*The London **Coliseum**.*

<b>child</b>	An immature childish person. <i>He remained a <b>child</b> in practical matters as long as he lived.</i>
<b>enclosure</b>	The state of being enclosed, especially in a religious community. <i>The nuns kept strict <b>enclosure</b>.</i>
<b>extracurricular</b>	Characterized by adultery. <i>The <b>extracurricular</b> activities of a philandering husband.</i>
<b>field</b>	A fielder. <i><b>Field</b> observations and interviews.</i>



<b>game</b>	Play video games. <i>For actors memorizing lines is no <b>game</b>.</i>
<b>gladiator</b>	(ancient Rome) a professional combatant or a captive who entertained the public by engaging in mortal combat.
<b>grandstand</b>	Of a view seen from an advantageous position as if from a grandstand. <i>She never misses a chance to <b>grandstand</b>.</i>
<b>hockey</b>	A team game played between two teams of eleven players each using hooked sticks with which the players try to drive a small hard ball towards goals at opposite ends of a field. In North America it is called field hockey to distinguish it from ice hockey.
<b>match</b>	Make equal uniform corresponding or matching. <i>The jacket and trousers do not <b>match</b>.</i>
<b>natural</b>	Existing in or in conformity with nature or the observable world neither supernatural nor magical. <i>The Baron left a <b>natural</b> son by his mistress.</i>
<b>pavilion</b>	A large tent with a peak and crenellated decorations, used at a show or fair. <i>They designed the British <b>pavilion</b> at Shanghai World Expo 2010.</i>
<b>pitch</b>	The act of throwing a baseball by a pitcher to a batter. <i>He was employed to see that his paper's news <b>pitches</b> were not trespassed upon by rival vendors.</i>
<b>player</b>	A confident, successful man with many sexual partners. <i>A guitar <b>player</b>.</i>
<b>playground</b>	Yard consisting of an outdoor area for children's play. <i><b>Playground</b> games.</i>
<b>playpen</b>	A small portable enclosure in which a baby or small child can play safely.
<b>racetrack</b>	A course over which races are run.
<b>recreational</b>	Engaged in as a pastime. <i>Money to provide <b>recreational</b> facilities.</i>
<b>school</b>	Send to school educate. <i>Taverier was born in Paris and <b>schooled</b> in Lyon.</i>
<b>slant</b>	Heel over. <i>The ceiling is <b>slanting</b>.</i>
<b>spectator</b>	A close observer; someone who looks at something (such as an exhibition of some kind). <i>Around fifteen thousand <b>spectators</b> came to watch the thrills and spills.</i>

<b>sport</b>	Someone who engages in sports. <i>A good <b>sport</b>.</i>
<b>sporting</b>	Connected with or interested in sport. <i>A major <b>sporting</b> event.</i>
<b>stadium</b>	An ancient Roman or Greek measure of length about 185 metres originally the length of a stadium.
<b><u>swimming</u></b>	The act of swimming. <i>Rachel had always loved <b>swimming</b>.</i>
<b>swinging</b>	The action of moving back and forth or from side to side while suspended or on an axis. <i>A <b>swinging</b> resort.</i>
<b>vend</b>	Sell (something). <i>There was a man <b>vending</b> sticky cakes and ices.</i>
<b><u>vivacity</u></b>	(especially in a woman) the quality of being attractively lively and animated. <i>He was struck by her <b>vivacity</b> humour and charm.</i>
