## Synonyms of "Antiquated" as an adjective (17 Words)

- anachronistic** Belonging or appropriate to an earlier period, especially so as to seem conspicuously old-fashioned.  
*She is rebelling against the **anachronistic** morality of her parents.*
- ancient** Showing or feeling signs of age or wear.  
***Ancient** history.*
- antediluvian** Of or belonging to the time before the biblical Flood.  
***Antediluvian** man.*
- archaic** So extremely old as seeming to belong to an earlier period.  
*Prisons are run on **archaic** methods.*
- behind the times** Having the lower score or lagging position in a contest.  
Characteristic of the time of chivalry and knighthood in the Middle Ages.
- medieval** Without other people around I would let my flat degenerate into **medieval** levels of squalor.

<b>obsolescent</b>	Becoming obsolete. <b>Obsolescent</b> equipment.
<b>obsolete</b>	(of a part or characteristic of an organism) less developed than formerly or in a related species; rudimentary; vestigial. <b>Obsolete</b> words.
<b>old-fashioned</b>	Out of fashion.
<b>out of date</b>	Excluded from use or mention.
<b>outdated</b>	Old; no longer valid or fashionable. <b>Outdated</b> equipment.
<b>outmoded</b>	Old-fashioned. <i>Demode or <b>outmoded</b> attire.</i>
<b>outworn</b>	No longer usable or serviceable because of excessive wear. <b>Outworn</b> prejudices.
<b>prehistoric</b>	No longer fashionable. <i>My dad s electric typewriter was a <b>prehistoric</b> machine.</i>
<b>primitive</b>	(of a part or structure) in the first or early stage of formation or growth; rudimentary. <i>The accommodation at the camp was a bit <b>primitive</b>.</i>
<b>quaint</b>	Attractively unusual or old-fashioned. <i>Came forth a <b>quaint</b> and fearful sight.</i>
<b>superannuated</b>	Outdated or obsolete through age or new developments. <i>He left the house for the support of twelve <b>superannuated</b> wool carders.</i>

## Associations of "Antiquated" (30 Words)

<b>aging</b>	Acquiring desirable qualities by being left undisturbed for some time.
<b>anachronistic</b>	Belonging to a period other than that being portrayed. <i>She is rebelling against the <b>anachronistic</b> morality of her parents.</i>
<b>ancient</b>	A person who lived in ancient times. <i>An <b>ancient</b> mariner.</i>
<b>antediluvian</b>	Of or belonging to the time before the biblical Flood. <i>They maintain <b>antediluvian</b> sex role stereotypes.</i>
<b>antiquary</b>	An expert or collector of antiquities.
<b>antique</b>	Make something resemble an antique by artificial means. <i>The kitchen had an <b>antique</b> cooker.</i>
<b>antiquity</b>	The historic period preceding the Middle Ages in Europe. <i>The great civilizations of <b>antiquity</b>.</i>

<b><u>archaic</u></b>	Little evolved from or characteristic of an earlier ancestral type. <i>Prisons are run on <b>archaic</b> methods.</i>
<b><u>battered</u></b>	Damaged by blows or hard usage. <i>A pair of <b>battered</b> black boots.</i>
<b><u>century</u></b>	A period of a hundred years reckoned from the traditional date of the birth of Christ. <i>He scored the only <b>century</b> of the tour.</i>
<b><u>dilapidated</u></b>	(of a building or object) in a state of disrepair or ruin as a result of age or neglect. <i>Old <b>dilapidated</b> buildings.</i>
<b><u>dowdy</u></b>	Primly out of date. <i>She could achieve the kind of casual chic which made every other woman around her look <b>dowdy</b>.</i>
<b><u>elder</u></b>	Used of the older of two persons of the same name especially used to distinguish a father from his son. <i>Schoolchildren were no less fascinated than their <b>elders</b>.</i>
<b><u>elderly</u></b>	(of a machine or similar object) showing signs of age. <i>Specialist services for the <b>elderly</b>.</i>
<b><u>historical</u></b>	(especially of a novel or film) set in the past. <i>A <b>historical</b> character.</i>
<b><u>moot</u></b>	Raise (a question or topic) for discussion; suggest (an idea or possibility). <i>The scheme was first <b>mooted</b> last October.</i>
<b><u>obsolescent</u></b>	Becoming obsolete. <i><b>Obsolescent</b> slang.</i>
<b><u>obsolete</u></b>	Cause a product or idea to become obsolete by replacing it with something new. <i>The phrase was <b>obsolete</b> after 1625.</i>
<b><u>old</u></b>	Very familiar used for emphasis old adj skilled through long experience. <i>Good <b>old</b> boy.</i>
<b><u>ossified</u></b>	Having become rigid or fixed in attitude or position. <i>An <b>ossified</b> bureaucratic system.</i>
<b><u>outdated</u></b>	Old; no longer valid or fashionable. <i><b>Outdated</b> equipment.</i>
<b><u>paleolithic</u></b>	Second part of the Stone Age beginning about 750,000 to 500,000 years BC and lasting until the end of the last ice age about 8,500 years BC. <i><b>Paleolithic</b> artifacts.</i>

<b>prehistory</b>	The events or conditions leading up to a particular occurrence or phenomenon. <i>The <b>prehistory</b> of capitalism.</i>
<b>senescence</b>	The organic process of growing older and showing the effects of increasing age.
<b>senescent</b>	Growing old.
<b>stodgy</b>	Dull and uninspired; lacking originality or excitement. <i>A <b>stodgy</b> pudding served up when everyone was already full.</i>
<b>stuffy</b>	Affected with a sensation of stoppage or obstruction. <i>Inhaling vapour from a bowl of hot water may help to clear a <b>stuffy</b> nose.</i>
<b>superannuated</b>	Outdated or obsolete through age or new developments. <i><b>Superannuated</b> laws.</i>
<b>traditional</b>	Existing in or as part of a tradition; long-established. <i><b>Traditional</b> morality.</i>
<b>yore</b>	Time long past.
