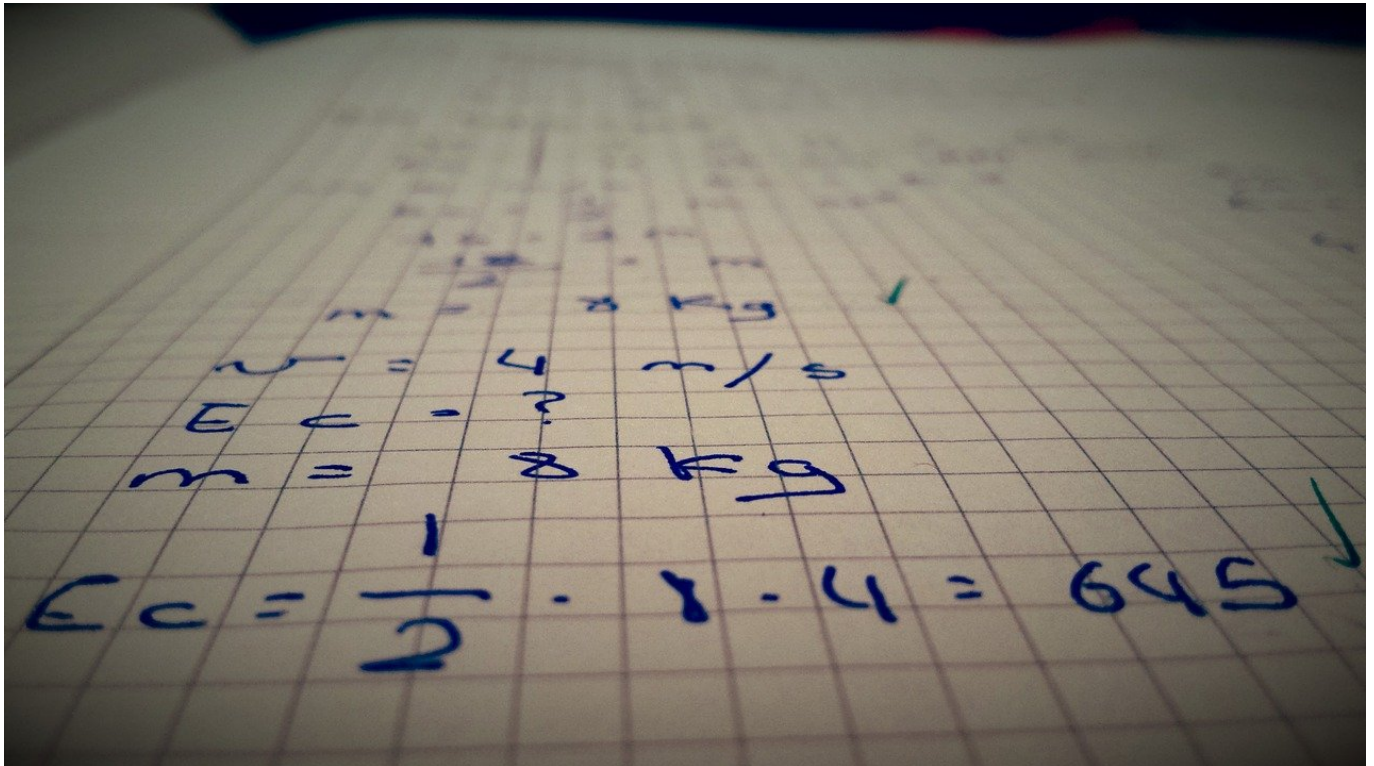

## **Annotate as a Verb**

### **Definitions of "Annotate" as a verb**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “annotate” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Add notes to (a text or diagram) giving explanation or comment.*
- *Add explanatory notes to or supply with critical comments.*
- *Provide interlinear explanations for words or phrases.*



## Synonyms of "Annotate" as a verb (6 Words)

- add footnotes to** Make an addition (to); join or combine or unite with others; increase the quality, quantity, size or scope of.
- add notes to** State or say further.
- comment** Make or write a comment on.  
*She **commented** on the post with three heart emojis.*
- comment on** Make or write a comment on.
- footnote** Add a footnote or footnotes to a piece of writing.
- gloss** Give a shine or gloss to usually by rubbing.  
*The pebble dash of the walls was **glossed** white.*



