## Associations of "Antibody" (30 Words)

<b>antigen</b>	A toxin or other foreign substance which induces an immune response in the body, especially the production of antibodies.
<b>antitoxin</b>	An antibody that counteracts a toxin.
<b>blood</b>	The fluid red in vertebrates that is pumped through the body by the heart and contains plasma blood cells and platelets. <i><b>Blood</b> carries oxygen and nutrients to the tissues and carries away waste products.</i>
<b>cell</b>	The local area covered by one of the short range transmitters in a cellular telephone system. <i>Terrorist <b>cells</b>.</i>
<b>disease</b>	An impairment of health or a condition of abnormal functioning. <i>We are suffering from the British <b>disease</b> of self deprecation.</i>
<b>erythrocyte</b>	A red blood cell, which (in humans) is typically a biconcave disc without a nucleus. Erythrocytes contain the pigment haemoglobin, which imparts the red colour to blood, and transport oxygen and carbon dioxide to and from the tissues.
<b>healthy</b>	In a good physical or mental condition; in good health. <i>I feel fit and <b>healthy</b>.</i>
<b>hemoglobin</b>	A hemoprotein composed of globin and heme that gives red blood cells their characteristic color; function primarily to transport oxygen from the lungs to the body tissues. <i>Fish have simpler <b>hemoglobin</b> than mammals.</i>
<b>humanization</b>	The act of making more human.
<b>immune</b>	Relating to immune resistance. <i>No one is <b>immune</b> to his immense charm.</i>
<b>immunity</b>	An act exempting someone. <i><b>Immunity</b> to typhoid seems to have increased spontaneously.</i>

<b>immunization</b>	The action of making a person or animal immune to infection, typically by inoculation. <i>A polio <b>immunization</b> campaign.</i>
<b>immunize</b>	Make (a person or animal) immune to infection, typically by inoculation. <i>The vaccine is used to <b>immunize</b> children against measles.</i>
<b>inoculation</b>	Taking a vaccine as a precaution against contracting a disease. <i>A course of <b>inoculations</b>.</i>
<b>leukocyte</b>	Blood cells that engulf and digest bacteria and fungi; an important part of the body's defense system.
<b>lipid</b>	An oily organic compound insoluble in water but soluble in organic solvents; essential structural component of living cells (along with proteins and carbohydrates).
<b>membrane</b>	A pliable sheet of tissue that covers or lines or connects the organs or cells of animals or plants. <i>The concrete should include a <b>membrane</b> to prevent rising damp.</i>
<b>nurse</b>	Serve as a nurse care for sick or handicapped people. <i>You cannot <b>nurse</b> your baby in public in some places.</i>
<b>plasma</b>	A fourth state of matter distinct from solid or liquid or gas and present in stars and fusion reactors a gas becomes a plasma when it is heated until the atoms lose all their electrons leaving a highly electrified. <i>The current passed through a column of <b>plasma</b>.</i>
<b>polio</b>	An acute viral disease marked by inflammation of nerve cells of the brain stem and spinal cord.
<b>serum</b>	The blood serum of an animal used to provide immunity to a pathogen or toxin by inoculation or as a diagnostic agent. <i>The researchers examined blood <b>serum</b> obtained from 471 men and women.</i>
<b>smallpox</b>	A highly contagious viral disease characterized by fever and weakness and skin eruption with pustules that form scabs that slough off leaving scars.
<b>syringe</b>	Clean the ear a wound etc by spraying liquid from a syringe. <i><b>Syringe</b> the leaves frequently during warm weather.</i>
<b>tetanus</b>	The prolonged contraction of a muscle caused by rapidly repeated stimuli.
<b>tularemia</b>	A highly infectious disease of rodents (especially rabbits and squirrels) and sometimes transmitted to humans by ticks or flies or by handling infected animals.
<b>vaccinate</b>	Perform vaccinations or produce immunity in by inoculation. <i>All the children were <b>vaccinated</b> against tuberculosis.</i>

- vaccination** Taking a vaccine as a precaution against contracting a disease.  
***Vaccination** against yellow fever is essential.*
- vaccine** Immunogen consisting of a suspension of weakened or dead pathogenic cells injected in order to stimulate the production of antibodies.  
*There is no **vaccine** against the virus.*
- virus** An infection or disease caused by a virus.  
*I've had a **virus**.*
- waiver** An act or instance of waiving a right or claim.  
*They give consent to **waiver** of their subrogation rights.*
