
| plain | Unmistakably plain is often used informally for plainly. <i>He is plain stubborn.</i> |

| plainly | Unmistakably plain is often used informally for plainly. To speak plainly I suffer from a lack of confidence. |
| seemingly | From appearances alone. The child is seemingly healthy but the doctor is concerned. |
| so it seems | To a certain unspecified extent or degree. |



Usage Examples of "Apparently" as an adverb

- I thought he owned the property, but apparently not.
- She has apparently been living here for some time.
- The child nodded, apparently content with the promise.
- Irrigation often produces bumper crops from apparently desert land.

| clearly | In an easily perceptible manner. Could be seen clearly under the microscope. |
| <u>conspicuous</u> | Without any attempt at concealment; completely obvious. <i>He was very thin with a conspicuous Adam s apple.</i> |



| detectable | Able to be perceived or noticed; discernible. Yvette responded finally her French accent barely detectable . |

| distinctly | In a way that is readily distinguishable by the senses; clearly. It s distinctly possible. |

| <u>evident</u> | Clearly seen or understood; obvious. A clearly evident erasure in the manuscript. |
| <u>evidently</u> | Used as an affirmative response. A work so evidently laden with significance. |
| expressly | Explicitly; clearly. The house was expressly built for entertaining. |
| identifiable | Able to be recognized; distinguishable. There are no easily identifiable features on the shoreline. |
| indubitably | In a manner or to a degree that could not be doubted. It was immediately and indubitably apparent that I had interrupted a scene of lovers. |
| justified | Having, done for, or marked by a good or legitimate reason. <i>The doctors were justified in treating her.</i> |
| <u>manifest</u> | Record in a ship s manifest. Each passenger must be manifest ed. |
| marked | Strongly marked easily noticeable. A marked increase in UK sales. |
| <u>noticeable</u> | Undesirably noticeable. The church is noticeable for the fresco above the door. |
| observable | Able to be noticed or perceived; discernible. <i>Observable</i> differences. |
| obvious | Easily perceived or understood; clear, self-evident, or apparent. Unemployment has been the most obvious cost of the recession. |
| obviously | Unmistakably (`plain' is often used informally for `plainly. Obviously everyone has to do what they think is right. |
| palpability | The quality of being perceivable by touch. |
| <u>palpable</u> | Clearly revealed to the mind or the senses or judgment. There was a palpable sense of joy in the air. |



| perceptible | Easily perceived by the senses or grasped by the mind. <i>A perceptible</i> decline in public confidence. |

| plain | Express complaints discontent displeasure or unhappiness. There were indrawn breaths at such plain speaking. |
| positively | With certainty; so as to leave no room for doubt. The negotiations started positively with agreement on several issues. |
| rightly | With good reason. The key rightly belonged to Craig. |
| seemingly | From appearances alone-Thomas. It s touch and go seemingly and she s asking for you. |
| <u>surely</u> | Definitely or positively sure is sometimes used informally for surely. <i>No one knows how to move the economy quickly and surely <i>in that direction.</i></i> |
| <u>visible</u> | Visible imports or exports. A highly visible member of the royal entourage. |
