## Associations of "Appellate" (30 Words)

assessor	An official who evaluates property for the purpose of taxing it. The expert <b>assessor</b> recommended that the applicant have sole custody.
attempt	Make an effort or attempt. Troops shot civilians who <b>attempt</b> ed to flee.
bailiff	An officer of the court who is employed to execute writs and processes and make arrests etc.
chancery	A public record office.
court	A room in which a lawcourt sits. Everyone in the <b>court</b> knew he was going down innocent or guilty.
courtroom	A room in which a lawcourt sits. A bitter <b>courtroom</b> battle.
disbar	Exclude (someone) from something. The corrupt lawyer was <b>disbar</b> red.



federal	Any federal law enforcement officer. The health ministry has sole <b>federal</b> responsibility for healthcare.
filibuster	Obstruct proposed legislation with a filibuster. He was one of four Tories who <b>filibuster</b> ed for more than 30 minutes each to derail the free parking plan.
flop	With a flopping sound. The show <b>flop</b> ped in London.
<u>judge</u>	Put on trial or hear a case and sit as the judge at the trial of. <i>He is due to appear before a <b>judge</b> and jury on Monday.</i>
judicature	An assembly (including one or more judges) to conduct judicial business. The constitutional principle that the legislature is separate from the <b>judicature</b> .
judicial	Expressing careful judgment. A <b>judicial</b> system.
judiciary	The system of law courts that administer justice and constitute the judicial branch of government. The independence of the <b>judiciary</b> .
jurisdiction	The extent of the power to make legal decisions and judgements. The English court had no <b>jurisdiction</b> over the defendants.
juror	A member of a jury.
jury	Judge (an art or craft exhibition or exhibit. <i>The <b>jury</b> returned unanimous guilty verdicts.</i>
lawgiver	A maker of laws; someone who gives a code of laws. The monarch was supreme executive <b>lawgiver</b> judge and warrior.
<u>lawyer</u>	Practise law work as a lawyer. There is always a danger that the deal will be <b>lawyer</b> ed to death.
legality	Obligations imposed by law. Documentation testifying to the <b>legality</b> of the arms sale.
litigation	A legal proceeding in a court; a judicial contest to determine and enforce legal rights. <i>The company wishes to avoid litigation</i> .
magistracy	The office or authority of a magistrate. He twice ran for a <b>magistracy</b> in his home town.
<u>magistrate</u>	A civil officer who administers the law, especially one who conducts a court that deals with minor offences and holds preliminary hearings for more serious ones.
proceeding	The institution of a sequence of steps by which legal judgments are invoked.



ruin	Fall into ruin. The <b>ruin</b> and heartbreak wrought by alcohol divorce and violence.
sheriff	(in Scotland) a judge.
<u>testimony</u>	Evidence or proof of something. The <b>testimony</b> of an eyewitness.
<u>trial</u>	Of a horse dog or other animal compete in trials. <i>He cracked his ankle the week before the final <b>trial</b>.</i>
tribunal	A body established to settle certain types of dispute. <i>An international war crimes <b>tribunal</b>.</i>
verdict	The findings of a jury on issues of fact submitted to it for decision; can be used in formulating a judgment. The jury returned a <b>verdict</b> of not guilty.