## Usage Examples of "Annotate" as a verb

- *The scholar annotated the early edition of a famous novel.*
- *He annotated on what his teacher had written.*



## Associations of "Annotate" (30 Words)

- allusion** The practice of making allusions.  
*A classical **allusion**.*
- annotation** A note by way of explanation or comment added to a text or diagram.  
*Marginal **annotations**.*
- apostrophe** Address to an absent or imaginary person.
- article** The definite or indefinite article.  
*An **article** about middle aged executives.*
- bibliography** A list of writings with time and place of publication (such as the writings of a single author or the works referred to in preparing a document etc).  
*A **bibliography** of his publications.*
- book** The notebook in which a referee writes the names of players who are cautioned for foul play.  
*I didn't hear the verdict because I had to **book** it to work.*

<b>caret</b>	A mark used by an author or editor to indicate where something is to be inserted into a text.
<b>citation</b>	A short note recognizing a source of information or of a quoted passage. <i>A traffic <b>citation</b>.</i>
<b><u>cite</u></b>	Praise (someone, typically a member of the armed forces) in an official report for a courageous act. <i>Medics have been <b>cited</b> as a key example of a modern breed of technical expert.</i>
<b>comment</b>	A written explanation or commentary. <i>You asked for <b>comments</b> on the new proposals.</i>
<b><u>compile</u></b>	Convert (a program) into a machine-code or lower-level form in which the program can be executed. <i>The local authority must <b>compile</b> a list of the names and addresses of taxpayers.</i>
<b><u>descriptive</u></b>	Describing the structure of a language. <i><b>Descriptive</b> grammar.</i>
<b><u>dictum</u></b>	A formal pronouncement from an authoritative source. <i>The old <b>dictum</b> might is right.</i>
<b><u>excerpt</u></b>	Take an excerpt or excerpts from a text. <i>The notes are <b>excerpted</b> from his forthcoming biography.</i>
<b><u>maxim</u></b>	English inventor (born in the United States) who invented the Maxim gun that was used in World War I (1840-1916). <i>The <b>maxim</b> that actions speak louder than words.</i>
<b>mention</b>	Make mention of. <i>She made no <b>mention</b> of her disastrous trip to Paris.</i>
<b>motto</b>	A favorite saying of a sect or political group. <i>They were developing the use of leitmotifs or <b>mottoes</b> that appear throughout an opera.</i>
<b>notation</b>	A note or annotation. <i>He added a short <b>notation</b> to the address on the envelope.</i>
<b>ostensive</b>	Directly demonstrative.
<b><u>paraphrase</u></b>	Express the meaning of (something written or spoken) using different words, especially to achieve greater clarity. <i>Scattered here and there in the text are frank <b>paraphrases</b> of lines from Virgil Cicero and Quintilian.</i>
<b>quotation</b>	A passage or expression that is quoted or cited. <i>A great argument with much <b>quotation</b> of Darwin.</i>



<b>quote</b>	A passage or expression that is quoted or cited. <i><b>Quote</b> prices for cars.</i>
<b>refer</b>	Of a word phrase or symbol describe or denote have as a referent. <i>This plant can be <b>referred</b> to a known species.</i>
<b>reference</b>	A publication (or a passage from a publication) that is referred to. <i>He carried an armful of <b>references</b> back to his desk.</i>
<b>remark</b>	Regard with attention; notice. <i>Tom s looking peaky she <b>remarked</b>.</i>
<b>sentence</b>	Pronounce a sentence on somebody in a court of law. <i>Her husband is serving a three year <b>sentence</b> for fraud.</i>
<b>statement</b>	A presentation of a theme or melody within a composition. <i>Children with <b>statements</b> of special educational needs.</i>
<b>text</b>	Send someone a text message. <i>Pictures made the <b>text</b> easier to understand.</i>
<b>tin</b>	Cover with a thin layer of tin. <i><b>Tinned</b> foods are not very tasty.</i>
<b>typographic</b>	Relating to or occurring or used in typography. <i>A <b>typographical</b> error.</i>
