| human body | Any living or extinct member of the family Hominidae characterized by superior intelligence, articulate speech, and erect carriage. |
| inspection | A formal or official examination. <i>Please have your tickets ready for inspection.</i> |
| make-up | The way in which someone or something is composed. |
| material body | Information (data or ideas or observations) that can be used or reworked into a finished form. |
| perusal | Reading carefully with intent to remember. <i>A quick perusal of the index to the book reveals an interesting fact.</i> |

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| <u>physique</u> | Constitution of the human body. <i>He has a strong physique.</i> |
| proportions | The relation between things (or parts of things) with respect to their comparative quantity, magnitude, or degree. <i>A building of vast proportions.</i> |
| scrutiny | The act of examining something closely (as for mistakes). <i>Every aspect of local government was placed under scrutiny.</i> |
| <u>shape</u> | The state of good health especially in the phrases in condition or in shape or out of condition or out of shape. <i>A fiend in human shape.</i> |
| <u>silhouette</u> | The dark shape and outline of someone or something visible in restricted light against a brighter background. <i>She paused to see its silhouette against the dimming sky.</i> |

| <u>survey</u> | A department carrying out the surveying of land. <i>The flight involved a detailed aerial survey of military bases.</i> |

| morphological | Relating to or concerned with the morphology of plants and animals. <i>The language's phonological morphological and syntactic structure.</i> |
| morphology | The branch of biology that deals with the form of living organisms, and with relationships between their structures. <i>Grammar is organized along two main dimensions morphology and syntax.</i> |
| mortuary | A building (or room) where dead bodies are kept before burial or cremation. <i>A mortuary temple.</i> |
| otolaryngology | The study of diseases of the ear and throat. |
