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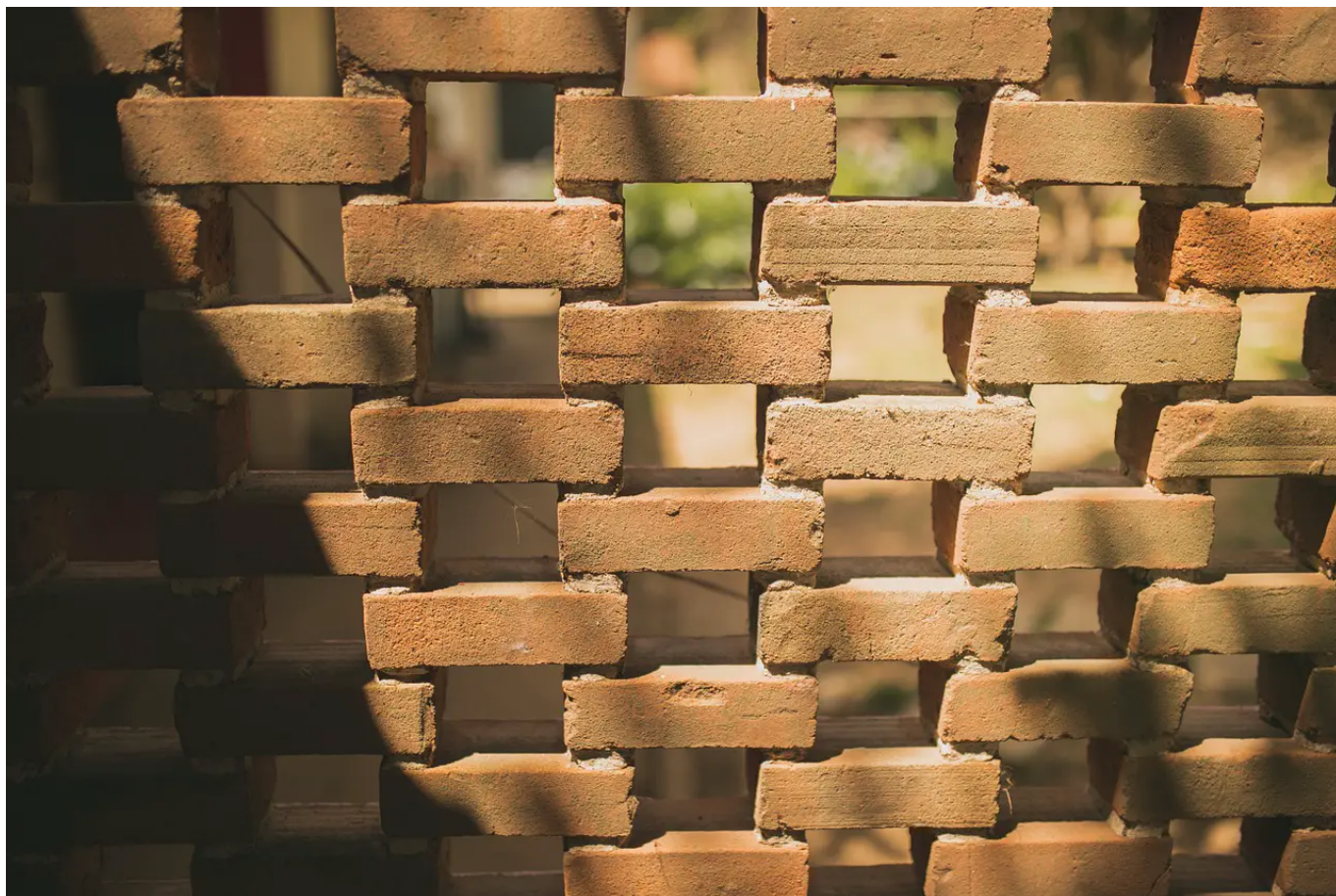

