<b>lenify</b>	Cause to be more favorably inclined; gain the good will of.
<b>make peace with</b>	Constitute the essence of.
<b>meet</b>	Meet by design be present at the arrival of. <i><b>Meet</b> a violent death.</i>
<b>mollify</b>	Make less rigid or softer. <i>The women hoped to <b>mollify</b> the harsh wilderness environment.</i>
<b>pacify</b>	Fight violence and try to establish peace in (a location). <i>He had to <b>pacify</b> angry spectators.</i>
<b>palliate</b>	Lessen or to try to lessen the seriousness or extent of. <i>This eliminated or at least <b>palliated</b> suspicions aroused by German unity.</i>
<b>placate</b>	Make (someone) less angry or hostile. <i>They attempted to <b>placate</b> the students with promises.</i>
<b>propitiate</b>	Make peace with. <i>The pagans thought it was important to <b>propitiate</b> the gods with sacrifices.</i>
<b>provide for</b>	Give what is desired or needed, especially support, food or sustenance.
<b>quell</b>	Overcome or allay. <i>She <b>quelled</b> an urge to race up the stairs.</i>
<b>reconcile</b>	Make or show to be compatible. <i>The king and the archbishop were publicly <b>reconciled</b>.</i>
<b>satisfy</b>	Fill satisfy or meet a want or need or condition or restriction. <i>The whole team is working flat out to <b>satisfy</b> demand.</i>
<b>serve</b>	Serve a purpose role or function. <i>The recipe <b>serves</b> four people.</i>
<b>stay</b>	Stay behind. <i>Her ability to <b>stay</b> calm.</i>
<b>win over</b>	Be the winner in a contest or competition; be victorious.

<b>relent</b>	Give in, as to influence or pressure. <i>She was going to refuse his request but <b>relented</b>.</i>
