## Appellation as a Noun

### Definitions of "Appellation" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “appellation” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A name or title.*
- *A geographical indication used to identify where the grapes for a wine are grown.*
- *Identifying word or words by which someone or something is called and classified or distinguished from others.*
- *The action of giving a name to someone or something.*



## Synonyms of "Appellation" as a noun (12 Words)

- appellative** A common noun, such as 'doctor', 'mother', or 'sir', used as a vocative.  
A familiar name for a person (often a shortened version of a person's given name).
- byname** *Surnames started off as **byname**s to distinguish two persons in the same locality.*
- denomination** A name or designation.  
*Two cards of the same **denomination**.*
- designation** An official name, description, or title.  
*Dibden Bay's **designation** as a Site of Special Scientific Interest.*
- epithet** An epithet used as a term of abuse.  
*People jeered and hurled racial **epithets**.*

<b>honorific</b>	A tangible symbol signifying approval or distinction. <i>A sociolinguistic investigation of <b>honorifics</b> and their usage.</i>
<b>label</b>	(in a dictionary entry) a word or words used to specify the subject area, register, or geographical origin of the word being defined. <i>Independent <b>labels</b>.</i>
<b><u>name</u></b>	A language unit by which a person or thing is known. <i>Halt in the <b>name</b> of the law.</i>
<b><u>nickname</u></b>	A familiar name for a person (often a shortened version of a person's given name). <i>Mallender's fair complexion gave rise to his <b>nickname</b> Ghost.</i>
<b>sobriquet</b>	A person's nickname. <i>She was a vast and haughty person who answered to the <b>sobriquet</b> Duchesse.</i>
<b><u>tag</u></b>	The tip of an animal's tail when it is distinctively coloured. <i>I have a few <b>tags</b> of second hand equipment.</i>
<b><u>title</u></b>	A word such as Lord or Dame that is used before someone's name, or a form that is used instead of someone's name, to indicate high social or official rank. <i>The <b>title</b> Professor is reserved for one or two members of a department.</i>



## Usage Examples of "Appellation" as a noun

- *The city fully justifies its appellation 'the Pearl of the Orient.'*



## Associations of "Appellation" (30 Words)

<b>alias</b>	A name that has been assumed temporarily. <i>Fringes at higher spatial frequency are <b>aliased</b> by the sensor.</i>
<b>anonymously</b>	In a way that prevents a person from being identified by name. <i>Newman published two novels both <b>anonymously</b>.</i>
<b>appoint</b>	Furnish. <i>They <b>appointed</b> her as personnel manager.</i>
<b>appointment</b>	Law the act of disposing of property by virtue of the power of appointment. <i>Government ministers and other political <b>appointments</b> are frequently replaced.</i>
<b>assign</b>	Give an assignment to a person to a post or assign a task to a person. <i>They will ask you to <b>assign</b> your rights against the airline.</i>
<b>assignment</b>	An act of making a legal transfer of a right or liability. <i>The effective <b>assignment</b> of tasks.</i>
<b>authorize</b>	Give or delegate power or authority to. <i>The rock star never <b>authorized</b> this slanderous biography.</i>
<b>autograph</b>	Something written by one's own hand. <i>The earliest version of the work is possibly an <b>autograph</b>.</i>
<b>candidate</b>	A person or thing regarded as suitable for or likely to receive a particular fate, treatment, or position. <i>She was the perfect <b>candidate</b> for a biography.</i>
<b>cognomen</b>	The name used to identify the members of a family (as distinguished from each member's given name).
<b>commissioned</b>	Given official approval to act. <i>Those interested in pursuing careers as <b>commissioned</b> officers.</i>
<b>commissioner</b>	A government administrator. <i>A baseball <b>commissioner</b>.</i>
<b>delegate</b>	A member of a committee. <i>Congress <b>delegates</b> rejected the proposals.</i>
<b>denominate</b>	Assign a name or title to. <i>Two principal types of word associates can be <b>denominated</b> paradigmatic and syntagmatic.</i>
<b>designate</b>	Decree or designate beforehand. <i>He was <b>designated</b> as prime minister.</i>
<b>designation</b>	The action of choosing someone to hold an office or post. <i>A leader's <b>designation</b> of his own successor.</i>

<b>epithet</b>	An epithet used as a term of abuse. <i>People jeered and hurled racial <b>epithets</b>.</i>
<b>excellency</b>	An outstanding feature; something in which something or someone excels. <i>His <b>Excellency</b> the Indian Consul General.</i>
<b>listing</b>	The drawing up of a list.
<b>memorandum</b>	A note recording something for future use. <i>Articles of association must be signed by subscribers to the <b>memorandum</b>.</i>
<b>moniker</b>	A name. <i>His real <b>moniker</b> is Dave Kennedy.</i>
<b>name</b>	Assign a specified usually proper name to. <i>He wanted to protect his good <b>name</b>.</i>
<b>necrology</b>	An obituary notice.
<b>nominate</b>	Put forward nominate for appointment to an office or for an honor or position. <i>A day was <b>nominated</b> for the exchange of contracts.</i>
<b>ordained</b>	Fixed or established especially by order or command. <i>An <b>ordained</b> priest.</i>
<b>patronymic</b>	A name derived from the name of a father or ancestor, e.g. Johnson, O'Brien, Ivanovich. <i>The <b>patronymic</b> naming of children.</i>
<b>repute</b>	The state of being highly regarded; fame. <i>The waters of the fountain are <b>reputed</b> to have healing properties.</i>
<b>sobriquet</b>	A familiar name for a person (often a shortened version of a person's given name). <i>She was a vast and haughty person who answered to the <b>sobriquet</b> Duchesse.</i>
<b>stature</b>	Importance or reputation gained by ability or achievement. <i>An architect of international <b>stature</b>.</i>
<b>title</b>	Give a title to. <i>He refused to give <b>titles</b> to his paintings.</i>
