Synonyms of "Annihilate" as a verb (27 Words)

beat

Indicate by beating as with the fingers or drumsticks.
Beat the table with his shoe.

beat hollow

Produce a rhythm by striking repeatedly.

best	Outwit or get the better of (someone). <i>She refused to allow herself to be bested.</i>
bring someone to their knees	Take something or somebody with oneself somewhere.
carry off	Keep up with financial support.
<u>decimate</u>	Kill in large numbers. <i>Public transport has been decimated.</i>
defeat	Thwart the passage of. <i>She was defeated by the last steep hill.</i>
destroy	Destroy completely damage irreparably. <i>The room had been destroyed by fire.</i>
eliminate	Eliminate from the body. <i>This possibility can be eliminated from our consideration.</i>
eradicate	Destroy completely; put an end to. <i>This disease has been eradicated from the world.</i>
<u>erase</u>	Remove from memory or existence. <i>Please erase the formula on the blackboard it is wrong.</i>
<u>exterminate</u>	Destroy completely. <i>Hitler wanted to exterminate the Jews Gypsies Communists and homosexuals of Europe.</i>
extinguish	Extinguish by crushing. <i>Too big to be extinguished at once the forest fires at best could be contained.</i>
extirpate	Pull up by or as if by the roots. <i>Timber wolves were extirpated from New England more than a century ago.</i>
finish off	Finally be or do something.
liquidate	Wind up the affairs of (a business) by ascertaining liabilities and apportioning assets. <i>Liquidate a company.</i>
<u>obliterate</u>	Make undecipherable or imperceptible by obscuring or concealing. <i>The special stamp should be placed on the left hand side and not be used to obliterate the postage stamp.</i>
<u>overwhelm</u>	Defeat completely. <i>I was overwhelmed with guilt.</i>
root out	Come into existence, originate.

rout

Make a groove in.

Rout out the fighters from their caves.

slaughter

Kill (people or animals) in a cruel or violent way, typically in large numbers.

*Innocent civilians are being **slaughtered**.*

trounce

Defeat heavily in a contest.

*Insider dealing has been roundly **trounced**.*

wipe off the face of the earth

Rub with a circular motion.

wipe off the map

Rub with a circular motion.

wipe out

Rub with a circular motion.

Defeat thoroughly.

worst

*This was not the time for a deep discussion she was tired and she would be **worsted**.*



Usage Examples of "Annihilate" as a verb

- *A simple bomb of this type could annihilate them all.*
- *A fraction of the mass of atomic nuclei is annihilated.*
- *Mesons are unstable because the quark and antiquark can annihilate each other.*
- *The stronger force annihilated its opponent virtually without loss.*
- *A crusade to annihilate evil.*

abolish	Do away with. <i>The tax was abolished in 1977.</i>
abrogate	Repeal or do away with (a law, right, or formal agreement). <i>A proposal to abrogate temporarily the right to strike.</i>
abrogation	The act of abrogating; an official or legal cancellation.
annul	Declare invalid. <i>The contract was annulled.</i>
<u>cancel</u>	A notation cancelling a previous sharp or flat. <i>The electric fields may cancel each other out.</i>

cull	An inferior or surplus livestock animal selected for culling. <i>Cull the sick members of the herd.</i>
decimate	Drastically reduce the strength or effectiveness of (something). <i>Public transport has been decimated.</i>
deconstruct	Analyse a text or linguistic or conceptual system by deconstruction. <i>She likes to deconstruct the texts to uncover what they are not saying.</i>
delete	A command or key on a computer which erases text. <i>You can use delete to remove a number of lines from your program.</i>
demolish	Comprehensively refute (an argument or its proponent). <i>Brown was busy demolishing a sausage roll.</i>
destroy	Destroy completely damage irreparably. <i>The customs agents destroyed the dog that was found to be rabid.</i>
eliminate	Eliminate from the body. <i>The police have eliminated Lawrence from their inquiries.</i>
eradicate	Destroy completely, as if down to the roots. <i>This disease has been eradicated from the world.</i>
erasable	Capable of being effaced. <i>A signal too loud to be erasable in a single pass through the erase head.</i>
exterminate	Kill en masse; kill on a large scale; kill many. <i>Hitler wanted to exterminate the Jews Gypsies Communists and homosexuals of Europe.</i>
extirpate	Eradicate or destroy completely. <i>Timber wolves were extirpated from New England more than a century ago.</i>
extirpation	The act of pulling up or out; uprooting; cutting off from existence.
iconoclasm	The orientation of an iconoclast.
null	Combine a signal with another in order to create a null cancel out. <i>The tumour can be more readily identified by nulling the high signal from bone marrow.</i>
nullify	Declare invalid. <i>Judges were unwilling to nullify government decisions.</i>
off	Located on the side of a vehicle that is normally furthest from the kerb offside. <i>The man ran off.</i>
override	Extend over; overlap. <i>You can override the cut out by releasing the switch.</i>
raze	Completely destroy (a building, town, or other settlement). <i>Villages were razed to the ground.</i>

- remove** Remove from a position or an office.
***Remove** a wrapper.*
- repeal** Cancel officially.
*The House voted in favour of **repeal**.*
- rescind** Revoke, cancel, or repeal (a law, order, or agreement).
*The government eventually **rescinded** the directive.*
- rescission** The act of rescinding; the cancellation of a contract and the return of the parties to the positions they would have had if the contract had not been made.
*The plaintiff agreed to the **rescission** of the agreement.*
- ruthlessly** Without pity or compassion for others.
*They fell prey to money lenders who **ruthlessly** exploited them.*
- stump** Use a stump on a drawing line etc.
*Education chiefs were **stumped** by some of the exam questions.*
- uproot** Pull up by or as if by the roots.
*The elephant s trunk is powerful enough to **uproot** trees.*
