<b>make-up</b>	The way in which someone or something is composed.
<b>material body</b>	Information (data or ideas or observations) that can be used or reworked into a finished form.
<b>perusal</b>	Reading carefully with intent to remember. <i>A quick <b>perusal</b> of the index to the book reveals an interesting fact.</i>

<b><u>physique</u></b>	Constitution of the human body. <i>He has a strong <b>physique</b>.</i>
<b>proportions</b>	The relation between things (or parts of things) with respect to their comparative quantity, magnitude, or degree. <i>A building of vast <b>proportions</b>.</i>
<b>scrutiny</b>	The act of examining something closely (as for mistakes). <i>Every aspect of local government was placed under <b>scrutiny</b>.</i>
<b><u>shape</u></b>	The state of good health especially in the phrases in condition or in shape or out of condition or out of shape. <i>A fiend in human <b>shape</b>.</i>

<b>morphological</b>	Relating to or concerned with the morphology of plants and animals. <i>The language s phonological <b>morphological</b> and syntactic structure.</i>
<b>morphology</b>	The branch of biology that deals with the form of living organisms, and with relationships between their structures. <i>Grammar is organized along two main dimensions <b>morphology</b> and syntax.</i>
<b>mortuary</b>	A building (or room) where dead bodies are kept before burial or cremation. <i>A <b>mortuary</b> temple.</i>
<b>otolaryngology</b>	The study of diseases of the ear and throat.
