<b>amicable</b>	Characterized by friendliness and absence of discord. <i>An <b>amicable</b> settlement of the dispute.</i>
<b>cordial</b>	Diffusing warmth and friendliness. <i><b>Cordial</b> relations.</i>
<b>friendly</b>	Easy to understand or use. <i><b>Friendly</b> rivalry between the two schools.</i>

**genial** Friendly and cheerful.  
*The **genial** sunshine.*

**good-humored** Disposed to please- Hal Hinson.

**good-humoured** Disposed to please- Hal Hinson.

## Associations of "Amiable" (30 Words)

**affable** Diffusing warmth and friendliness.  
*An **affable** smile.*

**affection** A positive feeling of liking.  
*He won a place in her **affections**.*

**amity** A state of friendship and cordiality.  
*The presence of French troops in Scotland had produced hostility rather than **amity**.*

**condescendingly** With condescension; in a patronizing manner.  
*He treats his secretary **condescendingly**.*

**cordial** Sincerely or intensely felt.  
*A **cordial** greeting.*

**cordiality** A cordial disposition.

**courteous** Characterized by courtesy and gracious good manners.  
*If a man be gracious and **courteous** to strangers it shows he is a citizen of the world.*

**courtesy** A courteous or respectful or considerate remark.  
*A **courtesy** car.*

**decent** Decently clothed.  
*There s a few **decent** players in the team.*

**favor** A feeling of favorable regard.  
*The outcome was in his **favor**.*

**favorable** Tending to promote or facilitate.  
*Made a **favorable** impression.*

<b>friendly</b>	(of a game or match) not forming part of a serious competition. <i>A consumer <b>friendly</b> policy.</i>
<b>genial</b>	Agreeable, conducive to comfort. <i>A <b>genial</b> host.</i>
<b>gentle</b>	Make or become gentle. <i>A <b>gentle</b> reprimand.</i>
<b>gracious</b>	Showing the elegance and comfort brought by wealth or high social status. <i>The accession of Her present <b>gracious</b> Majesty.</i>
<b>heartly</b>	Without reservation. <i>He sang in a <b>heartly</b> baritone.</i>
<b>honest</b>	Used to persuade someone of the truth of something. <i>An <b>honest</b> working stiff.</i>
<b>humble</b>	(of an action or thought) offered with or affected by a modest estimate of one's importance. <i>My <b>humble</b> apologies.</i>
<b>kind</b>	Tolerant and forgiving under provocation. <i>Hot summer pavements are anything but <b>kind</b> to the feet.</i>
<b>kindly</b>	Pleasant and agreeable. <i>Would you <b>kindly</b> explain what you re talking about.</i>
<b>merciful</b>	(of an event) coming as a mercy; bringing someone relief from something unpleasant. <i>William did not believe in being <b>merciful</b> to those who fought against him.</i>
<b>mild</b>	Humble in spirit or manner suggesting retiring mildness or even cowed submissiveness. <i>Fortunately the pain was <b>mild</b>.</i>
<b>modest</b>	Relatively moderate, limited, or small. <i>Too <b>modest</b> to wear his medals.</i>
<b>outspoken</b>	Frank in stating one's opinions, especially if they are shocking or controversial. <i>He has been <b>outspoken</b> in his criticism.</i>
<b>polite</b>	Not rude; marked by satisfactory (or especially minimal) adherence to social usages and sufficient but not noteworthy consideration for others- W.S. Maugham. <i><b>Polite</b> society.</i>
<b>sincere</b>	Open and genuine; not deceitful. <i>They offer their <b>sincere</b> thanks to Paul.</i>

<b>truthful</b>	Conforming to truth. <i>Astonishingly <b>truthful</b> acting.</i>
<b><u>unassuming</u></b>	Not arrogant or presuming. <i>He was an <b>unassuming</b> and kindly man.</i>
<b>unpretentious</b>	Lacking pretension or affectation. <i>An <b>unpretentious</b> country church.</i>
<b>veracious</b>	Precisely accurate. <i>A <b>veracious</b> account.</i>
