system equal to its concentration multiplied by an activity coefficient.
*Respiratory **activity**.*

avocation A hobby or minor occupation.
*They are basically doctors and negotiators by **avocation**.*

badinage	Humorous or witty conversation. <i>He developed a nice line in badinage with the Labour leader.</i>
basketball	The inflated ball used in basketball.
bingo	A game in which numbered balls are drawn at random and players cover the corresponding numbers on their cards. <i>A bingo hall.</i>
boat	A serving dish in the shape of a boat. <i>She likes to go boating.</i>
boxing	The enclosure of something in a package or box.
canoe	Travel by canoe. <i>He had once canoed down the Nile.</i>
championship	The position or title of the winner of a championship contest. <i>A championship course.</i>
chess	A board game for two players who move their 16 pieces according to specific rules; the object is to checkmate the opponent's king.
entertainment	An event, performance, or activity designed to entertain others. <i>A theatrical entertainment.</i>
fishing	The occupation of catching fish for a living. <i>The area is renowned for its excellent deep sea fishing.</i>
football	Any of various forms of team game involving kicking and in some cases also handling a ball in particular in the UK soccer or in the US American football. <i>Wherever the president travels a military aide stays close with the football.</i>
game	Games the score at a particular point or the score needed to win. <i>Buy your games and software from us.</i>
hobby	A child's plaything consisting of an imitation horse mounted on rockers; the child straddles it and pretends to ride. <i>Her hobbies are reading and gardening.</i>
leisure	Time when one is not working or occupied; free time. <i>Increased opportunities for leisure.</i>
outing	A journey taken for pleasure. <i>Madonna's first screen outing in three years.</i>
partake	Have some of the qualities or attributes of something. <i>Visitors can partake in golfing or clay pigeon shooting.</i>

pastime	An activity that someone does regularly for enjoyment rather than work; a hobby. <i>His main pastime is gambling.</i>
philately	The collection and study of postage stamps.
picnic	Have or take part in a picnic. <i>We picnicked near the lake on this gorgeous Sunday.</i>
recreation	Activity that refreshes and recreates; activity that renews your health and spirits by enjoyment and relaxation. <i>For recreation he wrote poetry and solved crossword puzzles.</i>
recreational	Relating to or denoting drugs taken on an occasional basis for enjoyment. <i>Reading matter that is both recreational and mentally stimulating.</i>
refreshment	A light snack or drink. <i>Time for rest and refreshment by the pool.</i>
sea	A roughly definable area of the sea. <i>A sea view.</i>
sporting	Preoccupied with the pursuit of pleasure and especially games of chance. <i>Sporting gents and their ladies.</i>
stadium	An ancient Roman or Greek measure of length about 185 metres originally the length of a stadium.
tourism	The business of providing services to tourists. <i>A national fund for the promotion of tourism.</i>
tournament	A series of jousts between knights contesting for a prize. <i>The Royal Tournament.</i>
travel	Travel from place to place as for the purpose of finding work preaching or acting as a judge. <i>Perhaps you ll write a book about your travels.</i>
