<b>match</b>	The score needed to win a match. <i>They were no <b>match</b> for the mercenaries.</i>
<b>mirror</b>	A faithful depiction or reflection. <i>He checked his appearance in the <b>mirror</b>.</i>
<b><u>parallel</u></b>	An imaginary line around the Earth parallel to the equator. <i><b>Parallels</b> never meet.</i>
<b><u>twin</u></b>	A twinned crystal. <i>There was a bruise on his cheek a <b>twin</b> to the one on mine.</i>

- *Relating to or using signals or information represented by a continuously variable physical quantity such as spatial position, voltage, etc.*
- *(of a clock or watch) showing the time by means of hands or a pointer rather than*

*displayed digits.*

- *Not involving or relating to the use of computer technology, as a contrast to a digital counterpart.*
- *Of a circuit or device having an output that is proportional to the input.*

<b>figurative</b>	Departing from a literal use of words; metaphorical. <i>The <b>figurative</b> art of the humanistic tradition.</i>
<b>forebear</b>	An ancestor. <i>Generations of his <b>forebears</b> had lived in London.</i>
<b>hoary</b>	Used in names of animals and plants covered with whitish fur or short hairs e g hoary bat hoary cress. <i>The <b>hoary</b> old adage often used by Fleet Street editors.</i>
<b>hour</b>	The distance travelled in one hour. <i>We live an <b>hour</b> from the airport.</i>
<b>journalist</b>	A person who writes for newspapers, magazines, or news websites or prepares news to be broadcast. <i>Foreign <b>journalists</b> had been expelled from the area.</i>
<b>manual</b>	A vehicle with manual transmission. <i><b>Manual</b> dexterity.</i>
<b>news</b>	A broadcast or published report of news. <i>The judge conceded the <b>newsworthiness</b> of the trial.</i>
<b>notebook</b>	A small compact portable computer. <i>He copied the number into his <b>notebook</b>.</i>
<b>old</b>	Used informally especially for emphasis old adj of a very early stage in development. <i><b>Old</b> friendships.</i>
<b>parallel</b>	One of a set of parallel geometric figures parallel lines or planes. <i>The road runs <b>parallel</b> to the Ottawa River.</i>
<b>performer</b>	A person who entertains an audience. <i>A circus <b>performer</b>.</i>
<b>periodical</b>	Occurring or appearing at intervals; occasional. <i>Britain s best <b>periodical</b> art magazine.</i>
<b>reporter</b>	A person who investigates and reports or edits news stories.
<b>resemblance</b>	A way in which two or more things are alike. <i>The physical <b>resemblances</b> between humans and apes.</i>



<b>satellite</b>	Broadcast or disseminate via satellite. <i>A communications <b>satellite</b>.</i>
<b>serial</b>	A serialized set of programs. <i><b>Serial</b> concerts.</i>
<b>serrate</b>	Serrated. <i>Leaves with <b>serrate</b> margins.</i>
<b><u>sharply</u></b>	Very suddenly and to a great degree. <i>The road twists <b>sharply</b> after the light.</i>
<b>switch</b>	Beat or flick with or as if with a switch. <i>She s managed to <b>switch</b> careers.</i>
<b>tv</b>	Broadcasting visual images of stationary or moving objects - Ernie Kovacs. <i>The British call a <b>tv</b> set a telly.</i>
<b>wristwatch</b>	A watch that is worn strapped to the wrist.
