In any way whatsoever.

*You wouldn't understand all them long words **anyways**.*

Without care or concern.

*Roadsides are full of litter thrown **carelessly** by passers by.*

haphazardly	In a manner lacking any obvious principle of organization. <i>The film feels haphazardly thrown together.</i>
heedlessly	Without care or concern.
in a disorganized manner	To or toward the inside of.
in a muddle	To or toward the inside of.
in any case	To or toward the inside of.
in any event	To or toward the inside of.
no matter what	Referring to the degree to which a certain quality is present.
<u>regardless</u>	Despite the prevailing circumstances. <i>The allowance is paid regardless of age or income.</i>

- *They came anyhow they could.*
- *Two suitcases flung anyhow.*

<u>conceivable</u>	Capable of being imagined or grasped mentally. <i>In every conceivable way that action was entirely wrong.</i>
<u>every</u>	(used of count nouns) each and all of the members of a group considered singly and without exception. <i>Every third seat.</i>
expedient	Serving to promote your interest. <i>Holding a public enquiry into the scheme was not expedient.</i>
<u>frequently</u>	Regularly or habitually; often. <i>They go abroad frequently.</i>

irrespective	In spite of everything; without regard to drawbacks. <i>Child benefit is paid irrespective of income levels.</i>
<u>maybe</u>	By chance. <i>Maybe I won't go back.</i>
means	Resources; capability. <i>Resolving disputes by peaceful means.</i>
<u>methodology</u>	A system of methods used in a particular area of study or activity. <i>A methodology for investigating the concept of focal points.</i>
more	Moreover. <i>More quickly.</i>
<u>moreover</u>	As a further matter; besides. <i>Moreover statistics show that competition for places is growing.</i>
often	In many cases or instances. <i>Vocabulary often reflects social standing.</i>
oftentimes	Many times at short intervals. <i>Sensory processing is oftentimes a challenge for someone with ASD.</i>
opportunity	A possibility due to a favorable combination of circumstances. <i>The night drive gave us the opportunity of spotting rhinos.</i>
<u>possibly</u>	Perhaps (used to indicate doubt or hesitancy). <i>What can you possibly mean.</i>
<u>practically</u>	Almost; nearly. <i>Practically everything in Hinduism is the manifestation of a god.</i>
<u>probably</u>	With considerable certainty; without much doubt. <i>He will probably win the election.</i>
<u>quite</u>	Of an unusually noticeable or exceptional or remarkable kind (not used with a negative). <i>We've had quite an afternoon.</i>
really	Used as intensifiers real is sometimes used informally for really rattling is informal. <i>I think she's really great.</i>

<u>supposedly</u>	Believed or reputed to be the case. <i>There were rumours of a rift between him and his colleagues supposedly because they were jealous of his relationship with the Duchess.</i>
ultimately	At the most basic level. <i>Ultimately he had to give in.</i>
<u>virtually</u>	By means of virtual reality techniques. <i>Virtually all the parties signed the contract.</i>
way	A general category of things used in the expression in the way of. <i>He was showing off as is the way with adolescent boys.</i>
<u>whatever</u>	No matter what happens. <i>They received no help whatever.</i>
wherever	Where in the world. <i>It should be available wherever you go to shop.</i>
