| arguments | A reference or value that is passed to a function, procedure, subroutine, command, or program. <i>The editor added the argument to the poem.</i> |
| bombs | Strong sealed vessel for measuring heat of combustion. |
| bullets | A pitch thrown with maximum velocity. |
| cartridges | Ammunition consisting of a cylindrical casing containing an explosive charge and a bullet; fired from a rifle or handgun. <i>He loaded a cartridge of fresh tape into the tape deck.</i> |
| considerations | The process of giving careful thought to something. <i>Another consideration is the time it would take.</i> |
| data | Things known or assumed as facts, making the basis of reasoning or calculation. <i>There is very little data available.</i> |
| evidence | Your basis for belief or disbelief; knowledge on which to base belief. <i>Without evidence they can't bring a charge.</i> |
| facts | An event known to have happened or something known to have existed. <i>He supported his argument with an impressive array of facts.</i> |
| information | In information theory a mathematical quantity expressing the probability of occurrence of a particular sequence of symbols impulses etc as against that of alternative sequences. <i>Genetically transmitted information.</i> |
| input | A contribution of work or information. <i>Data input.</i> |

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| material | The tangible substance that goes into the makeup of a physical object. <i>Useful teaching materials.</i> |
| missiles | A rocket carrying a warhead of conventional or nuclear explosives; may be ballistic or directed by remote control. |
| points | A V shape. <i>His acting was one of the high points of the movie.</i> |
| projectiles | Any vehicle self-propelled by a rocket engine. |
| rockets | A jet engine containing its own propellant and driven by reaction propulsion. |
| rounds | A crosspiece between the legs of a chair. <i>The doctor goes on his rounds first thing every morning.</i> |
| shells | The material that forms the hard outer covering of many animals. <i>The satellite is covered with a smooth shell of ice.</i> |
| shot | A ball of stone or metal used as a missile shot from a large gun or cannon. <i>He trained at putting the shot.</i> |
| slugs | A projectile that is fired from a gun. <i>He took a slug of hard liquor.</i> |
| stores | A supply of something available for future use. |
| <u>testimony</u> | A public recounting of a religious conversion or experience. <i>According to his own testimony he can't do it.</i> |

| blast | An explosion or explosive firing. <i>The icy blast hit them.</i> |
| bomb | Make someone homeless by destroying their home with bombs. <i>The site would really be da bomb if its content were updated more frequently.</i> |
| bullet | (baseball) a pitch thrown with maximum velocity. <i>The ball sped across the grass like a bullet.</i> |
| burst | The act of exploding or bursting. <i>Bursts of laughter.</i> |
| cannon | Make a cannon shot. <i>They would cross at the Town ford under cover of the defending cannon.</i> |
| detonate | Explode or cause to explode. <i>The bomb detonated at noon.</i> |

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| eruption | A spot, rash, or other mark appearing suddenly on the skin. <i>The eruption of Vesuvius.</i> |
| explode | Destroy by exploding. <i>The use of this drug exploded in the nineties.</i> |
| explosion | The noise caused by an explosion. <i>Three explosions damaged buildings at the barracks.</i> |
| explosive | (of a vocal sound) produced with a sharp release of air. <i>A car full of explosive.</i> |
| firearm | A portable gun. <i>He wore his firearm in a shoulder holster.</i> |
| firing | The act of firing weapons or artillery at an enemy. <i>A series of firings and resignations.</i> |
| flak | Intense adverse criticism. <i>He has been getting flak from certain quarters lately for pointing this out.</i> |
| fulminate | Express vehement protest. <i>The disease fulminated.</i> |
| grenade | A small explosive bomb thrown by hand or fired from a missile. |
| gun | Used as a nickname for a ship's gunnery officer. <i>A grease gun.</i> |
| implode | Collapse or cause to collapse violently inwards. <i>Both the windows had imploded.</i> |
| muniton | Military weapons ammunition equipment and stores. <i>Reserves of nuclear chemical and conventional munitons.</i> |
| musket | A muzzle-loading shoulder gun with a long barrel; formerly used by infantrymen. <i>A volley of musket fire.</i> |
| ordnance | Mounted guns; artillery. <i>The ordnance corps.</i> |
| pistol | Shoot someone with a pistol. <i>When we first met he was a pistol full of ideals and a natural leader.</i> |
| pyrotechnic | A device with an explosive that burns at a low rate and with colored flames; can be used to illuminate areas or send signals etc. <i>Pyrotechnic smokes.</i> |
| pyrotechnics | A brilliant performance or display of a specified skill. <i>He thrilled his audience with vocal pyrotechnics.</i> |
| rifle | A shoulder firearm with a long barrel and a rifled bore. <i>Who rifled through my desk drawers.</i> |

- shooting** The sport or pastime of shooting with a gun.
