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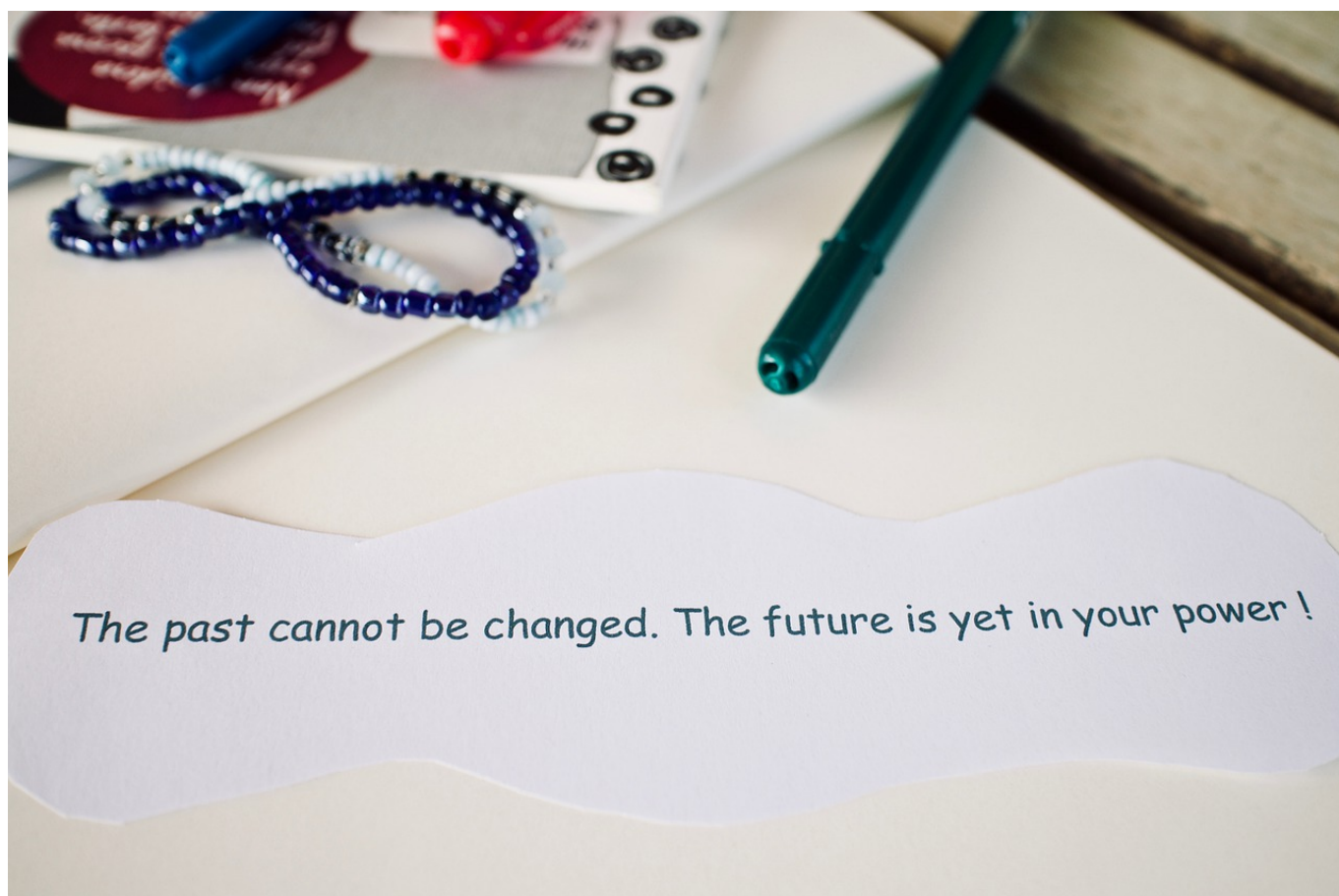

### Definitions of "Aphorism" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “aphorism” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A pithy observation which contains a general truth.*
- *A concise statement of a scientific principle, typically by a classical author.*
- *A short pithy instructive saying.*



## Synonyms of "Aphorism" as a noun (15 Words)

<a href="#"><u>adage</u></a>	A proverb or short statement expressing a general truth. <i>The old <b>adage</b> out of sight out of mind.</i>
<b>apophthegm</b>	A concise saying or maxim; an aphorism. <i>The <b>apophthegm</b> tomorrow is another day.</i>
<b>apothegm</b>	A short pithy instructive saying.
<a href="#"><u>axiom</u></a>	(logic) a proposition that is not susceptible of proof or disproof; its truth is assumed to be self-evident. <i>The <b>axiom</b> that sport builds character.</i>
<a href="#"><u>dictum</u></a>	A formal pronouncement from an authoritative source. <i>The old <b>dictum</b> might is right.</i>
<b>epigram</b>	A pithy saying or remark expressing an idea in a clever and amusing way. <i>A Wildean <b>epigram</b>.</i>