Definitions of "Apparently" as an adverb

evidently

Unmistakably (`plain' is often used informally for `plainly.
*She was in bed and **evidently** in great pain.*

manifestly

Unmistakably (`plain' is often used informally for `plainly.
*The system was **manifestly** unfair.*

obviously

In a way that is easily perceived or understood; clearly.
*She was **obviously** unwell.*

ostensibly

As appears or is stated to be true, though not necessarily so; apparently.
*The party secretary resigned **ostensibly** from ill health.*

patently

Clearly; without doubt.
*The Government's approach had **patently** failed to address the problem.*

plain

Unmistakably plain is often used informally for plainly.
*He is **plain** stubborn.*

plainly

Unmistakably plain is often used informally for plainly.
*To speak **plainly** I suffer from a lack of confidence.*

seemingly

From appearances alone.
*The child is **seemingly** healthy but the doctor is concerned.*

so it seems

To a certain unspecified extent or degree.



Usage Examples of "Apparently" as an adverb

- *I thought he owned the property, but apparently not.*
- *She has apparently been living here for some time.*
- *The child nodded, apparently content with the promise.*
- *Irrigation often produces bumper crops from apparently desert land.*



Associations of "Apparently" (30 Words)

- apparent** Seeming real or true, but not necessarily so.
*His **apparent** lack of concern.*
- assuredly** Confidently.
*The lad kept his cool and **assuredly** slipped the ball between the posts.*
- certainly** Used to emphasize the speaker's belief that what is said is true.
*Our current revenues are **certainly** lower than anticipated.*
- clearly** In an easily perceptible manner.
*Could be seen **clearly** under the microscope.*
- conspicuous** Without any attempt at concealment; completely obvious.
*He was very thin with a **conspicuous** Adam's apple.*

detectable	Able to be perceived or noticed; discernible. <i>Yvette responded finally her French accent barely detectable.</i>
discernible	Capable of being seen or noticed. <i>An essay with a meaning that was not always discernible.</i>
distinctly	In a way that is readily distinguishable by the senses; clearly. <i>It s distinctly possible.</i>
effortless	Not showing effort or strain. <i>The swallows glided in an effortless way through the busy air.</i>
<u>evident</u>	Clearly seen or understood; obvious. <i>A clearly evident erasure in the manuscript.</i>
<u>evidently</u>	Used as an affirmative response. <i>A work so evidently laden with significance.</i>
expressly	Explicitly; clearly. <i>The house was expressly built for entertaining.</i>
identifiable	Able to be recognized; distinguishable. <i>There are no easily identifiable features on the shoreline.</i>
indubitably	In a manner or to a degree that could not be doubted. <i>It was immediately and indubitably apparent that I had interrupted a scene of lovers.</i>
justified	Having, done for, or marked by a good or legitimate reason. <i>The doctors were justified in treating her.</i>
<u>manifest</u>	Record in a ship s manifest. <i>Each passenger must be manifested.</i>
marked	Strongly marked easily noticeable. <i>A marked increase in UK sales.</i>
<u>noticeable</u>	Undesirably noticeable. <i>The church is noticeable for the fresco above the door.</i>
observable	Able to be noticed or perceived; discernible. <i>Observable differences.</i>
obvious	Easily perceived or understood; clear, self-evident, or apparent. <i>Unemployment has been the most obvious cost of the recession.</i>
obviously	Unmistakably (`plain' is often used informally for `plainly'). <i>Obviously everyone has to do what they think is right.</i>
palpability	The quality of being perceivable by touch.
<u>palpable</u>	Clearly revealed to the mind or the senses or judgment. <i>There was a palpable sense of joy in the air.</i>

perceptible	Easily perceived by the senses or grasped by the mind. <i>A perceptible decline in public confidence.</i>
plain	Express complaints discontent displeasure or unhappiness. <i>There were indrawn breaths at such plain speaking.</i>
positively	With certainty; so as to leave no room for doubt. <i>The negotiations started positively with agreement on several issues.</i>
rightly	With good reason. <i>The key rightly belonged to Craig.</i>
<u>seemingly</u>	From appearances alone-Thomas. <i>It s touch and go seemingly and she s asking for you.</i>
<u>surely</u>	Definitely or positively sure is sometimes used informally for surely. <i>No one knows how to move the economy quickly and surely in that direction.</i>
<u>visible</u>	Visible imports or exports. <i>A highly visible member of the royal entourage.</i>
