- barely** In a sparse or scanty way.
*They had **barely** sat down before forty policemen swarmed in.*
- coincidentally** Happening at the same time.
*Her dad **coincidentally** happens to be the accountant at the bank.*
- contiguous** Connecting without a break; within a common boundary.
*Utah and the **contiguous** state of Idaho.*
- frequency** The number of occurrences within a given time period.
*The **frequency** of modulation was 40 cycles per second.*
- frequently** Many times at short intervals.
*They go abroad **frequently**.*
- hardly** Almost not.
*We **hardly** knew them.*

infrequently	Not many times. <i>He cooks but only infrequently.</i>
meagerly	Deficient in amount or quality or extent. <i>These voices are meagerly represented at the conference.</i>
more	Moreover. <i>More support.</i>
now	The momentary present. <i>See more of what s now during our autumn catwalk show.</i>
occasional	(of a literary composition, speech, religious service, etc.) produced on or intended for a special occasion. <i>An occasional table.</i>
<u>occasionally</u>	Now and then or here and there. <i>Open areas are only occasionally interrupted by clumps of trees.</i>
oft	Many times at short intervals. <i>We often met over a cup of coffee.</i>
often	Frequently; many times. <i>How often do you have your hair cut.</i>
oftentimes	In many instances. <i>Sensory processing is oftentimes a challenge for someone with ASD.</i>
<u>rare</u>	Recurring only at long intervals. <i>Rare gasses.</i>
<u>rarely</u>	To an unusual degree; exceptionally. <i>The rarely fine Sheraton bookcase.</i>
rareness	Noteworthy scarcity.
realized	Successfully completed or brought to an end. <i>The joy of a realized ambition overcame him.</i>
really	Used as intensifiers real is sometimes used informally for really rattling is informal. <i>I think she s really great.</i>
scant	Barely amounting to a specified number or quantity. <i>He does not scant his attention to the later writings.</i>
<u>scarce</u>	Scarcely. <i>He was scarce sixteen years old.</i>
scarcely	Almost not. <i>She had scarcely dismounted before the door swung open.</i>
<u>seldom</u>	Not often; rarely. <i>Islay is seldom visited by tourists.</i>

- sometimes** Occasionally, rather than all of the time.
***Sometimes** I want to do things on my own.*
- sparsely** In a sparse manner.
*A **sparsely** populated region.*
- sporadically** In a sporadic manner.
*He only works **sporadically**.*
- today** The present period of time.
*Did you see **today's** newspaper.*
- typically** With the distinctive qualities of a particular type of person or thing.
*David lit up many gatherings with his **typically** forthright comments.*
- uncommonly** Exceptionally.
*He is an **uncommonly** good talker.*
