### Definitions of "Anecdote" as a noun

- *The depiction of a minor narrative incident in a painting.*
- *Short account of an incident (especially a biographical one).*

<b>story</b>	A plot or storyline. <i>The film is based on a true <b>story</b>.</i>
<a href="#">tale</a>	A trivial lie. <i>She enjoyed hearing others tell their <b>tales</b>.</i>

<b>memory</b>	The area of cognitive psychology that studies memory processes. I ve a great <b>memory</b> for faces.
<b>mindful</b>	Focusing one's awareness on the present moment, especially as part of a therapeutic or meditative technique. I arrived home for the summer ever <b>mindful</b> of my obligations to my parents.

<b><u>narrate</u></b>	Narrate or give a detailed account of. <i>The story is <b>narrated</b> by the heroine.</i>
<b><u>nostalgic</u></b>	A nostalgic person. <i>A <b>nostalgic</b> account of an idyllic childhood.</i>
<b>personal</b>	An advertisement or message in the personal column of a newspaper. <b>Personal</b> papers.
<b>reawaken</b>	(with reference to a feeling or state) emerge or cause to emerge again; awaken again. <i>His departure <b>reawakened</b> deep divisions within the party.</i>
<b>recall</b>	An act or instance of officially recalling someone or something. <i>Expert systems can produce solutions with the speed <b>recall</b> accuracy and consistency that only a computer can provide.</i>
<b>recollect</b>	Recall knowledge from memory have a recollection. <i>He could not quite <b>recollect</b> the reason.</i>
<b><u>recollection</u></b>	Something recalled to the mind. <i>A biography based on his wife s <b>recollections</b>.</i>
<b>redolent</b>	Fragrant or sweet-smelling. <i>A rich inky <b>redolent</b> wine.</i>
<b>remember</b>	Pray for the well-being of. <i>He <b>remembered</b> her in his will.</i>
<b>remembrance</b>	A thing kept or given as a reminder or in commemoration of someone. <i>A flash of <b>remembrance</b> passed between them.</i>
<b>remind</b>	Cause someone to think of (something) because of a resemblance. <i>His impassive fierce stare <b>reminded</b> her of an owl.</i>
<b>reminder</b>	A letter sent to remind someone of an obligation, especially to pay a bill. <i>He ignored his wife s <b>reminders</b>.</i>
<b><u>reminisce</u></b>	Indulge in enjoyable recollection of past events. <i>They <b>reminisced</b> about their summers abroad.</i>
<b>reminiscence</b>	A story told about a past event remembered by the narrator. <i>His story made me smile in <b>reminiscence</b>.</i>
<b><u>reminiscent</u></b>	Suggesting something by resemblance. <i>Her robes were vaguely <b>reminiscent</b> of military dress.</i>
<b><u>retrospect</u></b>	A survey or review of a past course of events or period of time. <i>In <b>retrospect</b>.</i>
<b>story</b>	A plot or storyline. <i>Having such information is useful but it is not the whole <b>story</b>.</i>
