augment	Make (something) greater by adding to it; increase. <i>The pressure augmented.</i>

boost	Give a boost to be beneficial to. <i>The tax cut will boost the economy.</i>
concentrate	Compress or concentrate. <i>Plants and microorganisms can concentrate metals from the environment.</i>
develop	Cause to grow and differentiate in ways conforming to its natural development. <i>Please develop this roll of film for me.</i>

elaborate on	Produce from basic elements or sources; change into a more developed product.
embroider	Add fictitious or exaggerated details to (an account) to make it more interesting. <i>She embroidered a tablecloth.</i>
enlarge on	Add details, as to an account or idea; clarify the meaning of and discourse in a learned way, usually in writing.
<u>escalate</u>	Increase in extent or intensity. <i>The price of tickets escalated.</i>
<u>exaggerate</u>	Represent (something) as being larger, better, or worse than it really is. <i>Tended to romanticize and exaggerate this gracious Old South imagery.</i>
expand	Expand the influence of. <i>The dough expands.</i>
flesh out	Remove adhering flesh from (hides) when preparing leather manufacture.
go into detail about	Be abolished or discarded.
heighten	Become more extreme. <i>Heighten the tension.</i>
hyperbolise	To enlarge beyond bounds or the truth.
hyperbolize	Represent something as being larger, better, or worse than it really is; exaggerate. <i>Victims are prone to hyperbolize and invent details that just aren't there.</i>
increase	Become or make greater in size, amount, or degree. <i>The university increased the number of students it admitted.</i>
inflate	Become inflated. <i>The war inflated the economy.</i>
<u>intensify</u>	Become more intense. <i>The dispute began to intensify.</i>
louden	Make or become louder. <i>The latest research will louden the cries from critics.</i>
<u>magnify</u>	Make large. <i>Praise the Lord and magnify Him.</i>
make louder	Cause to do; cause to act in a specified manner.

overdraw	Exaggerate in describing or depicting (someone or something). <i>I m already overdrawn this month.</i>
overstate	To enlarge beyond bounds or the truth. <i>I overstated my case to make my point.</i>
raise	Raise from a lower to a higher position. <i>They managed to raise Hanoi last night.</i>
<u>reinforce</u>	Strengthen (a military force) with additional personnel or equipment. <i>The helmet has been reinforced with a double layer of cork.</i>
<u>sharpen</u>	Make crisp or more crisp and precise. <i>Her tone sharpened.</i>
step up	Cause (a computer) to execute a single command.
strengthen	Make strong or stronger. <i>He advises an application of fluoride to strengthen the teeth.</i>
supplement	Serve as a supplement to. <i>I looked for a part time job to supplement my income.</i>
swell	Cause to become swollen. <i>The mother was swelling with importance when she spoke of her son.</i>
turn up	Cause to move along an axis or into a new direction.

broaden	Make broader. <i>Broaden the road.</i>
dilate	Add details, as to an account or idea; clarify the meaning of and discourse in a learned way, usually in writing. <i>The woman dilated her nostrils.</i>
distend	Swell or cause to swell by pressure from inside. <i>Air is introduced into the stomach to distend it.</i>
diversify	Vary in order to spread risk or to expand. <i>We re confident that the new owners will grow and diversify the company globally.</i>
enlarge	Become larger or bigger. <i>Very often a favourite photograph is enlarged and framed.</i>
escalation	An increase to counteract a perceived discrepancy. <i>There was a gradual escalation of hostilities.</i>
expand	Expand the influence of. <i>His business expanded rapidly.</i>
expanded	Relatively broad in shape. <i>Expanded polystyrene.</i>
expansion	The action of becoming larger or more extensive. <i>The book is an expansion of a lecture given last year.</i>
exponentially	(with reference to an increase) more and more rapidly. <i>Our business has been growing exponentially.</i>
extend	Stretch out over a distance space time or scope run or extend between two points or beyond a certain point. <i>The law was extended to all citizens.</i>
extension	The action or process of enlarging or extending something. <i>The extension of satellite of Mars is the set containing only Demos and Phobos.</i>

pervasiveness	The quality of spreading widely or being present throughout an area or a group of people. <i>The pervasiveness of the odor of cabbage in tenement hallways.</i>
proliferate	Grow rapidly. <i>Cultured cells often proliferate indefinitely.</i>
rise	Rise to one s feet. <i>The activists urged militant factions to rise up.</i>
stretching	Exercise designed to extend the limbs and muscles to their full extent.
swell	The undulating movement of the surface of the open sea. <i>She felt herself swell with pride.</i>
widen	Make or become wider. <i>The lane widened out into a small clearing.</i>