<b>epigraph</b>	A short quotation or saying at the beginning of a book or chapter, intended to suggest its theme.
<b>gnome</b>	A person regarded as having secret or sinister influence in financial matters. <i>A grizzled <b>gnome</b> of a man.</i>
<b><u>maxim</u></b>	A saying that is widely accepted on its own merits. <i>The <b>maxim</b> that actions speak louder than words.</i>
<b>motto</b>	A favorite saying of a sect or political group. <i>They were developing the use of leitmotifs or <b>mottoes</b> that appear throughout an opera.</i>
<b>pearl of wisdom</b>	A shade of white the color of bleached bones.
<b>precept</b>	A rate or tax set by a precept. <i>The Commissioner issued <b>precepts</b> requiring the companies to provide information.</i>
<b>proverb</b>	A short, well-known pithy saying, stating a general truth or piece of advice.
<b><u>saw</u></b>	A serrated organ or part such as the toothed snout of a sawfish.
<b><u>tag</u></b>	The act of touching a player in a game (which changes their status in the game). <i>The car had Texas <b>tags</b>.</i>



## Usage Examples of "Aphorism" as a noun

- *The old aphorism 'the child is father to the man.'*
- *The debate begins and ends at the level of aphorism, with commentators saying that something must be done.*
- *The opening sentence of the first aphorism of Hippocrates.*





## Associations of "Aphorism" (30 Words)

### **adage**

A proverb or short statement expressing a general truth.

*The old **adage** out of sight out of mind.*

### **advise**

Offer suggestions about the best course of action to someone.

*I **advised** him that the rent was due.*

### **allegory**

A story, poem, or picture that can be interpreted to reveal a hidden meaning, typically a moral or political one.

*Pilgrim's Progress is an **allegory** of the spiritual journey.*

### **apologue**

A moral fable, especially one with animals as characters.

### **art**

The products of human creativity works of art collectively.

*The **art** of the Renaissance.*

### **aver**

Report or maintain.

*He **averred** that he was innocent of the allegations.*

<b><u>axiom</u></b>	A statement or proposition on which an abstractly defined structure is based. <i>The <b>axiom</b> that sport builds character.</i>
<b>colloquial</b>	(of language) used in ordinary or familiar conversation; not formal or literary. <i><b>Colloquial</b> phrases.</i>
<b>epigram</b>	A pithy saying or remark expressing an idea in a clever and amusing way. <i>A Wildean <b>epigram</b>.</i>
<b>fable</b>	A story about mythical or supernatural beings or events. <i>I do not dream nor <b>fable</b>.</i>
<b>literature</b>	The humanistic study of a body of literature. <i>One aspect of Waterloo has not yet been treated in the <b>literature</b>.</i>
<b>locution</b>	An utterance regarded in terms of its intrinsic meaning or reference, as distinct from its function or purpose in context. <i>His impeccable <b>locution</b>.</i>
<b><u>maxim</u></b>	A short, pithy statement expressing a general truth or rule of conduct. <i>The <b>maxim</b> that actions speak louder than words.</i>
<b>mean</b>	Mean or intend to express or convey. <i>The <b>mean</b> annual rainfall.</i>
<b>motto</b>	A short sentence or phrase chosen as encapsulating the beliefs or ideals of an individual, family, or institution. <i>They were developing the use of leitmotifs or <b>mottoes</b> that appear throughout an opera.</i>
<b><u>ode</u></b>	A lyric poem, typically one in the form of an address to a particular subject, written in varied or irregular metre.
<b>parable</b>	A short moral story (often with animal characters). <i>The <b>parable</b> of the prodigal son.</i>
<b><u>poem</u></b>	A piece of writing in which the expression of feelings and ideas is given intensity by particular attention to diction (sometimes involving rhyme), rhythm, and imagery. <i>Lyric <b>poems</b>.</i>
<b><u>poetic</u></b>	Of or relating to poetry. <i><b>Poetic</b> works.</i>
<b>proverb</b>	A condensed but memorable saying embodying some important fact of experience that is taken as true by many people.
<b>quip</b>	Make jokes or quips. <i>Peter ate heartily with a <b>quip</b> about being a condemned man.</i>
<b><u>quote</u></b>	Put quote marks around. <i>He <b>quoted</b> the Bible to her.</i>

<b>raconteur</b>	A person who tells anecdotes in a skilful and amusing way. <i>A colourful <b>raconteur</b>.</i>
<b>reportedly</b>	According to reports or other information. <i>He was in El Salvador <b>reportedly</b> on his way to Texas.</i>
<b>rhyme</b>	Compose rhymes. <i>Balloon <b>rhymes</b> with moon.</i>
<b>say</b>	Communicate or express nonverbally. <i>Let us <b>say</b> that he did not tell the truth.</i>
<b>saying</b>	A short, pithy, commonly known expression which generally offers advice or wisdom. <i>This is stated in the <b>sayings</b> of the Prophet.</i>
<b>sonnet</b>	Praise in a sonnet. <i>He <b>sonneted</b> his hostess now.</i>
<b><u>spell</u></b>	Place under a spell. <i>A <b>spell</b> of good weather.</i>
<b>tell</b>	A Swiss patriot who lived in the early 14th century and who was renowned for his skill as an archer; according to legend an Austrian governor compelled him to shoot an apple from his son's head with his crossbow (which he did successfully without mishap). <i>Promise you won't <b>tell</b>.</i>
