- *Used to indicate that a statement explains or supports a previous statement.*

Synonyms of "Anyways" as an adverb (4 Words)

- [anyhow](#)** In a careless or haphazard way.
*They came **anyhow** they could.*
- [anyway](#)** Used in questions to emphasize the speaker’s wish to obtain the truth.
*I told you it s all right and **anyway** it was my fault.*
- in any case** To or toward the inside of.
- in any event** To or toward the inside of.

Usage Examples of "Anyways" as an adverb

- *You wouldn't understand all them long words anyways.*

additionally	Used to introduce a new fact or argument. <i>Additionally 50 hours of practical experience will be necessary.</i>
also	In addition. <i>Dyslexia also known as word blindness.</i>
anyhow	Used to indicate that a statement explains or supports a previous statement. <i>Two suitcases flung anyhow.</i>
appreciably	To a noticeable degree. <i>Profits have grown appreciably over the last four years.</i>
besides	Making an additional point; anyway. <i>I m capable of doing the work and a lot more besides.</i>
chance	Be the case by chance. <i>If that phone call is for me chances are it s my wife.</i>
every	Each and all of a series of entities or intervals as specified. <i>Every person is mortal.</i>
except	Take exception to. <i>Five classes of advertisement are excepted from control.</i>
expected	Considered likely or probable to happen or arrive. <i>Prepared for the expected attack.</i>
furthermore	In addition; besides (used to introduce a fresh consideration in an argument). <i>Computer chess games are getting cheaper all the time furthermore their quality is improving.</i>
however	In whatever way or manner. <i>Although I m a little afraid however I d like to try it.</i>
instead	As an alternative or substitute. <i>She never married preferring instead to remain single.</i>
likely	Likely but not certain to be or become true or real. <i>A likely result.</i>
maybe	Perhaps; possibly. <i>Maybe I won t go back.</i>
more	Forming the comparative of adjectives and adverbs especially those of more than one syllable. <i>We have no more bananas.</i>
moreover	As a further matter; besides. <i>The cellar was dark moreover mice nested there.</i>

opportunity	A possibility due to a favorable combination of circumstances. <i>The holiday gave us the opportunity to visit Washington.</i>
percent	A proportion in relation to a whole (which is usually the amount per hundred).
perceptibly	In a noticeable manner.
perhaps	Used when one does not wish to be too definite or assertive in the expression of an opinion. <i>Perhaps not surprisingly he was cautious about committing himself.</i>
possibly	By chance. <i>We may possibly run into them at the concert.</i>
potential	Having or showing the capacity to develop into something in the future. <i>A campaign to woo potential customers.</i>
preferably	Ideally; if possible. <i>He would like a place of his own preferably outside the town.</i>
probably	Easy to believe on the basis of available evidence. <i>He is probably out of the country.</i>
quite	To the utmost or most absolute extent or degree; absolutely; completely. <i>Quite frankly I don't blame you.</i>
rather	Used to express a recommended alternative, but without a than clause and used with verbs other than would; instead. <i>I rather think he wants me to marry him.</i>
really	Used as intensifiers real is sometimes used informally for really rattling is informal. <i>Really you shouldn't have done it.</i>
too	Very. <i>Too big.</i>
whatever	At all; of any kind (used for emphasis). <i>Give me whatever peaches you don't want.</i>
wherever	In all places; regardless of where. <i>It should be available wherever you go to shop.</i>
