- evaluator** An authority who is able to estimate worth or quality.  
*The government appointed an independent **evaluator** to determine the value of the mine.*
- exponent** A person who pleads for a cause or propounds an idea.  
*He s the world s leading **exponent** of country rock guitar.*

- expounder** A person who explains.
- interpreter** A program that translates and executes source language statements one line at a time.  
*His paintings reveal a sensitive **interpreter** of nature.*
- judge** A leader having temporary authority in ancient Israel in the period between Joshua and the kings.  
*A distinguished panel of **judges** select the winning design.*
- monitor** A person operating a monitor.  
*I was amazed at the quality of the sound coming from the **monitors**.*
- observer** A person trained to spot and identify enemy aircraft or to reconnoitre enemy positions from the air.  
*Some **observers** expect interest rates to rise.*
- psychoanalyst** A person who practises psychoanalysis.
- pundit** Someone who has been admitted to membership in a scholarly field.  
*Political **pundits** were tipping him for promotion.*

<b>anticipate</b>	Realize beforehand. <i>She <b>anticipated</b> scorn on her return to the theatre.</i>
<b>anticipation</b>	Anticipating with confidence of fulfillment. <i>Each of them had their own <b>anticipations</b>.</i>
<b><u>anticipatory</u></b>	Happening, performed, or felt in anticipation of something. <i>An <b>anticipatory</b> flash of excitement.</i>
<b><u>assume</u></b>	Suppose to be the case, without proof. <i>When will the new President <b>assume</b> office.</i>
<b>assumption</b>	The act of assuming or taking for granted. <i>We re working on the <b>assumption</b> that the time of death was after midnight.</i>
<b>commentator</b>	A writer who reports and analyzes events of the day. <i>The move electrified spectators and <b>commentators</b> alike.</i>
<b><u>expect</u></b>	Consider obligatory request and expect. <i>We <b>expect</b> employers to pay a reasonable salary.</i>
<b>expectancy</b>	Something expected (as on the basis of a norm). <i>An indicator of <b>expectancy</b> in development.</i>
<b>expectation</b>	The feeling that something is about to happen. <i>I sat down in <b>expectation</b> of a feast of nostalgia.</i>
<b>forebode</b>	Have a presentiment of (something bad). <i>This lull <b>foreboded</b> some new assault upon him.</i>
<b>forecast</b>	A calculation or estimate of future events, especially coming weather or a financial trend. <i>Coal consumption in Europe is <b>forecast</b> to increase.</i>
<b>forecasting</b>	A statement made about the future.
<b><u>foresee</u></b>	Realize beforehand. <i>It is impossible to <b>foresee</b> how life will work out.</i>
<b>foretell</b>	Indicate by signs. <i>A seer had foretold that the earl would assume the throne.</i>
<b>guess</b>	An estimate or conclusion formed by guessing. <i>My <b>guess</b> is that within a year we will have a referendum.</i>
<b><u>hacker</u></b>	A person or thing that hacks or cuts roughly. <i>True <b>hackers</b> subscribe to a code of ethics and look down upon crackers.</i>

<b>newscaster</b>	A person who reads out broadcast news stories; a newsreader.
<b>pollster</b>	A person who conducts or analyses opinion polls. <i>A <b>pollster</b> conducts public opinion polls.</i>
<b>predict</b>	Make a prediction about tell in advance. <i>It is too early to <b>predict</b> a result.</i>
<b>prediction</b>	The action of predicting something. <i>A <b>prediction</b> that economic growth would resume.</i>
<b>presuppose</b>	Require as a necessary antecedent or precondition. <i>This step <b>presupposes</b> two prior ones.</i>
<b>programmer</b>	A person who writes computer programs. <i>Computer <b>programmers</b> and analysts.</i>
<b>prophecy</b>	Deliver a sermon. <i>Jacques was <b>prophesying</b> a bumper harvest.</i>
<b>seer</b>	An authoritative person who divines the future. <i>Our <b>seers</b> have grown gloomier about prospects for growth.</i>
<b><u>speculate</u></b>	Reflect deeply on a subject. <i>Philosophers have <b>speculated</b> on the question of God for thousands of years.</i>
<b>speculation</b>	A hypothesis that has been formed by speculating or conjecturing (usually with little hard evidence). <i>This is pure <b>speculation</b> on my part.</i>
<b>supposition</b>	The cognitive process of supposing. <i>Their outrage was based on <b>supposition</b> and hearsay.</i>
<b>test</b>	Produce a specified result in a medical test especially a drugs test or AIDS test. <i>A statutory <b>test</b> of obscenity.</i>
<b>weatherman</b>	A man who broadcasts a description and forecast of weather conditions.
