Antenna as a Noun

Definitions of "Antenna" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “antenna” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A rod, wire, or other device used to transmit or receive radio or television signals; an aerial.*
- *The faculty of instinctively detecting and interpreting subtle signs.*
- *One of a pair of mobile appendages on the head of e.g. insects and crustaceans; typically sensitive to touch and taste.*
- *Sensitivity similar to that of a receptor organ.*
- *Either of a pair of long, thin sensory appendages on the heads of insects, crustaceans, and some other arthropods.*
- *An electrical device that sends or receives radio or television signals.*



Synonyms of "Antenna" as a noun (4 Words)

- aerial** A pass to a receiver downfield from the passer.
- feeler** A tentative proposal intended to ascertain someone's attitude or opinion.
*He has already put out **feelers** to local employers.*
- horn** The material mostly keratin that covers the horns of ungulates and forms hooves and claws and nails.
*Powdered rhino **horn**.*
- tentacle** Something that acts like a tentacle in its ability to grasp and hold.
*Caught in the **tentacles** of organized crime.*



Usage Examples of "Antenna" as a noun

- *Bugs use their antennae to detect blood heat.*
- *He has the political antennae of a party whip.*
- *A TV antenna.*
- *He had a special antenna for public relations.*



Associations of "Antenna" (30 Words)

- acutely** Changing suddenly in direction and degree.
*The whole situation was **acutely** embarrassing.*
- aerial** Characterized by lightness and insubstantiality; as impalpable or intangible as air- Thomas Carlyle.
***Aerial** cable cars.*
- barb** A cluster of spikes on barbed wire.
*His **barb** hurt more than she cared to admit.*
- broadcast** Broadcast over the airwaves as in radio or television.
*We don't want to **broadcast** our unhappiness to the world.*
- broadcaster** A mechanical device for scattering something (seed or fertilizer or sand etc.) in all directions.
*He became a successful **broadcaster** both on television and the wireless.*

broadcasting	The transmission of programmes or information by radio or television. <i>The state monopoly on broadcasting.</i>
cable	Provide an area with power lines or with the equipment necessary for cable television. <i>Nearly all urban areas are cabled so viewers can choose from up to 20 channels.</i>
<u>camera</u>	A device for recording visual images in the form of photographs, film, or video signals. <i>A photographer s camera flashed.</i>
cameraman	A photographer who operates a movie camera.
<u>clip</u>	An article of jewelry that can be clipped onto a hat or dress. <i>He could do ten at a clip.</i>
<u>clock</u>	A mechanical or electrical device for measuring time, indicating hours, minutes, and sometimes seconds by hands on a round dial or by displayed figures. <i>Beware of motorists who clock their car before selling it.</i>
commentary	An expression of opinions or offering of explanations about an event or situation. <i>A commentary on the Old Testament.</i>
drama	A dramatic work intended for performance by actors on a stage. <i>A hostage drama.</i>
<u>ethereal</u>	Of heaven or the spirit. <i>This smallest and most ethereal of birds.</i>
gaff	Seize or impale with a gaff. <i>The whales are gaffed speared or knifed to death.</i>
mast	A tall upright post on land, especially a flagpole or a television or radio transmitter.
newscaster	Someone who broadcasts the news.
radio	Indicating radiation or radioactivity. <i>He switched the radio on.</i>
satellite	Satellite television. <i>A communications satellite.</i>
serrate	Serrated. <i>Leaves with serrate margins.</i>
serrated	Having or denoting a jagged edge; sawlike. <i>A knife with a serrated edge.</i>

sharply	With a sudden, piercing physical sensation or effect; intensely. <i>A sharply observed account.</i>
telecast	A television broadcast. <i>The programme will be telecast simultaneously to nearly 150 cities.</i>
telegraph	Send a message by telegraph. <i>I must go and telegraph Mama.</i>
television	A device with a screen for receiving television signals. <i>A television camera.</i>
tripod	The bronze altar at Delphi on which a priestess sat to utter oracles.
tv	Broadcasting visual images of stationary or moving objects. <i>The British call a tv set a telly.</i>
unsubstantial	Having little or no solidity, reality, or factual basis. <i>A pretty if unsubstantial cubist composition.</i>
vcr	A magnetic tape recorder for recording (and playing back) TV programs.
wire	Fasten with wire. <i>They wired his jaw.</i>
