### Synonyms of "Angered" as an adjective (4 Words)

- enraged** Marked by extreme anger.  
*An **enraged** mob screamed abuse.*
- furious** (of the elements) as if showing violent anger.  
***Furious** about the accident.*
- infuriated** Marked by extreme anger.  
***Infuriated** onlookers charged the police who were beating the boy.*
- maddened** Marked by extreme anger.  
*Could not control the **maddened** crowd.*



## Associations of "Angered" (30 Words)

- aggravate** Annoy or exasperate.  
*This drug **aggravates** the pain.*
- aggression** Violent action that is hostile and usually unprovoked.  
*The president has been emboldened by the success of his latest **aggressions**.*
- annoy** Cause annoyance in disturb especially by minor irritations.  
*The decision really **annoyed** him.*
- antagonism** The relation between opposing principles or forces or factors.  
*The inherent **antagonism** of capitalism and socialism.*
- disaffection** A state or feeling of being dissatisfied, especially with people in authority or a system of control.  
*The widespread **disaffection** of the troops.*

<b>enrage</b>	Make (someone) very angry. <i>The students were <b>enraged</b> at these new rules.</i>
<b>exacerbate</b>	Exasperate or irritate. <i>The exorbitant cost of land in urban areas only <b>exacerbated</b> the problem.</i>
<b>exasperate</b>	Exasperate or irritate. <i>This futile process <b>exasperates</b> prison officers.</i>
<b>fractious</b>	Stubbornly resistant to authority or control. <i>They fight and squabble like <b>fractious</b> children.</i>
<b>fret</b>	Provide a musical instrument with frets. <i>Don't <b>fret</b> over these small details.</i>
<b>incense</b>	The smoke or perfume of incense. <i>The sharp lingering sweetness of <b>incense</b>.</i>
<b>inconvenient</b>	Not suited to your comfort, purpose or needs. <i>An early departure is <b>inconvenient</b> for us.</i>
<b>indignation</b>	A feeling of righteous anger. <i>The letter filled Lucy with <b>indignation</b>.</i>
<b>inflame</b>	Become inflamed get sore. <i>The repetitive motion <b>inflamed</b> her joint.</i>
<b>infuriate</b>	Make (someone) extremely angry and impatient. <i>I was <b>infuriated</b> by your article.</i>
<b>irritate</b>	Excite to an abnormal condition, or chafe or inflame. <i><b>Irritate</b> the glands of a leaf.</i>
<b>irritation</b>	A sudden outburst of anger. <i>Any food produced <b>irritation</b> of the stomach.</i>
<b>madden</b>	Drive (someone or something) insane. <i>This is ridiculous she told him <b>maddened</b> by his reaction.</i>
<b>miff</b>	A state of irritation or annoyance. <i>A doctor might be <b>miffed</b> by claims that the cure had no medical explanation.</i>
<b>offend</b>	Be displeasing or cause problems to. <i>Those activities which <b>offend</b> against public order and decency.</i>
<b>outrage</b>	An action or event causing outrage. <i>The public were <b>outraged</b> at the brutality involved.</i>
<b>peevish</b>	Having or showing an irritable disposition. <i>A thin <b>peevish</b> voice.</i>
<b>petulant</b>	Easily irritated or annoyed. <i>A <b>petulant</b> shake of the head.</i>



<b>pique</b>	A sudden outburst of anger. <i>She was <b>piqued</b> by his curtness.</i>
<b>rage</b>	Violent state of the elements. <i>She fell into a <b>rage</b> and refused to answer.</i>
<b>resentment</b>	A feeling of deep and bitter anger and ill-will. <i>His <b>resentment</b> at being demoted.</i>
<b>sadden</b>	Cause to feel sorrow; make unhappy. <i>The news of her death <b>saddened</b> me.</i>
<b>testy</b>	Easily irritated or annoyed. <i>She could see him growing quite <b>testy</b> beneath that polished urbanity.</i>
<b>touchy</b>	Quick to take offense. <i>She s a little <b>touchy</b> about her age.</i>
<b>worsen</b>	Make or become worse. <i>Arguing actually <b>worsens</b> the problem.</i>
