- *A building joined to or associated with a main building, providing additional space or accommodation.*



## Synonyms of "Annex" as a noun (7 Words)

- addition** A component that is added to something to improve it.  
*She began with simple arithmetic **addition** and then subtraction.*
- annexe** An addition that extends a main building.
- extension** A subsidiary telephone on the same line as the main one.  
*The dancer was praised for her uncanny **extension**.*
- part** That which concerns a person with regard to a particular role or situation.  
*Religions in all **parts** of the world.*
- section** A small army unit usually having a special function.  
*Metal **sections** were used below ground.*
- side** A television channel considered as one of two or more that are available.  
*A **side** dish of fresh vegetables.*

The wing of a fowl.

*They are the progressive **wing** of the Republican Party.*

## Annex as a Verb

### Definitions of "Annex" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "annex" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Add or attach as a condition or consequence.*
- *Attach to.*
- *Add as an extra or subordinate part, especially to a document.*
- *Take (territory) as if by conquest.*
- *Add (territory) to one's own territory by appropriation.*





## Synonyms of "Annex" as a verb (13 Words)

<b>add</b>	Put in an additional element ingredient etc. <i>We would like to <b>add</b> our congratulations.</i>
<b>append</b>	Fix to; attach. <i><b>Append</b> a charm to the necklace.</i>
<b>appropriate</b>	Take possession of by force, as after an invasion. <i>The accused had <b>appropriated</b> the property.</i>
<b>arrogate</b>	Take or claim (something) without justification. <i>They <b>arrogate</b> to themselves the ability to divine the nation's true interests.</i>
<b>attach</b>	Become attached. <i>I was <b>attached</b> to another working group.</i>

<b>conquer</b>	Take possession of by force, as after an invasion. <i>The second Briton to <b>conquer</b> Everest.</i>
<b>expropriate</b>	Deprive of possessions. <i>The measures <b>expropriated</b> the landlords.</i>
<b>garrison</b>	Station troops in a fort or garrison. <i>Air reconnaissance showed the Germans had not <b>garrisoned</b> the island.</i>
<b>join</b>	Cause to become joined or linked. <i><b>Join</b> the paragraphs together.</i>
<b>occupy</b>	Fill or preoccupy the mind. <i>The young prince will soon <b>occupy</b> the throne.</i>
<b>seize</b>	Seize and take control without authority and possibly with force take as one's right or possession. <i>He <b>seized</b> his chance to attack as Carr hesitated.</i>
<b>take over</b>	Receive willingly something given or offered.
<b>take possession of</b>	Lay claim to; as of an idea.





## Usage Examples of "Annex" as a verb

- *The first ten amendments were annexed to the Constitution in 1791.*
- *Extreme anointing hath neither ordinance of God to be grounded on, nor promise of grace annexed.*
- *Hitler annexed Lithuania.*
- *The left bank of the Rhine was annexed by France in 1797.*





## Associations of "Annex" (30 Words)

<b>add</b>	Make an addition to join or combine or unite with others increase the quality quantity size or scope of. <i>We <b>added</b> two students to that dorm room.</i>
<b>agglomerate</b>	A collection of objects laid on top of each other. <i>He is seeking to <b>agglomerate</b> the functions of the Home Office.</i>
<b>amalgamate</b>	Alloy (a metal) with mercury. <i>The <b>amalgamated</b> colleges constituted a university.</i>
<b><u>coalesce</u></b>	Come together to form one mass or whole. <i>His idea served to <b>coalesce</b> all that happened into one connected whole.</i>
<b>coalesced</b>	Joined together into a whole.
<b>coalescing</b>	Growing together, fusing.
<b>coeducation</b>	Education of men and women in the same institutions.



<b><u>collective</u></b>	A collective farm. A <b>collective</b> protest.
<b>combine</b>	Combine so as to form a whole mix. <i>These forces <b>combined</b> with others.</i>
<b>combined</b>	Made or joined or united into one.
<b>commingle</b>	Mix or blend. <i>The part of the brain where the senses <b>commingle</b>.</i>
<b>concerted</b>	Done with great effort or determination. A <b>concerted</b> attempt to preserve religious unity.
<b><u>confederation</u></b>	The act of forming an alliance or confederation. <i>Canada became a <b>confederation</b> in 1867.</i>
<b><u>consolidate</u></b>	Make (something) physically stronger or more solid. <b>Consolidate</b> fibers into boards.
<b>converge</b>	Approach a limit as the number of terms increases without limit. <i>Social forces <b>converged</b> to bring the Fascists back to power.</i>
<b><u>extension</u></b>	The ability to raise the working leg high in the air. <i>The <b>extension</b> of satellite of Mars is the set containing only Demos and Phobos.</i>
<b>federate</b>	Relating to a federated state or organization. <i>The country was <b>federated</b> after the civil war.</i>
<b><u>federation</u></b>	A union of political organizations. <i>A first step in the <b>federation</b> of Europe.</i>
<b>incorporation</b>	Consolidating two or more things; union in (or into) one body. <i>A law allowing <b>incorporation</b> as a company.</i>
<b>integrate</b>	Become one become integrated. <i>A fully equipped laboratory is being <b>integrated</b> into the development.</i>
<b>integration</b>	The process by which a well-balanced psyche becomes whole as the developing ego organizes the id, and the state which results or which treatment seeks to create by countering the fragmenting effect of defence mechanisms. <i><b>Integration</b> of individual countries into trading blocs.</i>
<b><u>kingdom</u></b>	Heaven as the abode of God and of the faithful after death. <i>The <b>kingdom</b> of dreams.</i>
<b><u>meld</u></b>	A thing formed by melding a combination. <i>Australia s winemakers have <b>melded</b> modern science with traditional art.</i>
<b><u>merge</u></b>	Mix together different elements. <i>We <b>merged</b> our resources.</i>

<b>synthesis</b>	The combination of ideas into a complex whole. <i>The <b>synthesis</b> of intellect and emotion in his work.</i>
<u><b>territory</b></u>	An area defended by an animal or group of animals against others of the same sex or species. <i>The government was prepared to give up the nuclear weapons on its <b>territory</b>.</i>
<u><b>union</b></u>	The operation of forming a union. <i>The <b>union</b> of opposing factions.</i>
<b>unite</b>	Act in concert or unite in a common purpose or belief. <i>The two Germanys officially <b>united</b>.</i>
<u><b>united</b></u>	Characterized by unity; being or joined into a single entity. <i>Presented a <b>united</b> front.</i>
<b>weld</b>	A welded joint. <i>The truck had spikes <b>welded</b> to the back.</i>
