- *Any nuclear or chemical or biological material that can be used as a weapon of mass destruction.*
- *Considerations that can be used to support one's case in debate.*



## Synonyms of "Ammunition" as a noun (22 Words)

<b>ammo</b>	Projectiles to be fired from a gun.
<b>arguments</b>	A reference or value that is passed to a function, procedure, subroutine, command, or program. <i>The editor added the argument to the poem.</i>
<b>bombs</b>	Strong sealed vessel for measuring heat of combustion.
<b>bullets</b>	A pitch thrown with maximum velocity.
<b>cartridges</b>	Ammunition consisting of a cylindrical casing containing an explosive charge and a bullet; fired from a rifle or handgun. <i>He loaded a cartridge of fresh tape into the tape deck.</i>
<b>considerations</b>	The process of giving careful thought to something. <i>Another consideration is the time it would take.</i>
<b>data</b>	Things known or assumed as facts, making the basis of reasoning or calculation. <i>There is very little <b>data</b> available.</i>
<b>evidence</b>	Your basis for belief or disbelief; knowledge on which to base belief. <i>Without <b>evidence</b> they can't bring a charge.</i>
<b>facts</b>	An event known to have happened or something known to have existed. <i>He supported his argument with an impressive array of <b>facts</b>.</i>
<b>information</b>	In information theory a mathematical quantity expressing the probability of occurrence of a particular sequence of symbols impulses etc as against that of alternative sequences. <i>Genetically transmitted <b>information</b>.</i>
<b>input</b>	A contribution of work or information. <i>Data <b>input</b>.</i>

<b>material</b>	The tangible substance that goes into the makeup of a physical object. <i>Useful teaching <b>materials</b>.</i>
<b>missiles</b>	A rocket carrying a warhead of conventional or nuclear explosives; may be ballistic or directed by remote control.
<b>points</b>	A V shape. <i>His acting was one of the high <b>points</b> of the movie.</i>
<b>projectiles</b>	Any vehicle self-propelled by a rocket engine.
<b>rockets</b>	A jet engine containing its own propellant and driven by reaction propulsion.
<b>rounds</b>	A crosspiece between the legs of a chair. <i>The doctor goes on his <b>rounds</b> first thing every morning.</i>
<b>shells</b>	The material that forms the hard outer covering of many animals. <i>The satellite is covered with a smooth shell of ice.</i>
<b>shot</b>	A ball of stone or metal used as a missile shot from a large gun or cannon. <i>He trained at putting the <b>shot</b>.</i>
<b>slugs</b>	A projectile that is fired from a gun. <i>He took a slug of hard liquor.</i>
<b>stores</b>	A supply of something available for future use.
<u><a href="#">testimony</a></u>	A public recounting of a religious conversion or experience. <i>According to his own <b>testimony</b> he can't do it.</i>

<b>arms</b>	Weapons; armaments. <i>Arms and ammunition.</i>
<b>blast</b>	An explosion or explosive firing. <i>The icy <b>blast</b> hit them.</i>
<b>bomb</b>	Make someone homeless by destroying their home with bombs. <i>The site would really be da <b>bomb</b> if its content were updated more frequently.</i>
<b>bullet</b>	(baseball) a pitch thrown with maximum velocity. <i>The ball sped across the grass like a <b>bullet</b>.</i>
<b>burst</b>	The act of exploding or bursting. <i><b>Bursts</b> of laughter.</i>
<b>cannon</b>	Make a cannon shot. <i>They would cross at the Town ford under cover of the defending <b>cannon</b>.</i>
<b>detonate</b>	Explode or cause to explode. <i>The bomb <b>detonated</b> at noon.</i>

<b>eruption</b>	A spot, rash, or other mark appearing suddenly on the skin. <i>The <b>eruption</b> of Vesuvius.</i>
<b>explode</b>	Destroy by exploding. <i>The use of this drug <b>exploded</b> in the nineties.</i>
<b>explosion</b>	The noise caused by an explosion. <i>Three <b>explosions</b> damaged buildings at the barracks.</i>
<b>explosive</b>	(of a vocal sound) produced with a sharp release of air. <i>A car full of <b>explosive</b>.</i>
<b>firearm</b>	A portable gun. <i>He wore his <b>firearm</b> in a shoulder holster.</i>
<b>firing</b>	The act of firing weapons or artillery at an enemy. <i>A series of <b>firings</b> and resignations.</i>
<b>flak</b>	Intense adverse criticism. <i>He has been getting <b>flak</b> from certain quarters lately for pointing this out.</i>
<b>fulminate</b>	Express vehement protest. <i>The disease <b>fulminated</b>.</i>
<b>grenade</b>	A small explosive bomb thrown by hand or fired from a missile.
<b>gun</b>	Used as a nickname for a ship's gunnery officer. <i>A grease <b>gun</b>.</i>
<b>implode</b>	Collapse or cause to collapse violently inwards. <i>Both the windows had <b>imploded</b>.</i>
<b>munitio</b>	Military weapons ammunition equipment and stores. <i>Reserves of nuclear chemical and conventional <b>munitio</b>s.</i>
<b>musket</b>	A muzzle-loading shoulder gun with a long barrel; formerly used by infantrymen. <i>A volley of <b>musket</b> fire.</i>
<b>ordnance</b>	Mounted guns; artillery. <i>The <b>ordnance</b> corps.</i>
<b>pistol</b>	Shoot someone with a pistol. <i>When we first met he was a <b>pistol</b> full of ideals and a natural leader.</i>
<b>pyrotechnic</b>	A device with an explosive that burns at a low rate and with colored flames; can be used to illuminate areas or send signals etc. <i><b>Pyrotechnic</b> smokes.</i>
<b>pyrotechnics</b>	A brilliant performance or display of a specified skill. <i>He thrilled his audience with vocal <b>pyrotechnics</b>.</i>
<b>rifle</b>	A shoulder firearm with a long barrel and a rifled bore. <i>Who <b>rifled</b> through my desk drawers.</i>

- salvo** A sudden, vigorous, or aggressive act or series of acts.  
*A deafening **salvo** of shots rang out.*
- shooting** The sport or pastime of shooting with a gun.  
*20 000 fatal **shootings** a year.*
- shot** Sports equipment consisting of a heavy metal ball used in the shot put.  
*Metal fragments and lead **shot** were sent in all directions.*
- weapon** A means of persuading or arguing.  
*He was licensed to carry a **weapon**.*
- weaponry** Weapons considered collectively.  
*America s **weaponry**.*
