- *Marked by extreme anger.*



Synonyms of "Angered" as an adjective (4 Words)

- enraged** Marked by extreme anger.
*An **enraged** mob screamed abuse.*
- furious** (of the elements) as if showing violent anger.
***Furious** about the accident.*
- infuriated** Marked by extreme anger.
***Infuriated** onlookers charged the police who were beating the boy.*
- maddened** Marked by extreme anger.
*Could not control the **maddened** crowd.*



Associations of "Angered" (30 Words)

- aggravate** Annoy or exasperate.
*This drug **aggravates** the pain.*
- aggression** Violent action that is hostile and usually unprovoked.
*The president has been emboldened by the success of his latest **aggressions**.*
- annoy** Cause annoyance in disturb especially by minor irritations.
*The decision really **annoyed** him.*
- antagonism** The relation between opposing principles or forces or factors.
*The inherent **antagonism** of capitalism and socialism.*
- disaffection** A state or feeling of being dissatisfied, especially with people in authority or a system of control.
*The widespread **disaffection** of the troops.*

| exacerbate | Exasperate or irritate. <i>The exorbitant cost of land in urban areas only exacerbated the problem.</i> |
| exasperate | Exasperate or irritate. <i>This futile process exasperates prison officers.</i> |
| fractious | Stubbornly resistant to authority or control. <i>They fight and squabble like fractious children.</i> |
| fret | Provide a musical instrument with frets. <i>Don't fret over these small details.</i> |
| incense | The smoke or perfume of incense. <i>The sharp lingering sweetness of incense.</i> |
| inconvenient | Not suited to your comfort, purpose or needs. <i>An early departure is inconvenient for us.</i> |
| indignation | A feeling of righteous anger. <i>The letter filled Lucy with indignation.</i> |
| inflame | Become inflamed get sore. <i>The repetitive motion inflamed her joint.</i> |
| infuriate | Make (someone) extremely angry and impatient. <i>I was infuriated by your article.</i> |
| irritate | Excite to an abnormal condition, or chafe or inflame. <i>Irritate the glands of a leaf.</i> |
| irritation | A sudden outburst of anger. <i>Any food produced irritation of the stomach.</i> |
| madden | Drive (someone or something) insane. <i>This is ridiculous she told him maddened by his reaction.</i> |
| miff | A state of irritation or annoyance. <i>A doctor might be miffed by claims that the cure had no medical explanation.</i> |
| offend | Be displeasing or cause problems to. <i>Those activities which offend against public order and decency.</i> |
| outrage | An action or event causing outrage. <i>The public were outraged at the brutality involved.</i> |
| peevish | Having or showing an irritable disposition. <i>A thin peevish voice.</i> |
| petulant | Easily irritated or annoyed. <i>A petulant shake of the head.</i> |
