- escapades** A wild and exciting undertaking (not necessarily lawful).
- frolics** Gay or light-hearted recreational activity for diversion or amusement.  
*Their frolic in the surf threatened to become ugly.*
- high jinks** A lofty level or position or degree.
- horseplay** Rough, boisterous play.  
*This ridiculous **horseplay** has gone far enough.*
- larks** North American songbirds having a yellow breast.
- pranks** A ludicrous or grotesque act done for fun and amusement.
- romps** Gay or light-hearted recreational activity for diversion or amusement.
- stunts** A creature (especially a whale) that has been prevented from attaining full growth.
- tricks** An attempt to get you to do something foolish or imprudent.  
*That offer was a dirty trick.*

Conspicuously or grossly unconventional or unusual.  
*His behaviour became more and more **bizarre**.*

**characteristically**

In characteristic manner.  
*He **characteristically** helped an old man.*

**clown**

Act as or like a clown.  
*Martin was always the class **clown**.*

<b>collectable</b>	An item valued and sought by collectors. <b>Collectable</b> coins.
<b><u>collectible</u></b>	Subject to or requiring payment especially as specified. A <b>collectible</b> bill.
<b>curio</b>	Something unusual — perhaps worthy of collecting. <i>They had such fun over the wonderful box of <b>curios</b> that Jack had sent from India.</i>
<b>different</b>	Distinctly separate from the first. <i>That s another or <b>different</b> issue altogether.</i>
<b><u>grotesque</u></b>	Comically or repulsively ugly or distorted. <i>A figure wearing a <b>grotesque</b> mask.</i>
<b><u>hallmark</u></b>	Stamp with a hallmark. <i>This attitude <b>hallmarks</b> many a Briton s behaviour abroad.</i>
<b>hieroglyph</b>	Writing that resembles hieroglyphics usually by being illegible. <i>The International Organisation for Standardization is introducing two new <b>hieroglyphs</b> to perplex washing machine owners.</i>
<b>idiosyncrasy</b>	An abnormal physical reaction by an individual to a food or drug. <i>The idiosyncrasies of the prison system.</i>
<b>irregularity</b>	Not characterized by a fixed principle or rate; at irregular intervals. <i>The <b>irregularity</b> of his breathing.</i>
<b><u>juggling</u></b>	Throwing and catching several objects simultaneously.
<b><u>odd</u></b>	Of the remaining member of a pair. <i>It s <b>odd</b> that she didn t recognize me.</i>
<b>oddity</b>	The quality of being strange or peculiar. <i>She was regarded as a bit of an <b>oddity</b>.</i>
<b>peculiar</b>	Particular; special. <i>Some languages are <b>peculiar</b> to one region.</i>
<b>peculiarity</b>	A characteristic that is distinctive of a particular person or place. <i>His essays characterized decency as a British <b>peculiarity</b>.</i>
<b><u>quirk</u></b>	A narrow groove beside a beading. <i>Wry humour put a slight <b>quirk</b> in his mouth.</i>
<b><u>rare</u></b>	Not widely known; especially valued for its uncommonness. <i><b>Rare</b> patches of green in the desert.</i>
<b><u>rarity</u></b>	Something unusual — perhaps worthy of collecting. <i>The <b>rarity</b> of the condition.</i>
<b>remarkably</b>	In a way that is worthy of attention. <i>He seems <b>remarkably</b> relaxed about the whole thing.</i>

<b>strange</b>	Denoting or involving a flavour (variety) of unstable quark having an electric charge of $-1/3$ . Strange quarks have similar properties to down quarks and bottom quarks, but are distinguished from them by having an intermediate mass. <i>A <b>strange</b> fantastical mind.</i>
<b>trick</b>	A period of work or duty. <i>She thought Elaine was playing some <b>trick</b> on her.</i>
<b>uncommon</b>	Marked by an uncommon quality especially superlative or extreme of its kind. <i>He was <b>uncommon</b> afraid.</i>
<b>unusual</b>	Remarkable or interesting because different from or better than others. <i>It was <b>unusual</b> for Dennis to be late.</i>
<u><b>weird</b></u>	A person's destiny. <i>Some trick of the moonlight some <b>weird</b> effect of shadow.</i>
