placate	Make (someone) less angry or hostile. <i>They attempted to placate the students with promises.</i>
propitiate	Make peace with. <i>The pagans thought it was important to propitiate the gods with sacrifices.</i>
provide for	Give what is desired or needed, especially support, food or sustenance.
quell	Overcome or allay. <i>She quelled an urge to race up the stairs.</i>
reconcile	Make or show to be compatible. <i>The king and the archbishop were publicly reconciled.</i>
satisfy	Fill satisfy or meet a want or need or condition or restriction. <i>The whole team is working flat out to satisfy demand.</i>
serve	Serve a purpose role or function. <i>The recipe serves four people.</i>
stay	Stay behind. <i>Her ability to stay calm.</i>
win over	Be the winner in a contest or competition; be victorious.
