Synonyms of "Antics" as a noun (9 Words)

- escapades** A wild and exciting undertaking (not necessarily lawful).
- frolics** Gay or light-hearted recreational activity for diversion or amusement.
Their frolic in the surf threatened to become ugly.
- high jinks** A lofty level or position or degree.
- horseplay** Rough, boisterous play.
*This ridiculous **horseplay** has gone far enough.*
- larks** North American songbirds having a yellow breast.
- pranks** A ludicrous or grotesque act done for fun and amusement.
- romps** Gay or light-hearted recreational activity for diversion or amusement.
- stunts** A creature (especially a whale) that has been prevented from attaining full growth.
- tricks** An attempt to get you to do something foolish or imprudent.
That offer was a dirty trick.

*You make me feel **ancient**.*

antediluvian

A very old person.
***Antediluvian** man.*

antique

Give an antique appearance to.
*The **antique** fear that days would dwindle away to complete darkness.*

bizarre

Conspicuously or grossly unconventional or unusual.
*His behaviour became more and more **bizarre**.*

characteristically

In characteristic manner.
*He **characteristically** helped an old man.*

clown

Act as or like a clown.
*Martin was always the class **clown**.*

collectable	An item valued and sought by collectors. <i>Collectable coins.</i>
<u>collectible</u>	Subject to or requiring payment especially as specified. <i>A collectible bill.</i>
curio	Something unusual — perhaps worthy of collecting. <i>They had such fun over the wonderful box of curios that Jack had sent from India.</i>
different	Distinctly separate from the first. <i>That s another or different issue altogether.</i>
<u>grotesque</u>	Comically or repulsively ugly or distorted. <i>A figure wearing a grotesque mask.</i>
<u>hallmark</u>	Stamp with a hallmark. <i>This attitude hallmarks many a Briton s behaviour abroad.</i>
hieroglyph	Writing that resembles hieroglyphics usually by being illegible. <i>The International Organisation for Standardization is introducing two new hieroglyphs to perplex washing machine owners.</i>
idiosyncrasy	An abnormal physical reaction by an individual to a food or drug. <i>The idiosyncrasies of the prison system.</i>
irregularity	Not characterized by a fixed principle or rate; at irregular intervals. <i>The irregularity of his breathing.</i>
<u>juggling</u>	Throwing and catching several objects simultaneously.
<u>odd</u>	Of the remaining member of a pair. <i>It s odd that she didn t recognize me.</i>
oddity	The quality of being strange or peculiar. <i>She was regarded as a bit of an oddity.</i>
peculiar	Particular; special. <i>Some languages are peculiar to one region.</i>
peculiarity	A characteristic that is distinctive of a particular person or place. <i>His essays characterized decency as a British peculiarity.</i>
<u>quirk</u>	A narrow groove beside a beading. <i>Wry humour put a slight quirk in his mouth.</i>
<u>rare</u>	Not widely known; especially valued for its uncommonness. <i>Rare patches of green in the desert.</i>
<u>rarity</u>	Something unusual — perhaps worthy of collecting. <i>The rarity of the condition.</i>
remarkably	In a way that is worthy of attention. <i>He seems remarkably relaxed about the whole thing.</i>

strange	Denoting or involving a flavour (variety) of unstable quark having an electric charge of $-1/3$. Strange quarks have similar properties to down quarks and bottom quarks, but are distinguished from them by having an intermediate mass. <i>A strange fantastical mind.</i>
trick	A period of work or duty. <i>She thought Elaine was playing some trick on her.</i>
uncommon	Marked by an uncommon quality especially superlative or extreme of its kind. <i>He was uncommon afraid.</i>
unusual	Remarkable or interesting because different from or better than others. <i>It was unusual for Dennis to be late.</i>
<u>weird</u>	A person's destiny. <i>Some trick of the moonlight some weird effect of shadow.</i>
