<b>accounts</b>	Grounds. <i>By all <b>accounts</b> they were a happy couple.</i>
<b>archives</b>	Collection of records especially about an institution.
<b>blog</b>	A shared on-line journal where people can post diary entries about their personal experiences and hobbies. <i>Postings on a <b>blog</b> are usually in chronological order.</i>
<b>chronicles</b>	A record or narrative description of past events.

<b>daily record</b>	A newspaper that is published every day.
<b>day-by-day account</b>	The period of time taken by a particular planet (e.g. Mars) to make a complete rotation on its axis.
<b>diary</b>	A column in a newspaper or magazine giving news or gossip on a particular topic. <i>The City <b>Diary</b>.</i>
<b>journals</b>	A ledger in which transactions have been recorded as they occurred. <i>He reads the medical <b>journals</b>.</i>
<b>log</b>	A set of claims for improved pay or conditions, lodged by a trade union on behalf of workers. <i>A ship's <b>log</b>.</i>
<b>logbook</b>	The registration document of a vehicle.
<b>moblog</b>	A blog that consists of pictures and other content posted from a mobile phone.
<b>records</b>	The number of wins versus losses and ties a team has had. <i>Coffee production last year broke all previous <b>records</b>.</i>
<b>registers</b>	(music) the timbre that is characteristic of a certain range and manner of production of the human voice or of different pipe organ stops or of different musical instruments.
<b>vlog</b>	A personal website or social media account where a person regularly posts short videos. <i>You can add travel <b>vlogs</b> to the growing list of travel related material popping up on the Web.</i>
<b>yearbook</b>	A book containing photographs of the senior class in a school or university and details of school activities in the previous year. <i>The Rugby Union <b>Yearbook</b>.</i>

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<b>anachronistic</b>	Chronologically misplaced. <i>She is rebelling against the <b>anachronistic</b> morality of her parents.</i>
<b>ancient</b>	A person who lived in ancient times. <i><b>Ancient</b> civilizations such as those of the Etruscans and Sumerians.</i>
<b>antebellum</b>	Occurring or existing before a particular war, especially the US Civil War. <i>The conventions of the <b>antebellum</b> South.</i>
<b>antiquate</b>	Give an antique appearance to.
<b>archaeology</b>	The branch of anthropology that studies prehistoric people and their cultures.
<b>archaic</b>	Little evolved from or characteristic of an earlier ancestral type. <i><b>Archaic</b> laws.</i>
<b>before</b>	Earlier in time; previously. <i>My playing days had ended six years <b>before</b>.</i>
<b>chronicle</b>	A record or narrative description of past events. <i>The rebels demands for personal freedom are conspicuous in the <b>chronicles</b>.</i>
<b>chronological</b>	Calculated in terms of the passage of time. <i>The diary provided a <b>chronological</b> framework for the events.</i>
<b>chronology</b>	A record of events in the order of their occurrence. <i>His book transformed prehistoric <b>chronology</b> by applying the results of carbon dating.</i>
<b>coeval</b>	Having the same age or date of origin; contemporary. <i>Like so many of his <b>coevals</b> he yearned for stability.</i>
<b>dolmen</b>	A megalithic tomb with a large flat stone laid on upright ones, found chiefly in Britain and France.
<b>early</b>	Of an early stage in the development of a language or literature. <i>An <b>early</b> computer.</i>
<b>epoch</b>	A particular period of time in history or a person's life. <i>The Victorian <b>epoch</b>.</i>
<b>era</b>	A major division of geological time an era is usually divided into two or more periods. <i>The landing of this English governor was an <b>era</b> in their lives.</i>
<b>historic</b>	Famous or important in history, or potentially so. <i><b>Historical</b> or <b>historic</b> times.</i>
<b>historical</b>	(of the study of a subject) based on an analysis of its development over a period. <i>Actual <b>historical</b> events.</i>

<b>history</b>	A continuous, typically chronological, record of important or public events or of a particular trend or institution. <i>The dawn of recorded <b>history</b>.</i>
<b>megalithic</b>	Massive or monolithic. <i><b>Megalithic</b> corporations.</i>
<b>mesozoic</b>	Of or relating to or denoting the Mesozoic era.
<b>neolithic</b>	Latest part of the Stone Age beginning about 10,000 BC in the Middle East (but later elsewhere).
<b>outmoded</b>	Out of fashion. <i>Demode or <b>outmoded</b> attire.</i>
<b>paleolithic</b>	Of or relating to the second period of the Stone Age (following the eolithic). <i><b>Paleolithic</b> artifacts.</i>
<b>paleontology</b>	The earth science that studies fossil organisms and related remains.
<b>paleozoic</b>	Of or relating to or denoting the Paleozoic era.
<b>past</b>	A past tense or form of a verb. <i>Reporters dug into the candidate <b>s past</b>.</i>
<b>period</b>	The interval between successive equal values of a periodic function. <i>A time <b>period</b> of 30 years.</i>
<b>prehistoric</b>	No longer fashionable. <i><b>Prehistoric</b> man.</i>
<b>span</b>	The wingspan of an aircraft or a bird. <i>A major setback was the collapse of one <b>span</b> of a flyover.</i>
