- An early version of a machine, system, etc.
- Someone from whom you are descended (but usually more remote than a grandparent.
- An early type of animal or plant from which others have evolved.

| antecedent | Anything that precedes something similar in time. <i>Her early life and antecedents have been traced.</i> |

| ascendant | Someone from whom you are descended (but usually more remote than a grandparent. That idea was in the ascendant . |
| ascendent | Position or state of being dominant or in control. |
| forebear | An ancestor. Generations of his forebear s had lived in London. |
| forefather | A precursor of a particular movement. Our forefather s brought forth a great nation. |



| forerunner | A sign or warning of something to come. Overcast mornings are the sure forerunner s of steady rain. |

| <u>precursor</u> | A person or thing that comes before another of the same kind; a forerunner. <i>Pepsinogen is the inactive precursor of pepsin.</i> |
| <u>predecessor</u> | A thing that has been followed or replaced by another. The chapel was built in 1864 on the site of its predecessor . |
| <u>progenitor</u> | A person or thing from which a person, animal, or plant is descended or originates; an ancestor or parent. The progenitor of modern jazz. |
| <u>root</u> | Any plant grown for its root. The root cause of the problem. |

- The ancestor of most dolphins is not clear.
- *He could trace his ancestors back to James the First.*



• Both species of elephant have a common ancestor.

| forefather | Person from an earlier time who contributed to the tradition shared by some group. <i>Our forefathers brought forth a great nation.</i> |
| <u>former</u> | (used especially of persons) of the immediate past. The former president. |
| hometown | The town (or city) where you grew up or where you have your principal residence. <i>He never went back to his hometown again.</i> |
| <u>lineage</u> | The descendants of one individual. The myeloid lineage . |
| lineal | Relating to or consisting of lines; linear. A lineal descendant. |
| mommy | One's mother (chiefly as a child's term). |
| mulatto | An offspring of a black and a white parent. |
| offspring | The product or result of something. She was the mother of many offspring . |
| <u>parent</u> | Be or act as a parent to a child. <i>His adoptive parents.</i> |
| paternal | Showing a kindness and care associated with a father; fatherly. His father and paternal grandfather were porcelain painters. |
| patriarch | A man who is older and higher in rank than yourself. <i>He s the patriarch of all spin doctors.</i> |
| <u>pedigree</u> | The record of descent of an animal, showing it to be pure-bred. The debate about pedigree and family fortunes. |
| <u>precede</u> | Furnish with a preface or introduction. A gun battle had precede d the explosions. |



| <u>preceding</u> | Of a person who has held and relinquished a position or office. The preceding pages. |

| <u>predecessor</u> | Something that precedes and indicates the approach of something or someone. The new President s foreign policy is very similar to that of his predecessor . |
| primogenitor | An ancestor, especially the earliest ancestor of a people; a progenitor. |
| <u>priority</u> | The fact or condition of being regarded or treated as more important than others. National independence takes priority over class struggle. |
| <u>progenitor</u> | An ancestor in the direct line. The progenitor of modern jazz. |
| <u>sibling</u> | Each of two or more children or offspring having one or both parents in common; a brother or sister. |
| unmixed | Not constituting a compound. Not an unmixed blessing. |
