anthropological	Relating to the study of humankind. <i>An anthropological expedition to Borneo.</i>
antiquity	An object, building, or work of art from the ancient past. <i>A church of great antiquity.</i>
archaeology	The branch of anthropology that studies prehistoric people and their cultures.

criminology	The scientific study of crime and criminals.
culture	A preparation of cells obtained by culture. <i>The reason that the agency is doomed to inaction has something to do with the FBI culture.</i>
<u>early</u>	Of an early stage in the development of a language or literature. <i>Early forms of life.</i>
economics	The condition of a region or group as regards material prosperity. <i>He is responsible for the island s modest economics.</i>
<u>era</u>	A measure of a pitcher s effectiveness calculated as the average number of earned runs allowed by the pitcher for every nine innings pitched. <i>Leading photographers of the Victorian era.</i>
ethnic	A person who is a member of an ethnic group. <i>The students ethnic backgrounds are very diverse.</i>
ethnography	The branch of anthropology that provides scientific description of individual human societies.

ethnology	The study of the characteristics of different peoples and the differences and relationships between them.
folklore	A body of popular myths or beliefs relating to a particular place, activity, or group of people. <i>Hollywood folklore.</i>
geography	The nature and relative arrangement of places and physical features. <i>The geography of post war London.</i>
historical	(of the study of a subject) based on an analysis of its development over a period. <i>The historical Jesus.</i>
mankind	Human beings considered collectively; the human race. <i>Research for the benefit of all mankind.</i>
megalithic	Massive or monolithic. <i>Massive megalithic monuments.</i>
millennium	A utopian period of justice, peace, and prosperity. <i>Archer's treatise predicted that the millennium was close at hand.</i>
nationalism	Love of country and willingness to sacrifice for it. <i>Their nationalism is tempered by a desire to join the European Union.</i>
neolithic	Of or relating to the most recent period of the Stone Age (following the mesolithic).
paleolithic	Second part of the Stone Age beginning about 750,000 to 500,000 years BC and lasting until the end of the last ice age about 8,500 years BC. <i>Paleolithic artifacts.</i>
paleontology	The earth science that studies fossil organisms and related remains.
past	A verb tense that expresses actions or states in the past. <i>The band has changed over the past twelve months.</i>
period	The interval between successive equal values of a periodic function. <i>Ganoid fishes swarmed during the earlier geological periods.</i>
prehistoric	No longer fashionable. <i>Prehistoric peoples.</i>
prehistory	The time during the development of human culture before the appearance of the written word. <i>The prehistory of capitalism.</i>
sociology	The study of the development, structure, and functioning of human society.

tradition

(in Christianity) doctrine not explicit in the Bible but held to derive from the oral teaching of Christ and the Apostles.

*Members of different castes have by **tradition** been associated with specific occupations.*
